## Early History.

1962. Serious rowing, with a view to competing in summer regattas, began in the summer term, 1962.   
Term. 6 crews were coached <sup>each day</sup> in old, heavy, side-seater clinker fours\*, by Mr. E. M. HALL, at Henley, <sup>(of Selwyn & Gombridge Boat Clubs)</sup> for the first two months of term, whilst Colonel TRAVERS and Father TIDMARSH coped with the remaining oarsmen and coxes at Shiplake.

[\* For some of the time, we also had the use of a comparatively new, centre-seated boat, through the courtesy of the Henley Rowing Club.]

Shortage and age of equipment were great handicaps, but the Senior and Junior Crews gave good accounts of themselves at

Aug | Sept. 1962 The New Boat House, designed by  
 Mr. E. M. Hall in consultation with Mr.  
 W. Cook, Boatman of Leander Club,  
 was put up by Kirby Brothers of Reading,  
 at a cost of £650, including concrete floor.

The Captain of Boats was R. M. SHINGLER.

A landing/launching stage was constructed  
 (before the new boat house) at a cost of £45.

- 1962 Michaelmas Term.
- A few outings were arranged, but the competing claims of rugby and other activities made it impossible to pursue a continuous rowing programme. We welcomed the addition to the teaching and coaching staff of Mr. M. D. DUNCAN, formerly of the Boat Clubs of St. Edward's School, Oxford, & Trin. Coll. Dublin)
1963. Lent Term.
- Almost no rowing - owing to other activities (including hockey) and the abnormally dreadful weather (the "big freeze"). A good, though heavy, second-hand clinker four was bought from Staines Rowing Club for £50.

Summer Term

VIKING I, the new clinker four by Geo. Sims of Putney, arrived on the second day of term and boosted morale considerably. It was destined to have great success in regattas. (cost: £250.)

A TUB-PAIR, in fairly good condition, was bought from Trinity College, Oxford, for £30, and 12 serviceable second-hand oars from Mr. Jack Adlett of Henley.

## WALINGFORD REGATTA.

The Junior Crew (Crowder M., Eaton, Tucker, Crowder G. (st) & Matthews M. (cox)) were entered for the Schoolboy Fours (Under 16). They

won their 1st heat, against Abingdon School "A", by  $\frac{3}{4}$  length in 3 min. 38 sec., but lost in the 2nd heat to Royal Grammar School, Worcester, who reached the final but lost to Windsor Grammar School.

The SENIOR CREW (Walker, Osborne, Coulter, Shingle & Sheridan, cox) were entered for the Maiden Fours. They raced well, but lost by  $\frac{1}{2}$  length to Marlow Rowing Club in 3 min. 32 secs.

Crew Change: After Wallingford, Eaton had to withdraw from the Junior Crew - being just over age for Reading Clusters Regatta - and his place was taken by HAWKINS.

28/5/64 Both crews were taken to Reading, and for practising, by Mr. Hall & Mr. Duncan, where they boated from Reading University Boat House.  
30/5/64 Both crews had long & useful outings, ending with trial courses.

1.6.63. READING CLINKER REGATTA:

SENIOR CREW, in Maiden Fours, were drawn against Windsor Grammar School and Reading Blue Coat School. In a stiff head-wind, they had a poor start and lost  $\frac{3}{4}$  length to both the other crews in the first 10 strokes. They then overhauled the Blue Coat crew, beating them "easily", but could not catch Windsor G.S. who won in the fast time (for the conditions) of 4 min. 23 sec.

JUNIOR CREW, in Jun. School Fours, were drawn against King's Sch., Gloucester, and Monkton Combe School. The schools' crews were ~~both~~ drifting, when started, Monkton being  $\frac{1}{2}$  length up. Shiplake raced tenaciously, and lost by only a canvas, beating King's "easily", in 3m. 5s. - by far the fastest time for the event, in which 15 crews took part. (Monkton went on to win the final.)

[We raced in borrowed, "Committee" boats].

After Reading Regatta, Eaton replaced Osborne T. as No. 2. in the 1st Crew.

} Weather and adjustment of conflicting activities made some rowing and tubbing possible, and coaching was concentrated on Merchant, Griffitts M., Lester and Evelaugh C., to try to bring them on as a new junior crew. This winter preparation paid dividends. (Early in 1964 a good second-hand 4, "Aladdin", was bought for £110 from Mr. J. Alett of Henley.)

#### 1964: A NEW BOAT:

Quotations were obtained from a number of firms, including Geo. Sims., but, either in point of time or expense - or both, none was satisfactory. So, on the advice of Mr. Page, Sec. of the Amateur Rowing Assocn., a boat was ordered from Radley & Sons, of Clapton, London. It arrived later than promised, ~~but~~ - on the morning of Founder's Day, June 6th, in fact. The varnished finish was not as good as Viking I, and £10 was kept back, from the purchase price, in consequence. Also, there seemed an unusually large amount of "play" between the slide-wheels and the runners. The seriousness of this, however, did not become apparent till later, as will be seen.

1964

SUMMER 1964 was a glorious one for the Boat Club : the weather was mainly fair, and the 1st Crew had a remarkable run of deserved success. [During this season, the 1st Crew used our first set of new oars, bought from Aspling's.]

May 19th

Henley Grammar School challenged us, and we met them over a course of approx 1200 yards at Henley. All three of our crews were successful, the 1st crew winning by 20 seconds, the 2nd crew by 22 seconds, and the junior crew by 8 seconds.

We were one length down  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the way over the course, then Shingler, our stroke, put in a storming burst which took our crew right past Strode's, to win in the fast time of 3 m. 58 s. - the fastest time of any of the \*'73 coxed fours taking part in the regatta. We went on to win the next heat and the final in similar fashion, winning the READING CHALLENGE Bowl, dating back to 1887. [ 5 crews were beaten in the process.]

FOUR tired young men and an almost hoarse cox paddled past the winning post in the Reading Clinker Boat Regatta on Saturday to win the Novice Fours Division "B" event to the cheers of the crowd after what must have been one of the most gruelling races ever seen on the Thames at Reading.

The four oarsmen, McHugh, Lee, McCowan and Tappin and cox A. Inns, were representing Furnivall Sculling Club and met Hereford R.C. and Eastbourne College B.C. in the final of that fours' event.

And in a tremendous battle Furnivall and Hereford raced to a dead heat—the first of the day.

The two crews were ordered to race, immediately, over half the course to decide the winner and, first, Hereford cracked up under strain. Then Furnivall slowed, and two very tired crews passed the line—with Furnivall just in the lead.

### Fitting end

This race was a fitting end to a "highly successful" day's racing although, with no stream or wind in favour of the oarsmen, times were comparatively slow.

Entries in the regatta were only eight short of the record set up in 1962 and this year it attracted crews from places all over the country, including Exeter, Cambridge, Southampton, Eastbourne and Durham.

But it was local crews who set the pace in the opening heats. In the second race of the day, a heat of the Junior Fours, Shiplake School, really in its infancy as a boat club, romped to an impressive win in three minutes 58 seconds.

By now the sun was shining brilliantly and the Thames was lined with rowing enthusiasts.

Other early heats were taken by Culham College, Reading University, Wallingford Grammar School, Radley College and Shiplake School again.

By 3.30 in the afternoon Purchase, of Wallingford, had reached the final of the Novice Sculls and Windsor Grammar School the final of the School Fours.

### Nine finals

There were nine finals in all and only two crews retained the trophies they won last year—Monkton Combe School (Junior School Fours) and Molesley (Junior Clinker Eights).

The biggest win in the finals was

in the Novice Sculls event, where Purchase, of Wallingford, beat Cowland (Weybridge R.C.) and Barratt (Putney R.C.) by three lengths in a time of four minutes 49 seconds.

Another fine performance was that of Shiplake, who took the Junior Fours title, following up the club's success at Wallingford Regatta last week.

And it was Shiplake, fast becoming a forceful boat club, who put paid to any Strode's School hopes of retaining the Junior Fours title. The two crews met in an early heat and Shiplake romped to an easy win.

Mr. G. A. Winterton, headmaster of Ashmead School, presented the prizes at the regatta, which is now officially part of the big Reading Amateur Regatta.

### Shiplake Court Win at Reading

The Shiplake School crew, which won the maiden fours event at Wallingford Regatta the previous week, went on to win the Reading Challenge Bowl for junior fours at Reading Clinker Regatta last Saturday. Their time in their heat against Strode's School was 3min. 58sec., the fastest time for any of the 73 coxed fours taking part in the regatta.

The crew, which plans to enter for the Public Schools Fours at Marlow Regatta, consists of: V. G. S. Durman (bow), C. F. Eaton, G. T. Coulton, R. M. Shrigley (stroke) and M. J. Matthews (cox).

June 20th

After our good performance at Reading, we felt that it would not be presumption to enter for the Public Schools Fours at MARLOW REGATTA.

In our practice row there, the evening before the 1st day of the Regatta, we were caught in a torrential storm and, the next day, Shingler — who had been making several journeys to London during the previous week, to take exams — had a fairly severe cold. However, in the 1st round, we beat Wellington College and the Royal L. School, High Wycombe, comfortably. In the final we met Tonbridge and our old rivals, Strode's, who took an early lead which increased to  $\frac{3}{4}$  length. We then held them and, towards the end, were going up steadily, but Strode's just managed to cross the line 2 feet ahead, with Tonbridge well back, in 3rd place. The time, 4 m. 46 secs, was the fastest for this event in 17 years.

After this, we were determined to have

another go at Strode's, at Pangbourne & Whitchurch Regatta, in the Junior 4s which Strode's had won the previous year.

## DAY FOR Rowing

### Shiplake School Shine at Marlow

The final of the public schools fours at Marlow Regatta on Saturday was fought out between Strode's, Shiplake and Tonbridge. For Strode's and Shiplake it was in the nature of a return match, since Shiplake had defeated Strode's at Reading Regatta last month and Strode's were now set to reverse the verdict.

They took an early lead and, at the six-furlong mark, had three-quarters of a length over Shiplake, with Tonbridge lying third. Shingler, the Shiplake stroke, then put in a great finishing burst which took his crew up steadily, but they just failed to catch Strode's, who got home by two feet. The time, 4min. 46sec., was the fastest for this event in seventeen years, and it reflects particular credit on Shiplake, a small school which started rowing only three years ago.

They are coached by Mr. E. M. Hall, of Henley, a member of Leander and a former captain of Selwyn College Boat Club, Cambridge, and they are entering for Pangbourne and Whitchurch Regatta next Saturday when they hope to take friendly revenge against Strode's.

On their observed rowing form we should have beaten them but, on the 5th stroke of the start, our No. 3's wheels jumped over the wooden runners of the slide and jammed. He came off his seat and, as he tried to get back on, his ~~rowing~~ rowing shorts caught in the jammed wheels and he had to stop rowing.

Later - too late - the boat was inspected by the Nautical College boatman, brother of Mr. Radley who had built the boat, and he confirmed that the wheels had far too much "play". He adjusted them all, free of charge, but this was not adequate compensation for a lost race. The whole affair, painful as it was, is best forgotten.

# Several local successes in Working Men's Regatta

WITH dark clouds hanging ominously above, local crews beat off the strong challenge of London entries and clinched nine of the 11 events in the Reading Working Men's Regatta on Saturday.

SHIPLAKE COLLEGE CREW DEFEATED

Shiplake College's crew who have had successes at a number of regattas this year, the last being at the Reading Working Men's Regatta earlier this month, were beaten by a third of a length by Berkhamstead School at the Upper Thames Schools' Invitation Regatta which was held on a reach of the Thames at Shiplake on Wednesday.

This shock win came in the final of the school fours event and it was a surprise to say the least because Shiplake beat Wednesday's victors at Marlow and Pangbourne earlier this year. However the college's crew, rowing as Shiplake "A" had rowed four races over the short course during the afternoon against Berkhamstead's three.

There was some exciting rowing and crews from eight schools, Berkhamstead, Reading Blue Coat, Royal Wanstead, Sir William Borlase's, Strode's, Sutton, Wallingford Grammar and Windsor Grammar, together with two colleges, Shiplake and Carmel, entered, necessitating 24 races.

Most of the organisation of the regatta was in the hands of the staff and pupils of Shiplake College and it is the first time that the event has been held at Shiplake. Last year the regatta was held at Carmel College. However, the duties of starters, judges, umpires and timekeepers were shared between the staff of the various schools and colleges taking part. Those from Shiplake College were Mr. M. D. Duncan (starter), Lieut.-Col. W. H. G. Travers (judge) and Mr. E. M. Hall.

One of the best races of the afternoon was a heat of the school fours between the two colleges, Carmel "A" and Shiplake "A". # MARLOW REGATTA.

We entered for the (Public) Schools Fours, in which event we had been runners-up in 1964. Strode School, last year's winners, were entered again, with two members of their winning crew still rowing for them. There were nine entries, altogether, including Tonbridge, Windsor Grammar School, Haileybury and Wellington.

In the first round we drew Strode and King Charles School, Tewkesbury, who came with a reputation of four regatta wins already gained during the season.

We rowed at 10.30 am. on Sat. June 19th (Founders' Day), on the Berks station. There was a brisk cross-wind, from the Bucks side. We had a rather poor start and lost ground, but made it up quite soon when we got into our stride. At the Church, all three crews were overlapping, but we were about  $\frac{1}{2}$  length in front. It was a hard race from there, but we held on and gradually increased our lead to win by about 1 length in 5m. 1 sec.

The final was rowed at 5.55 pm.

and the other finalists were Tonbridge and Royal Grammar School, High Wycombe. Again we had not a very good start but drew up and away fairly soon afterwards, winning by  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lengths from Tonbridge, with R.G.S. High Wycombe a few feet behind Tonbridge. We were on the Bucks station and the time was 5.05. (Times generally were slower in the evening.)

This was a very fine achievement by a light crew (av. wt. about 10 stone 4 lbs), with a heavy (but clever!) cox — about 8½ stone — and a young stroke (Lester, just over 16). The crew was keen, determined, and willing to learn : they did not quarrel or argue, and it was a pleasure to coach them. Their reward — and mine — was to win a much-coveted trophy, dating back to 1879, that had been won in the past by such long-established schools as King's, Canterbury, Winchester, Cheltenham and Monkton Combe, and which used to be competed for at Henley Royal Regatta.

# THREE LOCAL CREWS WIN AT MARLOW

THERE were three local successes at Marlow Regatta last Saturday, and in face of such strong opposition, the winners are all to be congratulated.

**Shiplake College**, runners-up in the Schools' Cup for fours last year, went one better by winning the event.

In their first heat, **Shiplake** finished  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lengths ahead of King Charles I School, Kidderminster and Strode's School (The holders) and then won

by the same margin in the final, against the Royal Grammar School (High Wycombe) and Tonbridge School in a time of 5 minutes.

Their steering in the final, however, was not good and they were lucky to escape disqualification for "interference."

The winning crew was M. Crowder, J. Turner, C. Eveleigh, R. Lester and M. Matthews.

**Michael Muir-Smith**, Marlow's Cambridge Blue, won the senior sculls. He was rowing in the colours of Christ's College, Cambridge and it was his first success in the senior class.

**Eton Excelsior** took the Town Cup fours for the first time since it was made a "coxless" race. They rowed extremely well throughout, and had to row five times to win the event.

In this event, **Reading University** received a bye through the preliminary round when Thames "B" withdrew, but they were beaten in the first round by Isis "A" by  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lengths.

**Marlow**, who had won the trophy for the past two years, beat Glasgow University by  $\frac{1}{4}$  lengths in their first heat, but lost by  $\frac{1}{2}$  length to NP Bank in their second race, whilst **Maidenhead** fell to Twickenham by  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lengths in their first heat.

**Wallingford** received a bye through the first round, and they beat Jesus College "A" in their next race by four lengths before being beaten by Quintin by  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lengths.

**Sir William Borlase's School** won a heat of the junior eights when they beat Thames by three feet with **Abingdon School** in third place, but they lost in the semi-final to Berkhamstead School and Bedford. The latter had beaten **RMA (Sandhurst)** in their heat by  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lengths.

**Wallingford** finished third in their heat of the coxed fours behind Nautilus and St. Mark's School (USA), whilst the Marlow double, R. Markwell and M. Spracklen, again found the Leander pair, N. Cooper and R. Carpmael, too strong for them in the double sculls.

## PANGBOURNE REGATTA

The annual Pangbourne Regatta takes place tomorrow (Saturday), and as usual, most of the local clubs have entered crews.

Both Reading University and the Nautical College will be rowing in the junior eights with RMA Sandhurst, and the University will also be taking part in the maiden eights.

**Reading R.C.**, **Reading School** and **Shiplake** head the local entry for the maiden fours.

Racing begins at 10 am, and will go on until about 7 pm.

23rd June NATIONAL SCHOOLS RECATTA, Pangbourne.

No papers were received from Mr. Desmond Hill about this regatta, and so we were unaware that, unlike the previous year, a school's Marlow Four was not debarred from competing. So, by telephone, we entered our B crew. Twelve crews were entered for this fours event; there were three heats; first two in each heat to semi-finals; first two in each semi-final to final.

In the 1st heat, Becket School were 1st, we were 2nd, with King's Rochester 3rd & Winchester A 4th.

In the semi-final we were again 2nd, with Latymer Upper 1st and Cornell 3rd.

In the final, we were 4th, behind Becket (1st) Latymer (2nd) and St. Mungo's, Glasgow (3rd).

In reporting this event for the "Daily Telegraph", Desmond Hill seemed to imply that our crew was our winning crew at Marlow, for he wrote that "any one of the first three crews could have won at Marlow". A letter of remonstrance was sent to him, to which he replied that

he wrote "could" not "would", and that he did not say "this year"! Our reply to Mr. Hill questioned whether he could have seen every crew that had ever rowed in this event throughout its long history!

## KINGSTON WIN TWO EVENTS AT STAINES REGATTA

From Our Rowing Correspondent

Kingston, taking the junior-senior eights and junior sculls, were the only club to win two events at Staines Regatta on Saturday. Perhaps this was some consolation for the failure of their senior eight, which seems to have lost its pace unaccountably after a promising early season. They were left trailing by Upper Thame in their heat of the senior eights, and Upper Thame were later beaten decisively by London R.C. in the final.

Staines were fortunate in the weather, for the first drops of rain did not fall until the last race had begun. But conditions were bad for rowing, for there was a strong head wind and the water was uncomfortably rough. The committee had their worries, too, for their intended enclosure on the Surrey bank was levelled with a bulldozer a few days earlier, and turned into a morass by the heavy rain, so that they were forced to transfer at the last minute to the Middlesex side of the river, which offers virtually no view of the racing.

### TOWN LINK

The regatta had an international flavour with entries from the Société Nautique de la Marne, who have a town link with Staines, and also from Minden and Mülheim, in Germany. Minden were put out of the junior fours by two feet by Shiplake Vikings, who went on to beat Staines by three-quarters of a length in the final. Mülheim also went out in an early heat. But Marne came through to a popular victory in the junior senior fours against Thames Tradesmen.

In the junior eights Kingston rowed a dead heat with Canford School, beating them by three-quarters of a length in the re-row, and then proceeded to dead-heat again with Weybridge in the final. This was too

much for them, and they lost the second re-row by three lengths, though this verdict seemed to be on the uncharitable side.

There was yet another dead-heat in the semi-final of the Staines Sculls, between P. Barry, the younger brother of W. L. Barry, the present amateur champion, and R. J. Harris. Barry did not seem to relish the re-row and was beaten by three-quarters of a length. Harris went on to win the final from J. A. Hamilton.

"Where have all the senior scullers gone?" might well be the theme song of the senior sculling since Henley. And the answer would presumably be that they have gone back to rowing, "long time ago". Certainly, it is a long time since we have had such poor entries for this class. One who has reaped the benefit is the veteran, M. A. Spracklen, who beat P. Jennings for the second week in succession on Saturday. Spracklen, of course, is an artist, and remembering how he came through the rough water on Lake Padarn to win the Empire Games double sculls title in 1958, it was no surprise to see him pull away from Jennings.

Whilst all this was going on, our A crew had been sitting at the start, waiting for Berkhamsted A crew.

Eventually, the ~~start~~ starter (and convenor, Mr. Allen of R.B.S.) told our A Crew that they would be awarded the race on a "row over". Our A crew beat Ormiston in the 1st round by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  l., + Midland Bank in the second round by 4 l. They then met, in the semi-final, the German crew from Minden : Ruderverein am Stattl.

Besselgymnasium, a strong-looking crew which had won their heats convincingly.

We drew the less favourable station, the Middlesex one, which got less of the stream. The German crew led from the start and by half-way had almost a length and a half. We then began

steadily to reduce the lead. We were level 100 yards from the finish and nosed in front to win by 3 feet. a truly tremendous race, in a gusty head/cross wind, that reflected great credit on our crew, and particularly to our Lester, the stroke.

The Germans seemed both surprised and impressed by our victory, and their coach gave us his name and address and said that they would like to bring a crew over to race us at Shiplake at Whitsun, 1966. (He is :- Oberstudienrat Erich Dömeier.)

In the final, we beat the Home Club, Staines, in 4.36, by  $\frac{3}{4}$  l., this time being the same as that for the race against the Germans, though the wind was a little less strong.

We had had 4 races between 2 pm. and 7.20 pm., the last three being within the space of two hours.

The prizes were presented by Mr. R. J. Burnell, and we celebrated with a dinner at Leander Club.

So ended a glorious season, in which all our crews performed creditably, though pride of place must unquestionably go to <sup>\*</sup>the A crew. They were light (under  $10\frac{1}{2}$  stone average) but they were keen. They had an exceptionally fine stroke in R. Lester, and a shrewd, experienced cox in Mr. H. Matthews. They responded intelligently to coaching, they never quarrelled and they always ~~too~~ raced with tremendous spirit. They were a ~~bad~~ fine example of the doctrine that a good crew is something more than the mere total of its component parts.

The Times obituary of Field-Marshal Sir William Robertson, C.I.G.S. 1915/17, states:- "He was not a genius, except in Carlyle's definition ('an infinite capacity for taking pains'). --- What he did, any man or boy of ordinary attainments can do also, provided that he is willing to make the necessary sacrifices of immediate leisure and comfort." — It is probable

that several members of the Boat Club surprised themselves by what they were able to achieve when they really tried: the value of this discovery extends beyond the bounds of rowing. [For "Final" part of E. M. Hall]

C.M.C. IV. St. Edwards School have a v. good C.M.C. IV this year of whom IV rowed in this event. They beat us by 2 lengths between 8 & 12 seconds faster than other crews.

June 4th

### Walton Regatta

The 1st IV only, went to Walton to compete in the new Cadet IV's. Having had little trouble with Weybridge on Friday night we could not beat St. Georges "A" on the Sat. afternoon. They led us from the start and eventually won by 2 lengths. I think again it would be true to say we were the 2nd crew in the event but of course you have to be first to win.

### Oxford City Regatta

The 2nd IV and C.M.C. IV both competed here. 2nd IV really started racing. They beat ~~Falcon RC~~ (1<sup>l</sup>) and The Lays ( $\frac{3}{4}$  l) in their first two rounds but succumbed to Coward in the 4 final.

Cat 15. Drawn first against St. Edwards we were fortunate to have a R.O. instead. A very doubtful disqualification in the next round put us out after winning by at least  $\frac{1}{2}$  lengths. Same sort of thing against Wellington & Berkhamsted in the next round but we couldn't quite pull it off — lost by 4 ft to Wellington. Wellington were slowest of 3 in the final. The event was won by Eastbourne over Hatfield Upper — Eastbourne — particular were very big lad. This event has taken on new proportions since last year, attracting 15 entries including some schools who had

been away from it for a year or two. (eg Becket, Berkhamsted, Latymer Upper, Eastbourne, etc).

June 22nd

National Schools Regatta

(1st round) Having been last at the halfway signal we pulled through to 2nd place behind Latymer, beating George Watson's and Reading Blue Coat. A slight misunderstanding of the re-purchase system made us hold back - otherwise we might have won this round. We were through to the next round - beat up against two winning crews Eastbourne and Aberdeen. This was much faster than other half of the draw. Eastbourne won final against Aberdeen by 1 foot - Latymer 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  lengths behind. King's Rochester were fourth by a further length. We were worth a place in the final here but missed it by a miscalculation. We have definitely improved our standing in this event - we were 4 lengths behind the winners last year, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  strengths this year and the standard is rising.

June 7th v. Carmel & Berkhamsted at Carmel

Of the six races in which we took part we won

none but 4 of the verdicts were by less than half a canvas (!) lack of knowledge of the course combined with little rest between races did not help us and the rowers looked rather taken unawares. By this time N.C.P. had built up a lead which was nearly pulled back in the last stages of the race. The umpire was quite unconcerned by the whole affair - it was the last race of the day and he obviously wanted to waste no more damping time!

## 9th July

### Reading Town Regatta (Formerly Reading Working Men's Regatta)

6 Members of the first 2 crews took part in Local Non States Pairs (Clinker - coxed). They found this event distinctly harder work & more complicated than they had imagined it would be.

Clayton & Pyper put up a remarkably good performance to come 2nd in the final.

The crews were less successful than in the past 2 or 3 years but this was not surprising since:

- a) The 1st crew was competing after a break of higher standard than before.
- b) The 2 senior IV's contained 3 boys of Colts age caused by the large exeat of the previous year and bad planning of the lower part of the boat club.
- c) only 1 member of the 2nd IV had ever been coached, or had ever raced before this term again, bad planning.

We must try in future to prevent such things occurring again.

Considering the fact that 3 Colts were already competing in higher crews a special mention should be made of the ~~Colts crews~~ which were both ~~competing against competition~~ more Colts IV. For the attention of the Games Committee

I wish to make some changes in the constitutions of the House Rowing. The reasons for these proposed changes are twofold:

(a) We now have more boats and therefore more scope.

(b) To fit in more closely with the policy for School Rowing that G.W.W. and I have agreed, I should like to deal with the 2nd reason first. If, as we hope, the School is to acquire one or more Eights in the future, it is essential that we should be able to coach at least 2 Colts IVs each year so that there are enough boys with Open Regatta experience to fill a 1st VIII and possibly a Senior IV the next year. This in turn means that we need to be able to select 8 Colts out of 16 of the previous years' Juniors. The more racing and coaching they get as Juniors the better. To this end each House has at present a Junior League IV. It is not possible for us (G.W.W. and M.D.D.) to give these boys coaching at the moment, but if these Crews can be kept together for the House Rowing, we shall be able to do so for the fortnight after School Rowing stops (June 25th). I would therefore like to propose the following age limit: Seniors 15 or over on 1st September of Juniors Under 15 on 1st September <sup>previous</sup> year

This has the added advantage of dividing the Boat Club almost exactly into 2 equal parts. This means that all Seniors and Colts will be classed as Seniors for House Rowing - if a House has a lot of School Rowers, there will be plenty of opportunity for them as there would be a IV's, pairs and sculls competition in each age group.

No boy should compete out of his age group and no boy should compete in more than one event /These latter statements do not apply to Coxes who may wish to scull as well in their own age group. If possible, Coxes should cox either IVs or pairs, but not both, or this will make it very difficult to fit races in without delays.

The Shields will be competed for on a Points system:

The positions can easily be worked out by taking the time by which one Crew beats another rather than full time as weather conditions may make a big difference over the whole course, but will make very little difference over the short period taken by the 2nd Crew to finish the Course. Any Crew disqualified obtains no points. In the unlikely event of a tie, the House with the faster IV will be considered the winner

## Winter Term 1966

A little tubbing and Sculling was done on Tuesday afternoons but it was of little value. Its main purpose was to give the coaches an opportunity to see some of the boys with a view to investigating their availability and potential for the Lent term.

We welcome J. H. Downey to the coaching staff. He has come to take over Skipper house & the History Dept from H. E. Wells-Tudy — an excellent bargain from the rowing angle. The Seniors & Cols rowed 2 days/week in a Clinker VIII bought from St Edwards School for £125. This boat, built in 1954, is wide and stable but not very fast. The other two days/week were spent in Viking I & II (i.e. IV's). The J/cols squad used Aladdin, Viking III and the Clinkers Smelling Boats.

The VIII boated from Upper Thames R.C. as at this juncture we have neither boating nor Landing Stage facilities for such a boat. During the latter part of this term Colonel W.H.C. Travers and a small squad of boys built a very fine Landing Stage for the VIII which will very considerably relieve congestion in the summer term. Despite high water during the term we were able to boat at all times with a little ingenuity.

Early in the term the Cols VIII went to St Edwards for an outing but at this stage found the standard of Teddies cols VIII too much. It was suggested that another trip might be made when they would have Cols 2nd VIII a the water. This trip was made with the Seniors VIII on 7th and 4th.

Actually this provided the C.M.S. VIII with no better competition as they had not yet started to boat a C.M.S. 2nd VIII. However the Senior VIII had a good day being distinctly faster than S.E.S. 2nd VIII and having quite a good row for about 5 minutes before S.E.S. 1st VIII.

## SUMMER TERM 1968.

Every one returned and expected a vast change round amongst the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> crews. We started off on a training programme which consisted of ~~even~~ circuits and rowing. At the end of the first week Mr Duncan swapped the strokers of the first two crews. He then changed the 1<sup>st</sup> crews no. 3 and bow by letting them swap with one another. He then tried changing the bows of the two crews but didn't like it, and changed them back. After a great deal of consideration he changed the two strokers to their original positions again.

Meanwhile no 2 of the second crew had been taken ill by "chicken-pox" and had been replaced by Matthews who had come up from the colts B crew.

Training continued. The circuits worked as follows. There were a number of exercises which were done one after another. First of all we were timed at how long it took us to do a minutes worth each. e.g. In a minute a person may do 28 press-ups. After a number of different exercises, each timed for a minute, the number of repetitions were halved i.e. The person who could do 28 press-ups in a minute would find himself doing 14, in the circuits used for training.

The circuits consisted of:-

Star Jumps; Press-ups; knees Touch; Bumpees; Step-ups; Chin-ups  
Elbows to knees; Pull-ups

For example one person would do a number of each, three times round, in a short a time as possible.

E.g. a good number of each exercises were

All these 3 times ~~make~~ round would take about 14 minutes.

We had our first race against Berkhamsted on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> May. Of course it was raining and the order of rowing was Junior colts, colts, 2<sup>nd</sup> crew and then the 1<sup>st</sup> crew.

The first race was very exciting and the crews evenly matched. Unfortunately a member of the Shiplake crew came off his stroke and the race was lost by about 3 feet.

The colts won easily by 5 lengths with a good stride. The 2<sup>nd</sup> crew had an equally good race and again won by 1½ lengths.

The 1<sup>st</sup> crew started off level with their opponents and over the course ~~had~~ crept up to win by a length.

The following two weeks we concentrated on training hard with circuits and introduced a new method in the fours called repetitions. These would take the form of paddling hard at around 30 - 33 ratings, for a distance of approximately 500 yards. To begin with we did 8 of these repetitions.

The training programme would be as follows and would be renewed each week with slight alterations e.g. on monday the A crew may row at 5.20 pm instead of 4.20 pm.

On Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> May both the A & B crew went to row at Thames Ditton Regatta. From beginning to very nearly the end it rained. The river bank was ankle deep in mud and everything and body was soaked. At 3.10 pm the A crew were to row Reading Blue Coats but shortly after we arrived P. Kingstone was asked by their captain whether or not he thought it was worth racing. P. Kingstone agreed that it wasn't so that meant that we went straight into the Semi-Finals. At 3.15 pm the B crew rowed St Georges Weybridge. It was a close race but unfortunately the result was that St. Georges won by 2 lengths. This meant St Georges were in the Semi-Finals as well.

The A crew were due to row at 5.20 pm against St Georges. Owing to the fact it was raining still at 3.20 pm after the B crew had rowed, the A crew went back to the school van in which we had come to keep out of the rain and mud. By 5.00 the rain was down to a slight drizzle so we left the van crossed the ferry, an old barge worked by passengers pulling on the rope which guided it, onto Cigarette Island from where the boats were kept and the changing tents set up.

We made our way down to the start and prepared ourselves for the row which was about 6 furlongs ( $\frac{3}{4}$  mile). We had a good beginning and

an extremely good race. At half way point we were just half a length down and, again, unfortunately (my favourite word!) did not gain the lead.

It was very close indeed and we were only beaten by half a length. St. Georges were very tired indeed, in fact so tired after being practically by two Shiplake crews, that Hampton Court Grammar School beat them by at least 5 lengths in the Finals at 6.20 pm. After this race we struck up, after disassembling the boats and loading them onto their transport home, and returned empty handed, doubly determined to gain the cup the week following at Wallingford.

Wallingford Regatta was on the following Saturday 25<sup>th</sup>. Again, of course, it was raining and to make matters worse the 1<sup>st</sup> crew had their race at 9.56 am. The 1<sup>st</sup> crew left the school at 8.30 am. The event was "Novice Fours, Div A." We were rowing against Windsor G.S. B crew. Apparently the B crew was really the A crew and it was the B crew that did so well at Putney. It was hard luck that Windsor had the break in their favour, and were able to pull up in the last part of the ~~race~~ course and win by  $\frac{1}{2}$  a length.

This was very unfortunate as Windsor then beat Reading School by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lengths after winning their race with Wallingford School by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lengths. In the Finals.

Neptune R.C. won easily against Windsor.

The B crew arrived for their race v. R.N. Eng. Coll. B.C. I'm pleased to say that they won this by a long chalk which left them in high spirits for their next race v. Reading University B.C. This was the ~~Final~~  $\frac{3}{4}$  Final and was rowed at 3.42 pm. It was ~~a good race but~~ 3.48 pm. It was a good race with Shiplake winning by 2 lengths.

They were now in the Semi-Final and rowing Bedford R.C. at 6.12 pm. The crew kept together well but by this time they were possibly a little tired and lost with no great disgrace by 2 lengths.

Both Colts A & B were entered in the "schoolboy fours". The A crew were rowing after the B crew who happened to be rowing before the A crew, at 11.20. The B crew were rowing Nautical Coll. Daubenton and unfortunately lost by 2 lengths. Great hopes were fixed on the Colts A, rowing at 11.29 v. Kings School, Worcester B.C. The rowing altogether was very untidy and the colts lost by  $1\frac{1}{4}$ . This was probably due to "regatta panic" than anything else.

All our hopes now were bent on to John Pyper who was rowing in the Novice (sculls) Dirs. He was rowing at 4.26 pm & due to the fact that his race at 8.05 pm was cancelled, because his upper opponent could not race. The race on his behalf was a very leisurely one and through this reason, he lost.

Meanwhile it had been raining all or practically all the time so on the

whole the day was not a very pleasant one. But never - the less everyone enjoyed themselves by watching some of the better finals.

The week after Wallingford training went for the 1st three crews as usual, with circuits and 550 yard courses. These course worked so that there would be race of 550 yards and then swimming for another 550 yards and then another race, after which we turned round and did the same two going down stream. After 6 of these one began to feel rather tired, but it was certainly good training.

Meanwhile Mr. Drury had his squad training hard in the new sculls. Though at first this seemed rather stupid, as most people thought that the juniors would break them up, they ~~soon~~ tended to do well and no one complained.

The next regatta Shiplake were entered for was Reading Amateur Regatta, which was held on 1<sup>st</sup> June. It was a glorious day, and in fact the best regatta day there had been for the whole season. Large numbers of people turned up to see the racing. We entered five crews; a fair number for Shiplake. J Pyper was going to scull in the novice sculls, but owing to the disastrous results in the previous regatta he thought he had scratch from the race (needed a bath!).

The 1<sup>st</sup> A + B crews left at 9.00 am for their races which were at 10.40 and 10.10 respectively. The 3<sup>rd</sup> crew was to row later at 12.30 so therefore had to attend the first two lessons and were collected at 10.30. The colts A came at 9.00 with the first crews while these B crew were picked up by Mr Duncan, after lunch for rowing at 3.00 pm.

The first race was at 10.05 with the 1<sup>st</sup> B crew against City University. They wondered what the result would be as Shiplake had not come up against them before but the result was a 4 length win for the B crew.

At 10.15 the Colts A crew were on the stake boats for a very exciting race between Sutton schools (Reading) and Kingston Grammar school. The Colts were rowing in "SAM" and at about the  $\frac{3}{4}$  mark they ran into swan trouble. In fact this swan seemed to spend its time that day becoming entangled in blades. So shiplake

from half a length down made a final gallant effort and won by a canvas. This was a very close thing, but certainly made moral rise.

10.40 was the time for the 1<sup>st</sup> crew to race Sir. Wm. Borlase's School in the Novice Fours B event. This was an easy race with an easy win in the time of 4.13 mins.

At 12.30 the 3<sup>rd</sup> crew raced against St. George's College. This was one of the closest races of the day. At about 50 yards from the finishing post a crab was caught in the Shiplake Four which probably caused them to loose by the canvas that they did.

The next Shiplake event was at 3.00 pm. with the Cobts B rowing Berkhamsted and Eastbourne. That day seemed to be full of close races as Shiplake again came up to win by a canvas.

We now had four crews still in the running. The afternoon was spent in a leisurely fashion, sitting in the shade ~~at~~ watching the races. For us no. things began to move at 5.25 when the Cobts A had their next race. This time it was against South Hackney school where the Cobts won by 4 lengths. It was putting

Hemselves in the Final.

Ten minutes later at 5.35 the colts B had a hard race against Abingdon but unfortunately lost by 3 lengths.

6.00 produced bad results for the 1<sup>st</sup> crew who rowed Abingdon. Abingdon pulled away at the start and maintained a lead of about 1½ lengths and went on to win by 1¼ lengths in the time 4.07 mins. That was the Semi Finals. Abingdon went to win the Finals by a length against R.M.A and Guildford in 4.01.

The 1<sup>st</sup> B crew rowed well in their Semi Finals and won by 4 lengths over Sir. Wm. Borlase.

In the Colts Fours ~~the~~ Finals at 7.00 the Shiplake crew came in 3<sup>rd</sup> having been beaten by Abingdon and St. Georges, who won by 1½ lengths.

At 7.30 everyone waited in a tense atmosphere as the time drew on for the Finals of the Novice Fours A event. Myself and Peter Kingstone were on the umpires launch and had a very good view. Everyone had a good start and all through the race everyone was level. Eastbourne nearly won and would have if their cox could steer as well as Lester did. Consequently we won by 2 feet. Very close indeed. The Cup was very large but

Abingdon wanted to have it for a dinner  
they were having in a couple of nights time  
so as they won the toss they took it home. very  
annoying. They said that we could have it on  
the next Saturday, for the 6 months. This means  
we could have it for founders day. It was  
gigantic.



The following Thursday was the beginning of the school half term. The 1<sup>st</sup> two crews had volunteered & wanted to race at Oxford City regatta. The half term began on Thursday at 8.0 am so the two crews stayed for an outing. In the last week we had been doing 6x500\* sprint races. We did six of these and left for home at 12.00 pm, those who lived too far away stayed with those who lived closer at hand. We were due back at 6.00 pm on the following day (Friday).

We, that is all who were coming back, arrived at 6.00 pm, or there abouts, in time for supper. After supper there was a short outing.

The following morning everyone was set for an early start. After loading the boats we left for OXFORD ROYAL REGATTA. That was Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> June. The weather was overcast with just a little wind, in fact very good rowing weather. We had plenty of time to unload and rig the boats as our first race was to be at 1.09 pm. The B crew were rowing against Oundle School "A" crew. I did not see the actual race as the A crew had to be on the water so as to be in plenty of time

to be at the start for their race at 1.39 pm.  
The B crew won easily in a time of 4.01.  
The A crew were now to row Imperial College.  
As time drew near for the race there was still  
no sign of Imperial. Consequently we had a  
row over which is probably more terrifying than  
actually rowing, as there is so much waiting  
around.

The next race the B crew had was against  
Berkhamsted School, whom they had already beaten  
previously in the term. This was at 3.00 pm  
and they won by 2 lengths. At 3.45 Shiplocke  
A crew were rowing Caltham College.

It is a great advantage to have the  
inside of the bend on the Oxford course and  
~~luckily~~ for our next race we had. Against  
Caltham it was a neck and neck race to  
the corner, but after that we pulled away  
to win by about 2½ lengths. At the end of  
the day I talked to Mr Harris, the yard  
that built "SAM". He told me that towards the  
finals nearly 70% of crews win on the inside  
lane and that the crew on the outside  
can be going faster than the one on the inside,  
but still loose!

The next race for the B crew would be

a hard one. It was against Thames Trademen. At 5.12 both crews were on the start.

Thames Trademen were on the Oxon (outside) station and Shiplake on the Berks (inside) station.

The starters flag ~~was~~ was raised, it dropped, they were off. The Trademen kept level at the start but began to pull away before the bend. Here they maintained their lead and took further distance after the corner to win with a time of 3.50.

At 5.33 pm Shiplake A crew were rowing Lincoln College A. This time Shiplake were on the outside station. The idea was to make a dash for the bend and lead by a length, loose it on the bend and pull up again at the finish. This didn't quite work and we came up to the bend level. We certainly lost our planned length on the corner and tried extremely hard to catch up again. At the finish it was very close. The final verdict was lost by  $\frac{1}{3}$  of a length. It was very close indeed. The time was ~~was~~ 3.47. Both crews lost in the Semi ~~final~~ final again, but it was still an enjoyable day. After the boats had been loaded most people went home again with their parents who had been watching the racing.

For the next two weeks our training programme was interrupted by regattas. In the first week we concentrated mainly on long outings trying to ~~develop~~ develop technique. These would take the form of long pieces of paddling with one hand and no feathering etc.

In the second week we did short courses of approximately 300'. After doing 8 of these we either felt fit or dead. This was in aid of quicker rating. By this way a higher rating was developed for racing.

Pangbourne National Schools Regatta was on Sat 22<sup>nd</sup> June. This is one of the larger local regattas and this year it was dominated by Radley and Eton who both had in the region of 12 crews each rowing. The weather wasn't much help either with a constant heavy drizzle rowing harder at times.

In the first round at 12.20 Shiplake A were racing Hatchetox's, Tonbridge and Windsor. The winner was Windsor in 4.20 followed by Hatchetox's, Tonbridge, Shiplake. It was a very close race for 3<sup>rd</sup> place but Tonbridge

made it by 1 ft!

Five minutes later at 12.25 Shiplake B raced Eastbourne, Wellington and Millfield. Shiplake coming 3<sup>rd</sup> in the order just given. That time was 4.16.

Both crews had another race due to the Repechage System. So at 3.20 Hutcherson's raced with Shiplake A and Shiplake B. The result was in the order given with  $\frac{1}{2}$  a length difference between all crews. This meant that both the A & B crews were out but it did show that the A crew was just that little bit faster!

On the Friday before the colts raced an ~~II~~ against Bedford and Radley B. The following day they were in the Repechage though coming 3<sup>rd</sup>, but unfortunately came 4<sup>th</sup> in their last race.

The day on the whole was pretty terrible, with a very high wind and rather a close atmosphere.

The following week we prepared for our last regatta. It was Pangbourne and Wiltshire held at the Child-Batle Trust Estate as was Pangbourne National Schools. The crews that went from Shiplake were: Shiplake "A & B"; Colts A, B & C. The 3<sup>rd</sup> crew were to race but owing to ~~the~~ number 2 in that crew damaging his ~~own~~ ~~Foxstar~~ Player, they were unable to do so.

The first Shiplake race was at 10.25 with the A crew racing High W. B.C. B crew, R.M.A. Sandhurst and Southampton Coalporters. We came first with High W second and S'ton Coalps third as R.M.A. dropped out owing to a broken oar.

At 12.45 the Colts A & C raced Nautical C. Pang. and Windsor Gram. S. Nautical College came first, closely followed by Shiplake A then Shiplake C, followed by Windsor. In the next race at 1.55 Shiplake Colts B came 2<sup>nd</sup> beaten Emmanuel. Followers up were Abingdon and Sir William. B.S.

3.00 pm was a winning time for Shiplake A as they came 1<sup>st</sup> followed by Harrington, Cygnet and S'Coalps. This put us in the Finals at 5.25.

At 2.30 Shiplake Cotts beat Sir William B.S. and Twickenham R.C. Shiplake "B" came 3rd and beat Abingdon Nautical College crew First and beat Kingston Gram. S. This was at 4.10. At 4.15 South Hackney were beaten by Shiplake C who were in turn beaten by Shiplake A again. Emmanuel won once more. In the Cotts Finals at 6.35 Emmanuel won beating Nautical College, Kingston and Shiplake, in that order.

In the Finals 5.25 it was a very close race indeed. Hannington beat us, Shiplake A. Reading University who in turn beat High Wycombe.

The 1<sup>st</sup> B crew managed to go straight to the final at 6.45. In fact there were only three crews racing St Edwards B and A both failed to turn up and so were scratched. In this race Windsor beat Shiplake and Wellington who came 2<sup>nd</sup> equal.

So in fact the last regatta wasn't too bad. In fact it was most enjoyable. The weather was for once, just right and everyone thought that the beer tent was worth while!






