## Cricket Season at the College

As Shiplake's original Master i/c Cricket, the 1st XI's season, I can report, was good to watch. Anthony Hall took 9 wickets in one match and scored a fast hundred in the next. We were soundly defeated twice but won more matches than any previous first. The side finished strongly in the last three fixtures against adult elevens - the Berkshire Gents, the Free Foresters and the OVS. The OVS have dominated the 1st XI during the 1980s but this will be a thing of the past unless OVs can find three or four bowlers who bowl regularly once a week in club cricket. Our wickets are so true, it is not likely you will endanger any batsman here.

#### Old Viking Rowing on Spring Bank Holiday 1990

This crew included two Governors John Turner and Dick Lester plus Christopher Eveleigh and Martyn Crowder. His twin Graham also turned out, with Peter Hinton in support.

## Interim Financial Report

Bound to be spent:  $\pounds1,000$  a year on newsletter printing and postage, plus paying for secretarial help, meals and OVS Day expenses. (Note the College helps us by not charging for keeping our accounts and we are never charged for use of facilities.)

Special Reserve: £4,000 plus interest to pay for the once every five years special gatherings - next one due in 1994.

Present balance: Approx. £10,000 in Post Office savings - from this reserve OVS can help the school with improvements like the gateway we provided.

The overall picture was described by David Dalzell as "The first good financial news he had come across anywhere in 1990!".

CCF is now under Mr. Peter Webb (rank Major) and Mr. Lowry has taken over the Royal Navy section.

#### **General News**

<u>Chapel</u> - The Sunday Morning Service, most frequently a Sung Eucharist is always in the Great Hall. We began to use the Barn in the mid 1960s. However, it was always crowded but it did have an atmosphere that people got quite fond of. There are problems in getting the Hall ready after breakfast but we do have room for parents and guests. The lecturn and desk given in memory of David Skipwith are still in use.

<u>CCF</u> - The Fourth Form (in mufti) spend a year on outward bound type training. The result is that cadets spend less of their service in uniform. The C.O. is now Peter Webb.

The Rugby Club - Up to eleven sides playing - got an encouraging report in the Times on 2nd February under the heading "Everything Shipshape at Shiplake". We had the best ever results playing other 1st XVs and won the Oxfordshire Senior Cup defeating our old rivals Henley College - the latest name of Henley Grammar School and King James! Just as pleasing was the U.15 draw in the final against Radley. We share the Cup for six months each.

Novice players are endangered and for the moment Shiplake House matches are played as "Sevens". As a once novice schoolboy I would never have got better (from House leagues to knock-out House matches to School XV) if I had to be protected from playing against better players. ## SHIPLAKE'S FIRST U.18 ENGLAND CAP FOR D.M.E. RICHARDS

Everyone at Shiplake in the Autumn of 1984 and since will remember Dan Richards. He arrived as a very young third former full of energy and notable for his size and outgoing personality.

We have had a small number of U.16 group trialists including Dan himself but he is to be congratulated on being the first to go onto full international schoolboy selection at U.18. He played against Wales, Scotland and Ireland but was the victim of a stomach bug which forced him out of the team against France.

## Mr. A.P. Goodwin (an Honorary OV)

## A MESSAGE FROM THE HEADMASTER

Shiplake College has come a long way in thirty years. The twentieth century venture of faith in a nineteenth century setting is now heading rapidly for the next millenium. We have some of the most modern boarding houses in the country. Our Sports Hall, Squash Courts and Tennis Courts are the envy of the schools with which we compete. We have a Boat House bursting with modern equipment. The recent Shiplake 900, son et Lumiere, showed off the wide variety of dramatic, artistic and musical talent within the College.

But it seemed to me on arrival at Shiplake that something essential was still missing. It did not take me long to realise that in the expansion of the eighties we had done little to improve our teaching spaces. Classrooms are shared by many masters. Boys and staff bustle to and fro between lessons. We manage splendidly but this does not make for good learning or teaching. Staff need their own rooms in a good school. As well as this, CDT - the rising subject of the eighties and nineties - is woefully undercatered for and our Art Department is desperately cramped. Meanwhile, the English Department has no place at all, it is arguably the most important department in the College but lacks a Headquarters.

Thus the need for the new building. Within it there will be three new labs for the physicists and these are right next door to the present Science building. All the Science teachers will have their own laboratories. On the first floor, above the Physics labs, there will be four new classrooms for Mathematics and alongside them a new Computing Centre. At the Orchard end of the building, Graphics and Technology will have a large, open workspace above the splendid new workshop for CDT - Metalwork, Woodwork and Plastics. On the very top floor there will be a small flat for a caretaker and quite a large amount of storage space, again something badly needed within the school.

This development will have two important knock-on effects. Firstly, the Maths Block will be converted into an Art School with its own Exhibition Centre correctly placed near the Design Rooms and the workshops so that these two subjects can work more closely together. Then the English Department will take over the present Art area on the far side of the Stable Yard and will gain three classrooms, storerooms, study rooms and possibly space for a small library and bookshop. The ensuing shakedown of staff in classrooms will result in almost every master having his own room.

Of course, each of these developments is very costly and while the English staff will be moving into their new area there will be little work done to tidy the place up.

It would be wonderful if we could find **sponsors** for each of these buildings and for other developments at the College. If any OV has ideas on this topic or wishes to associate himself with a particular development, I would be delighted to hear from him.

"Thirty Years On"

The pattern of a big reunion every five years is now established. In 1979 we made a special effort to say goodbye to John Eggar and then we had the Jubilee in 1984. This year's event was a great success. Tim Callingham called it "A really wonderful day" and Robin Parker said "It was the best party yet!" They surely speak for all who came; 0.V.s, their wives and children and the Hon. members.

As usual, some senior members who promised to come, did not make it on the actual day. However all years from 1959 were fairly well represented and once again some recent leavers tested the Committee's ability to cope by turning up without answering the invitation! As we try to make clear at every AGM it is the policy of the Committee to spend our reserves on bringing 0.V.s together, so that old contacts can be renewed.

Mr. Alexander Everett was here throughout the day and was able to meet some of the O.V.S. from his time.

The Committee would like to thank all those who supported their planning effort. Please tell those who missed the event what they did miss. There was a dip in support for 0.V.S. events after the 1984 Jubilee. This is rather to be expected. Autumn Dinners will be the main social event in 1990 and 91.

1988-89 was an exciting year in Shiplake's history and I hope the rest of this letter conveys some of the excitement.

On May 1st there was a Dinner for past and present Shiplake oarsmen. The main guest was the President of the A.R.A. Sam Hall and his 1964 crew were also present. Coxed by Matthews, Shingler; Eaton; Coulton and Durman had rowed again. A long outing showed that Sam had lost none of his persuasion and the crew none of their spirit or skill. It was a special day for Malcolm Shingler as he was one of the original 30 exactly 30 years earlier. Victor Durman had flown in from Vancouver to make sure the reunion was complete. All agreed that rowing had given them the determination they had lacked on leaving prep school.

Before going onto the dramatic last day of the School Year, I must stress that <u>88-89 was a vintage year</u>. 'A' Level <u>results</u> remained consistently high and staff and fifth formers have get GCSE demands well under control. Last Autumn's <u>1st XV</u> were a powerful side and several schools faced us with some apprehension. Hockey gained tremendously from the new all weather surface and almost all the

fixtures were played in bright January and February weather. Only the O.V. fixtures were badly affected by sodden pitches. In summer the new surface turned into Tennis courts and the match results were impressive. The 1st XI went through the cricket season undefeated by other schools. Cricket was the only sport in which O.V.S. defeated the college. In all sports Junior teams were of a high standard.

On the river most of our crews looked fast but the summer had several disappointments. All these were set aside during Henley week. The 1st VIII defeated three American crews and then eliminated Winchester to reach the final for the first time. They had the most tremendous support from local residents. The opponents in the final were Hampton who had defeated Eton. In the final we led till Fawley and now hold the record for the first half of the course. Hampton finally got home by a length breaking the record by 10 seconds. This makes us the second fastest school crew ever and in a time that would have won the Grand Challenge Cup a few years earlier! The annoying thing is that such a splendid race did not rate a paragraph in any of Monday morning's rowing reports. In the semi final we beat Westminster.

In the last week of May there was a pageant directed by Malcolm Woodcock. The object was to celebrate 30 years of Shiplake College and a hundred years since the present Shiplake Court was built. We did so by going back to the Domesday Book and getting back to the 19th Century via Medieval pageantry and Civil War battles. Victorian and Edwardian country life was recreated before Shiplake College was launched to music from West Side Story. The old building was given a splendid birthday party and your editor made his debut as a writer of drama.

## New Building

When you come down the drive in 1991 a new building will face you. Hopefully it will meet most of our educational needs until the new century....more details in the next letter. The high wall in front of the Labs has been taken down and the new block will encroach slightly onto the main field. Having played in the first cricket match on the main field, it was appropriate that I was organising a private match there the day before work began. In some ways it was the end of an era but I am sure most members will like the final result.

## Bits and Pieces

The path down to the river has been tarred and a good gravel area spreads out in front of the Boat Houses. At the end of the hot spell everything was parched but no real damage has been done. Three of the cedars in front of the Court look very poorly but this is due to old age and not to drought. The cedars along the main road are in fine fettle. Talking of trees the cricket bat willows planted upstream 20 years ago have been felled.....it is hoped they contribute to the revival of English cricket.

## Summer Ball

The Ball Committee welcome support from O.V.S. but you must apply to get on the mailing list now. Inquiries after mid-April in any year are a waste of time. All tickets are gone by then. The committee can always sell returned tickets, so you risk very little by sending in your cheque in early April. Future Dates: The only enclosure is our "Fixture Card" for the next two years. Please retain for reference.

You will see we are planning to improve the end of the Cricket/Tennis Day in the summer. There will be a barbeque (and Bar!) for O.V.S. and Home Teams and for their families AND FOR OTHER O.V.S WHO BOOK IN ADVANCE OR EARLIER ON THE DAY. More details of times in the next newsletter.

Society Officials: The Committee have asked Rodney Davies to continue as Chairman until 1991. David Dalzell has been elected Vice Chairman, with a view to his being Chairman from 1991-94. This would involve presiding over the next Big Day when the College reaches 35 years in 1994. He will also have to find the next Hon. Secretary.

Rodney is to be congratulated on the birth of a son and heir George.

For those interested the Big Day this year cost 0.V.S. funds about  $\pounds 3,500$  - about  $\pounds 5.50$  for each person there. These events are paid for by the Committee setting aside capital each year and the interest earned is also spent on entertainment. We have  $\pounds 4,000$  in reserve towards 1994.

## AUTUMN NEWSLETTER 1987

Many of you will have seen in the press that our Headmaster since 1979 Mr. Peter Lapping has been appointed Head of Sherborne School, Dorset from September 1988. He and Mrs. Lapping will be much missed when they leave us at the end of their ninth year. Being invited to take over a boarding school of 650 re-founded in 1550 is a recognition of what he has achieved here and is also a tribute to the growing repute of Shiplake College.

I am sometimes asked "Don't you find this This is my tenth newsletter. twice a year effort a bore?" "Not a bit, with a captive readership of over a thousand, a supportive office and a keen committee how could I complain?" In fact, my only problem is to keep the reader interested after the first few lines. In the last newsletter I hinted at great things on the Rugby Field. Well we did - at last - win the U.18 County Cup in a stirring manner. We were generous to our opponents. The feeling of our crowd was "A side that reaches the final does not deserve to be beaten by almost 40 points!" There was much fine running Rugby played with confidence. Towards the end we ran the ball from our own line after a kick off and scored a try without an opponent touching the ball. Two successive whistles indicated Shiplake Our U.15 drew with Radley U.15 in the Junior Cup but were Tries! eliminated as we were the home side!

Winning the Oxfordshire Cup by 38-3 underlines the progress our sport has made. The 1st VIII is automatically expected to do well at Henley, and most of our fixture lists are a good deal stronger than a few years ago. Once we only expected to play the first teams of small schools but we had problems with the second teams of bigger schools during the years when (1) our sport was developing and (2) many of my readers were helping to build up our reputation.

However, we now expect to play first v. first in all sports and there are very few easy fixtures. In 1984 our most effective Cricket XI was undefeated in school matches - losing only to the Free Foresters. Our best ever Hockey XI appeared in Spring '86 and this was followed by our best ever 1st XV in the Autumn of 1986. They lost to OVs and to the 1sts of Abingdon and Oratory. Normally we have eight rugby sides playing other schools and over seventy hockey fixtures were made last term though only about half were played during the very cold term. The 1st Squash V has been very strong and the club lost only two of the last 50 fixtures.

Your OV Gommittee is getting more involved with College life. There are to be Carcers Discussions led by Committee volunteers. The Chairman is taking over the briefings at Leavers Meetings. We hope to get more club news into the Court Magazine. For some time past news of individual members has been posted to encourage wide ambitions amongst those looking for career openings. More awareness is the general aim.

The need for space in the Big Boat House has meant the dismantling of the Training room at the far end. Oarsmen who toiled there may regret the move!

Many will remember the magnificent flowering Cherry on the way down to the Thames. In Spring '86 it was there in all its glory but this was a last effort. Leaves did not follow the blossom and so the dead tree was felled in the winter. It was about fifty years old.

We all know that Independent schools are under threat from one party that wants to abolish schools like ours. We must not ignore the possibility of a hostile government being elected. The long process of getting OVS records onto computer discs is making good progress and is past the halfway mark. We hope to make an announcement about the new address book following the Autumn 1987 Committee Meeting. This useful work has to be fitted into all the other "Shiplake Admin". To give one example - this summer A Level and 16 plus exam candidates here will be attempting over 80 different papers - this is partly because of the transition from O Level to the new GCSE. In many cases we are trying out several of the new papers set experimentally as O Levels this year. Work has begun to lay out a tennis court on the site of the Green Huts.

The kitchens are being modernised. This seems to happen about once every ten years. It is certainly the third time since I came!

Please note there is now a 15 MPH speed limit everywhere in the College Grounds. A big word of thanks goes to the very many of you who have "driven defensively" on your visits here.

In the past OVS has made useful donations to the College. Sets of blades for the 1st VIII and Chapel furnishings come to mind. We are now set for our first visible contribution in bricks and mortar. We have been planning an improvement to the main entrance since 1984. Now at last we have the money and some £4,000 which will be spent on stone name tablets reading "Shiplake College". These will be supported by a low curved wall, matching the brickwork of the Lodge and giving our main drive the elegance it has lacked till now. This gift will be recorded in a suitable way - probably on a brass plate.

I would stress that this substantial expenditure will not affect the savings we have been making towards the OVS Special Day in 1989.

# SHIPLAKE COLLEGE BOAT CLUB

Towards the end of the summer term two members of staff associated with the boat club suggested to me that it was time that we at Shiplake, in line with many other rowing schools, should suggest to old members that they found an "old boys" boat club. I was given three reasons for such a club.

- i) To allow old members of Shiplake College Boat Club and friends of the Club to keep in direct touch with the Club.
- ii) To encourage a support group for the club.
- iii) To institute a long term additional source of funds for the active club.

I repr duce the reasons in the order that they were presented to me and, in principle, I agree with them. It is reasonable that old members, who have given many hours of a dicated training, should feel they can keep in touch and should feel genuinely welcomed if they return to the boathouse for a visit.

We are very conscious of the commitment given to the club by "serving" pupils of the college. For example, by the time a member of the 1st VIII rows at Henley Royal Regatta, he will probably have rowed the equivalent of the distance between Liverpool and New York, a fair distance by anybody's standard. Is it right that we should then bid him a firm and final farewell a few weeks later after the National Championships or, in some cases, two months later after the Junior World Championships?

Many of the older rowing schools have thriving old boys' clubs. Shiplake is becoming an "older" rowing school as its record of successes proves and it is certainly now considered to be one of the established rowing schools. Did you know that during the past five years Shiplake College Boat Club has been represented at international level on eighteen occasions? Last year alone two members of the 1st VIII won gold medals at national level and at International level. Rupert de Ruig and Andrew Bizzell are rowing with the club again this year and look forward to further successes at this level. Wo other club members achieved international status last year. Charles Taylor and a recent old boy, Jeremy Stanford, represented Great Britain in the Coxed IV at the World Junior Rowing Championships where they came eleventh, in a fiercely fought competition.

Shiplake won the Senior 'C' VIII and Senior 'C' coxless pair at Evesham Regatta. We won the Senior 'B' VIII at Monmouth Regatta and at Coate Water Park where we also won elite 'B' VIII. We beat Abingdon at the National Schools' Regatta to win the Child Beale Cup for 1st VIIIs and we won the silver medals in the Junior Coxless IV event. Six Shiplake crews were entered at the National Schools' Regatta and, while we cannot report that they all won, they achieved one 1st, two 2nd, two 3rd and one 6th place, an achievement which reflects the determination of the boys and their coaches.

#### FROM THE SECRETARY

Please remember that the Rugby Match against the College is now an U.21 fixture. This was one of the Rugby Union's rulings to discourage rough play. Many Independent schools together with their old boys clubs have now abandoned these traditional matches. This seems a pity. Our experience last year was that a strong side of recent leavers was not able to defeat the College 1st XV. As far as I know there has been no OVS response to the suggestion in the last newsletter that we have a senior match the same day for those prevented from playing against the College.

## ADDRESS BOOK

This is now out of date and plans are being made to replace it ...... provided we can afford to do so.

#### FINANCES

The OVS operates on total assets of between £4,000 and £2,000: the variation is due to (a) publishing an address book or (b) spending on a special OVS Day such as the 1984 Jubilee. Our only source of income is the pound a term paid by boys during their time here. This represents good value as a life subscription, but means the OVS will never be a well off organisation. Paul Bradshaw sent me some examples of the Princeton University newsletters to provide some new ideas. At the moment we send out two newsletters a year for about £300 and keep our Admin costs to a minimum,

I would love to see OVS become a force in the land, publishing photographs and articles in regular newsletters, providing scholarships for sons of old boys, making substantial benefactions to the College. I am sure this will all come as the College reaches its half century and moves past the year 2010.

In the meantime Committee and members will have to decide if we go on as we are: relying on a modest regular subscription income and providing a contact and social organisation for former members of Shiplake College. The Alternative seems to become more commercial - upping subscriptions; running fund raising events; charging the normal prices for drinks and refreshments with the intention of building up substantial financial reserves.

My own feeling is that we should keep things simple and straightforward but we all know that shortage of cash, in every aspect of life, prevents individuals and organisations from being as effective as they should be. Perhaps we should be guided by one of John Eggar's sayings: "The aim is to get the maximum results with the minimum of fuss."?

## T FUTURE

At the next AGM the Committee will propose that Roger Harrold should be the new OVS Chairman, with Rodney Davies as Vice-Chairman. With normal good luck and good health we should thus solve our leadership problems till the start of the next decade.

#### COLLEGE NEWS

The New Burr became fully operational in January 1986 when Andrew Smail ... and his family moved into a refurbished Red House.

During the year College Squash Teams played 22 matches and won 22. Obviously this was a good year for indoor sport. Most of the Hockey fixtures at 2nd XI and below were lost. Autumn Newsletter 1985

<u>New Buildings</u>: The JCR moved to the Jubilee building last May and the shop opened in palatial new surroundings during the summer holiday visits by new parents. Burr House was just ready (I emphasise 'just') for the first day of the Autumn Term. Over 30 carpenters worked on final indoor jobs throughout the last week end of the holiday. The design, comfort and originality of the 'new' Burr are much admired. Naturally old members have mixed feelings. Envy of the space and the facilities goes with pity that the present generation seem to need such a degree of comfort.

Future Plans : A special summer gathering of OVS is planned for 1989. This will be 30 years after the College opened and exactly a century since Robert Harrison began to build the present Shiplake Court. #### MMG the Facts

He was the son of a Yorkshire Clergyman and was educated at Rossall School in Lancashire. He read English at Oriel College, Oxford. By this time he was handicapped by Polio. From 1943 - 45 he served in the Royal Navy and was proud of being "Lower Deck". Before coming to Shiplake in 1962, Mike's main teaching experience was gained at St. Andrew's, Grahamstown, S.A, and at his old school - Rossall. At Shiplake he ran Burr for 16 years and was Head of English slightly longer. He was Second Master from 1966 - 80.

His favourite poets were the Caroline group Herrick, Herbert and Vaughan. Their quiet faith appealed to Michael and he shared their outlook.

Later photographs of MMG show how he aged following the death of Heather Gilliat in 1978. His own health problems brought about an early retirement in 1981. The many who saw him at the Jubilee gathering saw how much he had changed recently. The last job he did for the College was to review "Wish and Fulfilment" for the Court. Typically, he did it with care and fairness.

#### HEW-F

In the early days MMG was president of the common room. He was also able to get down to the quarry and ran the shooting. He was a valueable stabilizing influence and I, for one, learned much about schoolmastering from him.

#### Mike Gilliat - the O.V.S.view

He had always been a staunch supporter of the OVS and was Secretary for nine years. Committee members heard of his death with great regret.

As I remember well, he set high standards in class and his precise attention to detail was brought to bear in committee work. He was always there to help if required and to listen to people's difficulties. He guided me through my early days as a new and raw committee member and gave me the confidence to take office in the Society. He took a keen interest in all OLD BOYS to see how they were managing in the "outside world".

We all remember Mike for what he did for each of us. One memory sums him up. It goes back to when Prep was in the Great Hall. He looked at the pile of books and general mess on the table in front of one particular boy and remarked "A tidy desk means a tidy mind".

It goes without saying that we have lost a valued friend and a devoted member of the OVS. He will be greatly missed. The Committee have decided to place a memorial seat at the Cricket Pavilion. That is where we could find him in the summer, during his moments of leisure.

#### The Burr House Angle: Mr Gilliat

As a naive third former, I found my Housemaster intimidating. I still see him doing house business. His red cash box and documents of state were on the desk. He sat in his green swivel chair, with his stick hanging from the back. The stare he gave me seemed to sum me up at a glance! Later we found that this daunting facade hid a very humourous, understanding and compassionate man. During my last year he showed the first two qualities at prefects meetings. For some reason two of us had developed the habit of breaking into fits of giggles. Instead of condemning such frivolity, he was the third to laugh. In fact, this happened at every meeting during the summer term.

His compassion and sensitivity were laid bare for all to see on the last day of the summer term in 1978. His lovely wife, Heather, had died during the previous night and he wanted to tell the house. As he came into the day room his face explained the depth of the tragedy to the most emotionally unaware, even before he could tell us what had happened.

The next few years were a purgatory for him. I did not see him for the first eight months of 1983. When we did meet in the September of that year, he was a changed man. The old glint of life had reappeared in his eyes. We hoped he would have a long retirement, but it was not to be. Always cheerful, blunt, somehow abusive in an uninsulting manner, it was a joy to see him and that is a pleasure I'm saddened to lose.

#### M.M.Gilliat .....Englishman

....He is an Englishman! For he himself has said it And it's greatly to his credit That he is an Englishman....."

With his friend and travelling companion David Skipwith, Mike shared a deep love of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas - Gilbertian humour was very much part of MMG himself - hence the quotation from "H.M.S.Pinafore" which I am sure he would like. Mr. Skipwith persuaded MMG that moving from Rossall would be very good for him and for Shiplake! From the very first day MMG engendered a stabilising influence over a somewhat erratic element in the common room of those early days. Many a potentially disruptive situation among the boys was somehow defused by his walking slowly by them on his way to class.

His experience and instinctive skill helped many an early era Shiplake boy to an 'O' level in Eng. Lit. the passing of which might otherwise have eluded him. The challenge of an occasional candidate for Dram. school he took up with glee. His pleasure and pride reverberated round the school when he successfully coached the candidate past the auditions.

Never did he allow his considerable physical disability to be used as an excuse for not getting to all official occasions, chapels, Housematches, rugby and cricket fixtures. "Skiving" was not a word in his vocabulary.

He could administer the apt or stinging rebuke to any boy (and did when necessary to any member of staff, when he felt they were becoming "anti establishment".) Such comment was never resented nor forgotten!

Seeing MMG, the stereotype bachelor, happily married to Heather and father to his 'instant family' was a revelation. Those were his happiest times. While we share with his sisters and with his step-children a genuine sense of loss at his departure, this has to be for all of us, tempered with quiet happiness in the certain knowledge that "Mr and Mrs G" are together again.

MMT

Dear Old Viking,

I have now been at Shiplake for nearly six years and, in consultation with your secretary, have decided that it is time to write a few thoughts down on paper.

Shiplake's history can be divided into three parts. First, there was the creation. Those of you who have recently set up house will appreciate the endless costs involved in establishing a school. Think of crockery, laboratory and sports equipment, desks, plumbing, typewriters and library books, and you will be scratching the surface of the organisation required.

Second, there was the expansion. Look at the chart at the back of H.E.W-F's book (available at the College - £6 a copy!) and you will see how rapidly our numbers increased in the seventies. We were under 200 in 1971 and over 320 in 1980. Again there were problems. Accommodation had to materialise, drains had to be expanded, sets created, more staff appointed and so on. The fact that all this was achieved without sacrificing quality is a tribute to all those involved.

Third, there is consolidation. In the early days, corners had to be cut. Because of this, inexpensive buildings of a temporary nature were erected and, out of necessity, some of the planning was dominated by expediency. But now the expansion is over we can plan without immediate pressure and establish quality buildings to house a quality school. At national level big educational changes are imminent and we must be equipped to meet them.

It is against this background that we have planned our development. Again, there are three phases. Phase I: to replace the Green Huts. Phase II: to establish a new Burr. Phase III: to create a craft, design and technology centre. Phase I and Phase II are currently being built. Phase III will have to wait until our finances recover.

In addition, there are so many other things to do that are extra to the normal running of a school. The other 'Houses' are being refurbished, the Mathematics block is wearing out, the main drive is breaking up, the stone lintel above the library door cracked (that was a £10,000 repair!), the Head of Skipwith's balcony is falling down and....the list is endless.

However, today's problems are small by comparison to some of the earlier ones. What, though, can Old Vikings do? If you have read this far you are obviously interested in the College and probably want to help. There are three ways of doing this.

First, join the ISIS (Independent Schools Information Service) Association. This national organisation has been formed to fight for the preservation of independent schools. It costs £8 p.a. (£10 overseas) but that can easily be saved through the many discounts which are offered to members of the Association. Application forms are available at the College.

Second, spread the good news about the College. The enclosed fact sheet should give you some information for this. You would be surprised at the number of prospective parents I meet who are here simply because they have met and liked an Old Viking. Third, you can give financial help. It does not have to be much but do you realise that if all Old Vikings covenanted the equivalent of half a pint of beer a week to the College our building programme would soon be completed?

On May 31st, Ian Baldry (Everett, 1967) is chairing a Dinner at the College for those Old Vikings who are interested in helping with the Appeal. It will be Black Tie. Invitations are being sent out to many but if for some administrative reason you have not received an invitation and would like to come to the dinner please contact me as soon as possible.

Finally, a word of thanks. The above letter is mainly about material things. It has not concentrated on that special ingredient which makes Shiplake such an excellent school, namely, its warm and friendly atmosphere. Not only have you all helped in creating a good school in our own Elizabethan age but also you have helped to make Shiplake a happy, rewarding place to live and work and for this I am very grateful.

- 6. There are 327 boys on roll aged 13 to 18 (270 boarders and 57 day boys).
- 7. We offer tuition up to G.C.E. 'O' and 'A' levels.

#### Introduction

This booklet began as a means of keeping our Old Boys up to date. However, a wider circulation to everyone interested in Shiplake College seems worthwhile.

I would like to thank a number of friends in Canadian schools who advised me about keeping in touch with as many people as possible.

A simple list emphasises how much we have been able to do in twenty-six years.

- 8. We employ 37 full time teaching staff one part time member of staff.
- 9. There is one member of teaching staff to every nine boys.

#### **ADMISSION FACTS**

- 10. About 70 boys enter Shiplake College each year.
- 11. Most are accepted on the basis of the Common Entrance Examination.
- 12. Several boys are accepted each year from state schools. They complete English and Mathematics exams.
- 13. Approximately 5 boys each year are accepted at 6th form level.
- 14. 16 places are reserved each year for dyslexic boys. They pass a very thorough interview and test in mathematics. THESE PLACES ARE BOOKED WELL IN ADVANCE.
- 15. (a) 191 different prep. schools have sent boys to Shiplake.
  - (b) Since 1975 the prep. schools that sent us boys regularly are as follows: (number of boys in brackets) Crosfields (45), Stubbington House (32), Moulsford (17), St. Andrew's, Pangbourne (15), Papplewick (14), St. Piran's (11), Northaw (10), Sunningdale (10). In addition, 17 boys have transferred from Gillott's and 8 from Chiltern Edge.
- 16. A small number of entrance scholarships are awarded annually.

- 17. There are (denons of serving members of the armed forces in the colleget There are 61 boys who live abroad, including 25 boys who hold foreign passports.
- 18. Shiplake College is a Church of England school, but we welcome members of any creed or race.

#### FACTS ABOUT OUR HISTORY

- 19. Founded in 1959 by Alec Everett and Eunice Richardson as a school for 120 boys.
- 20. Demand for places led the College to expand to a school of four boarding houses and one complete day boy house.
- 21. Over 1,400 boys have come to Shiplake in the first 25 years.
- 22. The first History of the College 'Wish and Fulfilment' (by H.E. Wells-Furby) was published in 1984.
- 23. Shiplake College is one of Britain's very few successful post 1945 independent schools.

#### **INDEPENDENT FACTS**

- 24. We receive no government grants.
- 25. We maintain an option for parents who choose the right to select their sons' schooling.
- 26. We answer a boarding need.

27. We are funded largely by fees with plements from appeals and other enterprises.

#### PHILOSOPHICAL APPROACH

- 28. We stress character development as well as academic achievement.
- 29. We believe that a child's education thrives when he is happy.
- 30. Our aim is to achieve the maximum results with the minimum of fuss.
- 31. We emphasise the old fashioned virtues of honesty, leadership and good manners.
- 32. We are convinced that every boy has something to offer. We try to find it.

#### **FACTS ABOUT FACILITIES**

- 33. The original grounds and five buildings were bought for  $\pounds 17,500$ . This property comprised
  - (a) Tudor Cottage, the oldest building in the area.
  - (b) The stable block, converted to classrooms in 1960.
  - (c) The Lodge, now junior boys' accommodation for Welsh House.
  - (d) A gardener's bungalow.
  - (e) Shiplake Court, a forty room mansion now housing Skipwith House, the College library, all administrative offices and the catering.

- 34. Other residential accommodation, Everett House built in 1961, extended . Welsh House, opened 1965, extended 1978. Burr House, purchased 1970, extended 1984. Orchard House (1975), extended 1982. Plowden Cottage, purchased 1980. Meadow Keep, purchased 1982.
- 35. Teaching accommodation, the maths block (1972), art block (1978), computer room (1980), replacement science laboratories (1981), music school (1982).
- 36. Other facilities, sick wing opened 1963, extended 1974, laundry 1974, John Eggar Hall (sports' complex) 1979, Tithe Barn theatre 1980, Jubilee Building (shop, J.C.R. offices, staff residences) 1984, boat houses 1963 and 1971, landing stage 1980, cricket pavilion 1965, swimming pool 1968.
- 37. College buildings are now insured for a total of £4,245,000.

#### **EDUCATION FACTS**

- 38. We believe in small classes. There are very few sets larger than 16 up to 'O' level, and few over 8 at 'A' level.
- 39. We offer 17 subjects up to 'O' level and 14 subjects at 'A' level.
- 40. (a) There is an equal divide between art and science at 'A' level. Some combination of arts and sciences is possible at 'A' level.
  - (b) Since 1976 the annual number of 'O' and 'A' level passes has more than doubled.

- 41. The College belongs to the est dependent Schools Micro Electronic Centre (I.S.M.E.C.
- 42. The College has pioneered a "Learning to Learn" foundation course for all new boys.
- 43. Most boys have a week's work experience after their 'O' level exams finish.
- 44. A five day careers course, including interviewing techniques and mock officer selection, is held in the lower sixth.

#### **ECONOMIC FACTS 1983/4**

- 45. We employ 102 people.
- 46. The annual pay roll was £732,200, most of which buys food, shelter, clothing, cars and so forth in the Henley/ Reading area.
- 47. We spent £149,900 locally on food.
- 48. We spent £96,000 locally on other goods and services.
- 49. We spent £9,000 locally on books.
- 50. The College spent £25,300 with local firms on coach hire, mini bus operations, fuel and vehicle repairs.
- 51. Our annual budget now exceeds £1,300,000 and excess income is ploughed back into educational improvements. There are no profits.

52. Since 1979 the Collephas spent a yearly average of £118,700 on new builters – thus making a useful contribution to local employment and business.

#### **JUBILEE YEAR FACTS (1984)**

- 53. The College boat club came third in the Schools' Head of the River event and took a share in the Visitors Cup at Henley Royal Regatta.
- 54. In 1984 a second expedition went to the Himalayas.
- 55. 300 boys took part in the production of Jesus Christ Superstar.
- 56. Paintings by three boys were accepted by the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition.
- 57. The 1st Cricket XI was unbeaten by other school sides.
- 58. In 1984 the 1st Squash V defeated all comers.

#### SHIPLAKE AND THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

- 59. Members of staff serve in local government, conduct services in local parishes and contribute to local musical activities, amateur dramatics and Henley Rugby Club.
- 60. Through the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme boys do community service.

- 61. The John Eggar Hall is leteest a regular basis to Foster Wheeler Energy Limited.
- 62. The John Eggar Hall was used for Shiplake's first parish supper in a history of 900 years.
- 63. College kitchens each week serve 30 lunches for the Meals on Wheels Service.
- 64. Shiplake Lunch Club, Ladies "keep fit", Henley Symphony Orchestra, the Church fete, the Langtree Orchestra workshop, the English Schools' Cricket Association and local squash players regularly use the college facilities.

#### **HOLIDAY FACTS**

- 65. In the last five years, expeditions have twice gone to the Himalayas and twice to the Alps. There is an Easter holiday expedition to the Lake District every year. Expeditions have also gone to Norway and the Hebrides.
- 66. There is an Alpine "ski trip" each January.
- 67. Since 1980, senior boys have been regularly selected for International youth and junior regattas. An average of five boys a year represent Oxfordshire Schools in U19 Rugby matches.
- 68. Holiday courses are offered in cricket and racquet sports.
- 69. The annual Summer Ball is regularly attended by 600 guests. Early booking is essential.

70. Shiplake Enterprises for functions during the holidays.

- 71. Gifts to Shiplake College are deductable for income tax purposes.

Dear Old Viking,

First a word of welcome to all recent leavers who are getting their first ever Newsletter.

The much looked forward to gathering of club members to celebrate the College Silver Jubilee has come and gone. It is now time for the society to get back to normal. This means sending out two letters to members each year, usually one in the late autumn and the second in the spring. This year, the spring letter was replaced by the information about the jubilee day itself. Each invitation was accompanied by a signed letter from a club member and twenty volunteers did a great deal of chasing up of members whose reply to the invitation had been delayed. These 'chasers up' obtained a good deal of information about changes of address and peoples whereabouts. This is very helpful in running the club, but may I stress once again that <u>unless</u> we have your current address, it is very difficult to provide you, as a member, with much of a service.

#### PERSONAL

No association secretary should ever push himself. However, to make the position clear I have indicated by name at the top of this Newsletter in case you have failed to notice that about two years ago MMG handed over the reins to me.

I am drafting the O.V.S. letter in July because the governors of the College have given me special leave, I shall be away in Canada until November, by which time I hope you will have received this, wherever you are! Please keep the attached date list of regular club fixtures with the school up to next March.

## 1983-84 - A brief outline

The school's year has been extremely busy. There was a memorable production of 'Chips with everything' last October. At the end of term the O.V.S. 1st XV had a splendid victory over the College by 14 points to 10. During the winter nearly forty swans took up residence on the river between the College landing stage and the island. Few swans have been on our stretch of the river in recent years, although back in the 1960s people using the river then will remember constant warfare with nesting swans when trying to get our boats out of the back water.

In March, the O.V.S. hockey side lost by just one goal to the College XI. This was a game which the O.V.S. really dominated and should have won. The same day, in spite of having to travel considerable distances, the whole O.V.S. committee met to finalise plans for the jubilee day. Richard Devas paid tribute to the efforts of his committee to make the maximum possible contribution at an important time in the clubs development. At this meeting, the committee decided they would nominate Chris Pelloe at the next A.G.M. to follow Richard Devas as chairman of the society. Chris is the longest serving member of the committee and if you want to know how he became a committee member, the story can be found on page 132 of the College history! 2/..

In March, the 1st VIII came third in the School's Head of the River, thus consolidating our position as a developing rowing school.

#### THE JUBILED TERM

The summer term of 1984 must be the most strenuous in the history of the college. Fichard Devas, as Chairman of the Old Boys, was present at the official celebrations of May 1st. There was a service of Thanksgiving in the Sports' Hall where the preacher was the Bishop of Dorchester. Mrs Eggar laid the foundation stone of the Jubilee building which is growing rapidly now and will do the job of the two green huts which have been here since 1960. The printers got the Jubilee history here just in time for sales to begin on May 1st. In mid May, over two hundred boys and the school took part in one of the first amateur productions of 'Jesus Christ Superstar'. Old boys who came will testify that it matched the standard of cur major musical and dramatic efforts over the years. It was the only event of the Jubilee term to be affected by rain, but all three performances went ahead to a successful conclusion in spite of the difficulties.

# O.V.S.DAY

The sun shone gloriously on Saturday, June 30th to welcome probably the liggest ever gathering of 0.V.S. members. We were delighted to see as many 0.V.S. families here also. Indeed, the committee tried very hard to make sure that there was plenty for families to enjoy. The river cruises and the childrens sports were particularly well supported. Mr.Andrew Barclay organised a magnificent 'It's a Knockout' competition which the Old Vikings won narrowly in spite of a strong challenge from the college staff. The school team itself was slightly over confident and did not do as well as expected. Perhaps here is the time to note the cricket result. A strong 0.V.S. batting side collapsed before lunch and were beaten by the biggest margin since 1969.

Between five and six hundred guests sat down in the marquee to what was described as 'lunch' but turned out to be a banquet. We are particularly grateful to the Bursar and the Caterer for this magnificent occasion. As many O.V.S.members know, we have part time secretarial help from Mrs.Jackie Leigh and the organisation of the jubilee added tremendously to the amount of work she had to do for the club, and this is the time to underline the contribution she made to the smooth running of the day itself.

Sadly, not everyone who accepted the invitation was able to come on the day itself. No doubt, the hot weather, distances involved and business strains caused a few people to cancel their plans at a late date. All one can say is, we do hope to see you all at an O.V.S. day soon and to say that you did miss a superb and most memorable occasion. The college 1st VIII had been eliminated from the Princess Elizabeth Cup at an early stage of the Henley Royal Regatta. As O.V.S. gathered on the lawns here our combined crew with Sir William Borlase School of Marlow won their semi-final of the Visitors' Cup, and on the Sunday won the event. Particularly appropriate that in the Jubilee year, the name of Shiplake College should be inscribed on a Henley trophy. The 2nd VIII also took part in the Regatta and lost in the Special Pvent for school crews to the eventual winners.

### THE FIND OF TERM

The cricket season also had a jubilee flavour, the U/15 side were undefeated as they have been when they were an U/14 side. The 1st XI was undefeated in school fixtures and achieved the first tie in our 1st XI cricketing history away at Magdalen College School, Oxford. They lost their undefeated record in the last match of the season against a strong Free Forester's side, but the important thing was, we got through a season without losing to another school XI. Before we leave the rowing scene it is worth mentioning that the 1st VIII reached senior 'A' status for the first time, and that our two members of the Visitors' Cup crew were selected for the World Youth Rowing Championships.

The College celebrations continued at the end of term. Tim Eggar spoke at Speech Day and gave away the prizes. The Jubilee Ball was very well supported by O.V.S.members and the sight of so many of them in dinner jackets makes one wonder if the club should not revive the idea of an annual dinner in the not too distant future. Many Prep. School Headmasters came to Shiplake for a celebration dinner on July 10th as a 'thank you' to them for directing you to Shiplake at some time in the past.

The profits of the 'Jumbo Draw' on O,V.S.dey were donated to the support of the Buri Gandaki expedition to the Himalayas led by Mr David Partridge. Two members of the expedition five years ago were on the committee and I have no doubt that members of this expedition will be recruited to the O.V.S.Committee before too long.

## Secretary's Report

#### Meeting Old Viking Society - sub Committee - 5th February, 1984

The Chairman agreed that sweat shirts and rosettes would be purchased for members of the 'Its a Knockout' teams on 30th June, they could keep these as a souvenier. Chairman said that the estimate for 200 balloons for child visitors was quite acceptable.

Andrew Bainbridge accepted the order for 1,200 invitation cards as agreed. 300 draw tickets as suggested by Roger Harrold also approved. Bainbridge was asked to print 1,200 post cards with 0.V.S.Secretary and the College address on one side and reply information on the other. The aim is to make replying to the invitation as simple as possible. Invitation and reply cards to be ready by 1st March at the latest.

An invitation letter was prepared by the Chairman, the wording was agreed. Mrs.Leigh would duplicate these ready for signing on 11th March. The following steps were agreed. The College would buy for the Club, envelopes suitable for the size of invitation cards as agreed. Mrs Leigh would address these now. The Secretary, with boy help would put invitation and reply cards in the envelopes and then sort them into years of 'coming' with the help of boy labour, at this stage a list of names for each year would be prepared, again with boy help. All this is to be ready for 11th March when those aigning letters would assemble at mid-day in room 6 to complete the job.

A letter to members addressing OV letters has been prepared.

#### OLD VIKING SOCIETY

The Minutes of the 42nd Committee Meeting held at Shiplake College on Sunday, March 11th, 1984

- 1. <u>Present</u>: The whole of the committee.
- 2. Apologies for Absence: None.
- 3. The Chairman, Mr R J Devas warmly thanked the whole of the committee for their support on this occasion.
- 4. <u>Arising from the Minutes of the last Meeting</u>: Christopher Pelloe announced that he was willing to be the next Chairman of the Society, and that he had arranged the start of the June cricket match with Eric Russell at 11.30.
- 5. <u>Agenda</u>: Hire of public address system; one system was required for the terrace and the back up use of a hand 'loud hailer' would be useful.

The non appearance of the RAF Police Dogs made an arena on the new field unnecessary and the childrens sports would now be held on the terraces near the swimming pool, the staff co-ordinater Mr.A.F.Barclay agreed to take charge of these.

<u>Mr.Barclay's Report</u>: He was arranging four'It's a Knockout' teams, two would be OVS teams, the more junior organised by James Neale and Andrew Gordon volunteered to produce the more senior team plus reserves. As the contest would last at least an hour, it was agreed that it should start at 11.30. The Headmaster and the second master would arrange the school timetable that day so that there would be vocal support for the school participants, and incidentally, school lunches would probably be in houses. There would be OVS teams practice at 10.00, school and staff having previously practiced at their convenience.

Mr Barclay reported that for children there would be a radio controlled cars display at 14.30 and 16.00, this would in no way affect the history exhibition in the Barn.

- 6. Car Parking: The Bursar would take charge of these arrangements.
- 7. Boat Trip: Times would be advertised by public address and notices.

It was agreed that Mr.Barclay could spend up to £200 in preparation for 'It's a Knockout' but he anticipated that expenditure could be considerably less.

It was agreed, that because of Henley, there would be no rowing v OVS.

Childrens sports would be at 15.00, sack race, egg and spoon race, 60 yard dash were the type of things envisaged together with a treasure hunt in the Orchard and the less dangerous parts of the river bank.

8. <u>Gate opening ceremony:</u> Consideration for this was postponed till the Committee had a chance to view the site in the afternoon of the 11th. There was, however, a long discussion about possibilities and priorities the general conclusion was the old boys would be happy to support this enterprise, two engraved stones with the coat of arms and Shiplake College should be inserted into two low walls either side of the entrance. Planning permission made it highly unlikely that this worthwhile job would be done before the 30th June. Immediate action was to get quotations for the stone work, some estimate of brickwork and the committee agreed that as earlier  $\pounds500$  had been voted towards a school improvement that the sum offered by the Old Boys could be extended to  $\pounds1,000$  maximum. This was bearing in mind increased subscriptions as per last Committee Meeting.

<u>Added note</u>: Following a afternoon discussion on site at the entrance, all present agreed that the project should be carried forward slowly and carefully, further decisions could be made in the light of a good scheme on paper at the next committee meeting. There was no harm in announcing on 30th June that the Old Boys were going to commemorate the schools jubilee by gate improvement. Any ceremony was therefore now deleted from the timetable for June 30th, an opening ceremony could take place on another OVS day, probably in 1985.

- 9. <u>Location of activities</u>: A previous meeting had agreed that the beer and wine bar would be on the terrace, the idea of a cocktails bar and committee members enclosure was revised. The site would be near the acacia tree, Mrs.Cooke, Roger Harrold and the Bursar agreed to form the sub-committee, possibly devising a jubilee cocktail, but the second bar would basically be a straight forward cash bar offering gin and tonic and a limited range of drinks. It was agreed that the standard terms on which the school sold beer and wine on other OVS days would apply to the 1984 gathering.
- 10. <u>OVS Jumbo Draw</u>: At least three ticket sellers would be required, tickets would be £1.00 each. Names to be written on the ticket stub, no question of the prizes being re-drawn if the winner was not present, he might be playing cricket and so on.Mr.Barclay will arrange several notices advertising the jumbo draw. Tickets could only be sold at Shiplake College on the day, there could be early morning sales to the staff.
- 11. <u>Additional Committee Meeting:</u> It was agreed not to have an additional committee meeting as progress was encouraging. The Chairman would be at Shiplake the day before the gathering and numerous small items could be sorted out then, such as the location of ladies and gents lavatories and so on. It is possible a simple outline of events could be duplicated the day before for issue on the day.
- 12. <u>Buri Gandaki expedition</u>: The means of this expedition were carefully examined from all angles. The profits of the draw would vary depending on the weather on 30th June, and it was agreed that the whole profit should be donated to the expedition together with £100 from the Club funds. The Treasurer did emphasise that the Club was being called on to make substantial and regular donations and he felt a very careful control was needed. Other members felt that the publicity to the school and the impact on younger boys in the school of the follow up reporting showing films and so on had considerable value on which the cash value could not be assessed.

The Chairman reminded members of the Committee that they would meet in their enclosure at 09.45 on June 30th. The Chairman elect would be staying overnight at Shiplake to assist the Secretary with any last minute problems.

The Chairman closed the meeting at 12.15. Committee members then went off to sign invitation letters as previously arranged. Lists of those who had not replied by post card would be sent to all those involved

in the phase 2 follow up, probably in the first week of May certainly not much later than that.

It was agreed informally between Chairman, Chairman elect and Secretary that the rugby, hockey dates would be the corresponding dates to the previous fixtures, the 1984 cricket match and gathering would revert to the normal Saturday rather earlier than this years gala.

#### OLD VIKING SOCIETY

The Minutes of the 21st Annual General Meeting held at Shiplake College on Sunday, December 11th, 1983.

The Chairman called the Meeting to order at 16.52.

- 1. <u>Apologies for Absence</u>: Apologies for absence were received from Messrs M.R.Hayman and I.Munday.
- 2. <u>Minutes of the Last Meeting</u>: The Minutes were read by the Secretary and confirmed as a true record.
- 3. <u>Matters arising out of the Minutes</u>: No one spotted that this was the 21st Annual General Meeting.
- 4. <u>Election of Officers and Committee</u>: The resignation of Ian Munday and M.J.Nops were reported. The Chairman added that Alastair Baird had already been co-opted onto the Committee and a volunteer to stand for the Committee was called for. C.P.Eve volunteered, he was proposed by the Headmaster and seconded by Jonty Hearnden. The Committee was then elected en bloc.
- 5. <u>Chairman's Report</u>: The Chairman combined his report with an outline of the Silver Jubilee plans for 1984. He stressed that the gatherings of the club especially this summer had been successful. The part played by the successful Rugby games were very much to the credit of the Rugby manager Alistair Newman and overall support for matches against the College had improved tremendously in recent months. The Chairman stressed the amount of thought that had been given to making sure that every old boy whose address we still had would be approached about coming to the gathering on 30th June, 1984.
- 6. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: The Treasurer presented his report and pointed that a reasonable surplus had been achieved since the last Annual General Meeting. There had been no heavy expenditure on an address book during the previous twelve months. In fact, this had all assisted with the financing of the sheets updating the address book, the Treasurer found that working with himself as College Bursar a very happy arrangement beneficial both to the College and to the Society.
- 7. <u>Any Other Business</u>: The Chairman invited the Headmaster to present to the Committee members and the fifth Society members a short report on activities at the College during the last year. Amongst the things he mentioned were the withdraw from sale of The Old Vicarage. This meant that we had no opportunity in the near future of opening a girls boarding house (groans from the audience). The Headmaster drew members attention to improvements in the Tithe Barn, in the changing rooms and in the accommodation in their old houses. Phase one of our next building programme a building to replace the many functions of the green huts was also mentioned, Mr.Whittington was now in command of an R.A.F.Section of the C.C.F.

There being no other business, the Chairman closed the meeting at 17.22.

## OLD VIKING SOCIETY

The Minutes of the 41st Committee Meeting held at Shiplake College on Sunday, December 11th, 1983.

The Meeting opened at 10.45. The Chairman asked members present to stand for a minute in tribute to John Eggar, our former President.

<u>Present</u>: The following were present at the Meeting: M.C.Whicker, Treasurer; R.J.Devas, Chairman; The Secretary; M.M.Gilliat; C.P.M.Pelloe; N.H.King; Mrs.E.A.Cooke; R.M.M.Davies; R.L.F.Harrold; The Headmaster and A.N.Newman. Also present was Mr.Andrew Barclay the co-opted staff co-ordinator for the Silver Jubilee.

- 1. <u>Apologies for Absence</u>: Apologies for absence were received from M.R.Hayman; A.G.Baird; I.Munday and M.J.Nops.
- 2. <u>The Minutes of the Last Meeting</u>: The Minutes of the last meeting were approved and signed.
- 3. <u>Matters arising out of the Minutes</u>: These had been listed for consideration under the heading 'Silver Jubilee'.
- 4. <u>Secretary's Report</u>: The Secretary reported briefly that the R.A.F.Committee could not tell us if we could have a display by the Service Police Dogs until February, 1984.
- 5. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: The Treasurer presented the annual balance sheet which was accepted as satisfactory. The Chairman pointed out that in a year when we did not publish something like an expensive address list about £500 was available for disposal. He did however stress that it cost about £500 a year to keep the club just operating normally. The Committee considered the subscription system and agreed as follows: The employment/education system was affecting the time spent by most boys at the College. The great majority now stayed for four years. It was therefore agreed that the Old Viking Life Subscription would be levied during a boys first four years at Shiplake at the existing rate of £1. per term. This would in no way affect the right of leavers after three years to be life members of the Society.
- 6. <u>Officers of the Club</u>: Christopher Pelloe agreed to consider the offer of the Committee that he should take up the chairmanship of the club in twelve months time when R.J.Devas retired from office. The secretary was asked to write to Mark Hayman and Andrew Gordon asking them to remain members of the committee until after the Silver Jubilee. He would also write to Ian Munday accepting his resignation from the committee. Note: M.J.Nops tendered his resignation from the committee later in the day, this difficulty was resolved at the A.G.M. The committee decided that Alastair Baird had effectively replaced Ian Munday on the committee.
- 7. The Committee agreed to contribute to the Independent Schools Joint Action Committee. At a current subscription of 30p per boy in the school a sum of around £100 was considered agreeable.
- 8. This was deferred to later in the meeting.

- 9. The Committee decided to fix an exact date for the special June Committee Meeting in March.
- 10. Remuneration of Mrs.J.A.Leigh: The Committee agreed unanimously to increase the annual payment to £50. In addition, the Treasurer was asked to pay her a special Silver Jubilee bonus of £20. The intention of this was to bring up her remuneration for the financial year just ended to a total of £50. but as the Treasurer's Report had already been accepted this additional sum would have to be charged on the coming years account.
- 11. <u>Any Other Business</u>: The Committee was asked to make a grant to the Buri Gandaki expedition. Two Committee members had been on the previous Himalayian expedition, they offered to see Mr.Partridge and explain the Clubs present financial position. They were to seek further information about the cost of the expedition. They agreed to tell Mr.Partridge the decision about the size of the committees grant would be made at the March meeting. There was also the possibility that any modest profit made by the draw on Silver Jubilee Day could be assigned to the support of this venture. The Committee felt strongly that any grant made should not be regarded as a precedent for future contributions to ambitious enterprises away from the College.

The Secretary reminded the Committee that co-opting the retiring Head Prefect on to the O.V.S.Committee had been part of the rules in the 1960's. The Committee agreed that this was a sound principle and were happy to co-opt if the Headmaster confirmed that during the course of his year, the candidate had been an all round success and looked like a potential asset to the Committee.

The Committee now moved to detailed consideration of the <u>Silver Jubilee</u> plans. As a result of consideration, the following were deleted from the list of possibilities: Use of the Sports Hall; Donkey rides; Freepost and Daily Telegraph advertisement.

The following can be summarised briefly: Two means of Public Address would be required; one on the terrace in front of the Main Building and a second in the arena on the New Field. The Secretary was authorised to spend up to £50 on balloons for children. Chris Pelloe was confirmed as 1984 Cricket Manager, the match would start at 11.00 and continue till 13.30, at some time there would be a long break in the match so that the cricketers could enjoy the other activities. The match would continue until 18.30 or 19.00. When the break took place will depend on how the programme of events developed. The Secretary knew more old masters than anyone else present and would make personal contact to persuade as many as possible to come.

Invitation Cards, Roger Harrold reported that Andrew Bainbridge had offered to design invitation cards, this was willingly accepted by the committee. A sub-committee of The Chairman, Secretary, Roger Harrold, Andrew Barclay and Andrew Bainbridge would meet early in 1984 to get as many details prepared as possible. Roger Harrold would co-ordinate date, time and place of meeting. In some circumstances, local printing of the invitation may be advantageous.

Lack of certainty of the Police Dogs Display affected the finalising of the programme which was envisaged as follows: O.V.S. and families would start arriving at about 11.00, there would be the cricket to watch; Andrew Barclay would organise fun games on 'It's a Knockout' basis (teams of six); school, staff and O.V.S. in the swimming pool area. Bars would be open near the pavilion and on the terrace from 11.30 to 14.30. Lunch would be from 13.00 - 14.00; the opening ceremony for the improved front entrance would need a

time fixing; the R.A.F.Dogs would be preferably soon after 14.30 followed by half an hour of childrens sports. Bars would re-open at 17.30 continuing activities would be boat trips of about thirty minutes duration; childrens swimming in the pool; sale of ice creams; ties and College History.

It was agreed that there should be a committee/headquarters enclosure where (1) a committee member would always be available and (2) cocktails and spirits would be on sale in contrast to the other bars which would be regarded as wine and beer outlets.

Andrew Barclay would get boys involved in making an entertainment contribution and radio controlled cars (models) were one possibility.

The sending out of invitations led to considerable discussion, if possible, the March committee meeting should be followed by a meeting of 'inviters' who would then sign their invitations with a view to their dispatch, signing of letters did not depend on the invitation card being finished by the March meeting. Replies should be sent to the individual signing them c/o The Resident Secretary Old Viking Club, Shiplake College. The result of this is that in April we should be able to build up a list of firm acceptances and people who had not replied. At the end of April 'inviters' would have to receive from the College a list reading 'The following have not replied, our research suggests that this is the phone number of each person needing to be contacted . One or two committee members in business felt that they could research the necessary phone numbers themselves, but the general feeling was that most research would have to be done by two or three individuals based at Shiplake going to libraries and centres where all the national telephone directories would be readily available and copying down numbers solidly until the job was done. Costs of making phone calls would be re-imbursed to individual members of the committee.

The Bursar hoped to have designs of an improved Silver Jubilee school entrance available early in 1984. The Headmaster mentioned that old boys should be advised to travel to the Silver Jubilee gathering by some other route other than via Henley on the third day of the Royal Regatta. He hoped that the College would still be in the Princess Elizabeth Cup on that day and he intended to ask Richard Lester who is now a Steward to arrange the College's race after 17.00 on the Saturday when the Jubilee Day would be winding down.

Roger Harrold's draw would be confined to ticket sales at the College on the day. There is no objection to sale of tickets to senior members of the College likely to be able to afford the ticket. The aim remained the same, some substantial prizes and a possible small surplus. The time for the draw remained 'to be fixed'. Lunches would be entirely free, but as already agreed, all drink would be 'sold'.

In concluding the meeting, the Chairman thanked everyone for their helpful participation in a lively meeting. The Secretary added that the minutes would not be put into the Christmas post, but sent out around the New Year.



## JOHN DRENNAN EGGAR 1916–1983

# "A very special Headmaster"

Four years is a long time in a schoolboy's life, but it is a sadly short time between John Eggar's retirement from Shiplake in 1979 and his totally unexpected death in May 1983. All those who read this tribute will in some way or other have gained from his years of dedication, guidance and encouragement at Shiplake College.

The facts of John Eggar's earlier career are easily told. He was educated at Winchester where he was in the 1st Cricket XI for three years and captain during his last season. He was at Trinity College, Oxford from 1935 to 1938 and gained his cricket blue in his final term. He also played against Bradman's Australian touring team that season. His career as a schoolmaster and all-round games player was interrupted by the war. He served in The Rifle Brigade and saw active service in North Africa and Italy. He was an outstandingly successful Housemaster at Repton school until 1963 when he was appointed Headmaster of Shiplake. He came to us at the height of his powers as a schoolmaster, organiser and energiser of young men.

John Eggar always admitted his own personal debt to the famous Winchester Housemaster and cricket coach Harry Altham. At Repton, John Eggar ran the cricket and the CCF, he sat on the Parish Council, managed the school shop, and made a very happy marriage. Indeed, one of the things Shiplake lacked until the Eggars arrived was a family life at the centre of the school.

One way of giving everyone an idea of John Eggar's achievement in taking over a small school in 1963 and building it up to its present size is to go around the school grounds as they were 20 years ago. There was only one tennis court and no swimming pool, there was no CCF hut and no armoury. Continuing our tour, there was one laboratory on the Orchard site and that was the only building there! There was no cricket pavilion and only one playing field. Welsh House was still The Vicarage, the Red House (the home of Burr) was still private property. Everett had just been built but it had ten less rooms than now and Court Mead was just a plan. Sixteen years later in 1979 the buildings were very much as you see them now.

During John Eggar's time at Shiplake the numbers increased from 150 to over 300. Two new Houses — Welsh and Orchard — were opened. The boat club was gradually built up to its present strength. New subjects were added to the curriculum. All these achievements were the results of John Eggar's determination to get the maximum of results with the minimum of fuss.

As the headmaster of a new school, John Eggar was bound to be more busy than most Heads. He was busy in a way that was especially his. He wrote lively letters and believed in prompt answers, he taught actively and corrected work quickly. Not a moment was wasted if he wanted to raise a point with a colleague. He kept an eve on notices and was quick to congratulate a junior on gaining his Colts colours or getting into something as low as a 'C' crew. If you were in charge of a special job you got a 'thank you note' almost before the job was complete! He grudged the time spent at meetings or conferences away from Shiplake. He could have made a contribution to the wider world of headmastering, but he chose not to do so. His success was due to giving plenty of time to the little things as well as the big ones.

One almost felt John Eggar used his spare time in the service of the school. When he was gardening he was probably making plans anticipating the needs of the week after next, or getting himself fresh to meet the next group of parents. He rarely postponed decisions but was always willing to admit he was wrong and reconsider something that he had decided to do.

John Eggar had a good sense of humour and he possessed a marvellous fund of cricket stories. These should have surely been written down and preserved but, sadly, this did not happen. How John Eggar found time to visit his own family at school, sit on the Shiplake Parish Council and be Chairman of the local branch of The British Legion one could hardly fathom. Socially he was very good company and he and Pam Eggar were much sought after guests. Even so, he regarded personal pleasure as a means of re-charging his batteries for returning to duty.

Tributes paid to John Eggar in recent months have been many and various. The Times and The Daily Telegraph emphasised his ability as a first class cricketer and his success as a headmaster. At his funeral, we were reminded of his strong sense of Christian purpose. At the Old Vikings memorial service Mr. Frank Fisher - till recently Master of Wellington College --reminded us of John Eggar's many virtues and of his devotion to his family, to Brook House, Repton, and to Shiplake College. In his years as Headmaster, John Eggar never changed, he remained energetic, far seeing, helpful and dedicated, he had no intention of winding down even in his final year as Headmaster. Instead of winding down, he built a Sports Hall. It was no fault of his that it was not complete until the term after he left! Perhaps the only way he changed was to develop a greater interest in rowing. Even so, he spent many happy hours on the cricket field at Shiplake, coaching, playing, watching and advising. To him, cricket was a recreation but schoolmastering was an all absorbing occupation.

What John Eggar meant to people can best be understood from the many

tributes paid to him by parents and old boys. Very few parents have regretted sending their sons to Shiplake and remarkably few young men have regretted being here. "I respected him highly and appreciated his constant help and encouragement". "He took immense interest in all of us and he did a great deal for me personally". A former captain of cricket writes: "He did not try to mould my character directly but gave me confidence by his constant friendly interest and thus became a good friend". Another writes: "I have thankful memories of him pushing me into a standard of effort that I had previously felt incapable of". A former School Prefect writes: "He was paid the greatest tribute on the day he left when one of those who had frequently been up to the Headmaster's study for the wrong reasons said 'that he honestly believed that Mr. Eggar was a good Headmaster and everyone was sorry to see that he was leaving". The common reaction from old boys to the death of Mr. Eggar is to remember with gratitude the real interest that he took in all of them.

Parents found John Eggar's sympathy and humanity his most attractive features. He was particularly helpful in giving confidence to boys who were disappointed by their 'Common Entrance' achievements and he earned the abiding gratitude of many parents who felt let down by other schools. Parents felt they and their sons were always welcome. John Eggar went to great trouble to assist the parents of a boy who had won a music scholarship to a public school and then lost it because his Common Entrance results were not good enough. Shiplake came to the rescue and awarded this young man a music scholarship. As the still grateful parents wrote recently: "John Eggar never knew what his confidence in him did for our son, but we know and will always be grateful".

If John Eggar ever felt that he had been fortunate in his own school, in his upbringing and in his opportunities, he more than repaid his debts in his years of service to others, especially to young people. He was somewhat surprised at the extent of the standing ovation he was accorded at his final Speech Day. He would, being essentially a modest man, never admit to pride in what he had achieved. Occasionally his eyes would tell you of his quiet satisfaction in the progress being made around him. It is too early to look for a final verdict on John Eggar's achievements as Headmaster of Shiplake College, but it is quite certain that what he achieved will stand the test of time. Dear Old Viking,

This Newsletter is the one you would normally get in the January/February period. We have advanced the letter for two reasons. One to get to you at an early date the enclosed off print from The Court (the College magazine) of the 1979 portrait of John Eggar and the schools official tribute to him. The other reason is that the Chajonan and I would like to leave the new year clear for writing to you about one thing and one thing only, the 1984 Silver Jubilee gathering of Old Vikings.

I am told by many members, particularly the farmers and business men that they often do not look at the OVS letters because of their brown advertisement type envelopes! We therefore sent out the details about John Eggar's memorial service in white envelopes. This seems to have had the effect of getting more people to open the letters. It also led the post office to send back undelivered letters marked "gone away two years" or more! It seems the post office does not always send back to us undelivered newsletters if they go out in brown envelopes. Any advice from OV's in advertising on how to get the club members to open letters and read them would be very welcome.

#### COLLEGE NEWS

1982/3 was in many ways a good year for the College. The new boys who came in September 1982 went through cricket, hockey and Rugby seasons without losing to another school in their age group. The highlight of the 1st XI cricket season was a first victory over the Free Foresters. We came within a run and a ball of victory over them two years ago.

The first VIII again reached the semi-final of the Princess Elizabeth Cup, two of its members were in the Great Britain IV at the world rowing championships in August, this crew won the silver medal and their performance was described as the best ever by a British junior crew at the world championships. Donald Fraser and Marcus Williams (now OV's) are to be congratulated on this feat.

We abolished the upper fourth/upper fifth system two years ago, and our new way of organising work up to the fifth form produced the best 'O' level results for ten years. It is hard to make comparisons with good results before 1973 simply because the numbers entering were so much smaller in the early days. The 'A' level results were again very encouraging and match those of the upper sixth in the year 1979/80.

One of our longer serving staff members of the club, Stephen Kean has moved to Barnard Castle school after seven years at Shiplake. He will be remembered by Old Vikings particularly in his help with hockey matches against the club. In the same way OVS members will miss Chris Collins who has moved to Allhallows on the Dorset/Devon frontier. One of the clubs seven lady members, Jane Gooding handed over the Pottery department in the spring and moved to Cornwall where she has since married. She is now Jane Marks.

#### SECRETARY'S NEWS

I have prepared four pages of notes on John Eggar's career in first class cricket between 1938 and 1954, I will gladly send a copy to any club member who arites in and asks for it. 2/...

I finished the rough draft of the College history in August, it runs to something over sixty thousand words with about ten factual tables at the end. I hope there will be about twenty illustrations. Now that we have got something like a text we are asking printers about the likely cost price.

Sadly I do not think the following two paragraphs can go into the History of Shiplake. They are supposed to be "me in 1960"! Modesty forbids that they should be included but I do feel that Stowart Cowley's humour should be shared with the club as a whole. (I don't think the whole book will be quite so lively either!)

From the moment that he strode glowering into the life of the school, hands clasped behind him and black gown billowing in his wake, I felt that the game was up. He seemed in a permanent rage, his face jutting forward, jaw clenched and eyes narrowed and all-seeing. The Vulture put the fear of God in us. His voice was enough; it would crack like a whip in class the moment anyone's attention wandered. To have taken a caning from him became the hallmark of courage and would guarantee you a place at the head of the bun queue.

However fearsome, however, he was just and tailored the punishment to fit the crime. I recall sneaking off to the lock one evening for a swim only to return to find my clothes missing. What a miserable, freezing return journey that was; dodging naked from tree to tree all the way back and sneaking in through the basement door only to be confronted by that terrifyingly unmistakeable form. I thought it was a caning for sure, but after letting me stand, shivering with cold and anticipation for a long minute or two, he ordered the prefect to return my clothes, turned and swept out.

GOOD NEWS: I hope the Silver Jubilee Tie will be available for sale on December 11th price £2.65 plus VAT. I trust the committee will give a lead and produce their cash then. Afterall they designed it with the professional help of Ian Munday.

Old Vikings Day on June 18th, 1983 was well supported, nearly thirty players took part in tennis against the school and a strong shooting team turned out as well. The church was almost full for John Eggar's memorial service, but not surprisingly some people felt unable to stay behind for the fork supper. This however was still a great success. The OVS Committee is very grateful for the support shown on OVS day this summer and we are all grateful for the careful driving of old boys in the school grounds on this particularly busy day.

Most of the letters reaching the club in recent months were written as a result of the sad news of John Eggar's death. At such a time people were less inclined to write about themselves, so news about old members is scarce at the moment. In May, Bill McAlester visited the College on his terminal leave from the Royal Marines. He left England on 5th April, 1982 on board HMS Hermes, his unit waited at Ascension Island 4 weeks until the Canberra arrived, they transferred from Tristan to the Foarless just outside the war zone. He was one of those to go ashore in the first wave. He said that they had studied numerous photographs of the landing area, these had obviously been taken from a low level because a ridge and a hedge were not visible. As Mac said "when they reached the unexpected hedge, all the San Carlos dogs barked", he added "I've been off dogs ever since then!"

The weight of ammunition the Marines carried on top of their normal pack load was the biggest difference between normal Marine training and actual Falklands combat conditions. Mac added they were all very grateful for the protection provided by the Rapier ground crews amongst whom was Richard Woodward in the RAF Regiment.

#### OLD VIKING SOCIETY

The Minutes of the 40th Committee Meeting held at Shiplake College on Sunday, March 13th, 1983.

- 1. <u>Apologies for Absence</u>: The President; M.J.Nops; N.H.King; I.Munday; R.L.F.Harrold; M.R.Hayman and Mrs E.A.Cooke.
- 2. <u>Members present</u>: The Chairman; P.H.Lapping; The Secretary; M.C.Whicker; C.P.M.Pelloe; R.M.M.Davies; A.Newman and M.M.Gilliat.
- 3. The Secretary read his reply to G.Lotto's complaint about being dropped from the Committee. As he was unable to attend regularly, M.R.Hayman offered his resignation. The committee, however, wished him to remain. To strengthen the committee A.G.Baird - the present Head Prefect would be co-opted from the electum of 1983, this was proposed by the Chairman and seconded by H.E. Wells-Furby.
- 4. The Headmaster outlined the Governors Jubilee plans. There would be a service in the Sports' Hall on 1st May, 1984. An Old Boy presence then would be welcome.

An improvement to the main gate area would be welcomed by the school. The piano overhaul was not going ahead.

The date for the 1984 Old Boys Day was fixed for Saturday, 30th June. The end of term marquee would be available. School events on the last Sunday of term would bot be affected.

Old Vikings would be advised not to travel via Henley to avoid Regatta traffic. It was doubtful if Rowing against the school would be possible. The Cricket match would be timed 14.30 - 19.30 to enable players to mix before lunch and meet their friends.

- 5. <u>Meeting the needs of children</u>: (1) Side-shows river boat rides (free) 30 minute trips upstream from the Pontoon landing (2) sales of ices and coke (3) donkey or pony rides (4) free gift balloons: <u>for all</u> (5) P.T.display, R.A.F. Police Dogs, Silly Superstars (6) First Aid. The Secretary outlined the problems of booking the R.A.F. Police Dogs but all agreed the attempt should be nade, the Secretary agreed to take charge of this.
- 6. The Secretary would consult Ian Munday about placing of the dates and the stripes on the generally approved tie. No objection to school wearing the same tie as Old Boys was envisaged. It was thought that no more than 100 ties would be sold on 0.V.S. day 1984..
- 7. The Headmaster would find a co-ordinator to organise (1) childrens events (2) boy labour preparations.
- 8. <u>Other possible entertainments/attractions</u>: 'Exploiting Sports' Hall'; school orchestra performing;draw, as proposed by R.L.F.Harrold, a letter would be sent to R.F.L.H. outlining the current views of the committee. (generous prizes would be offered and the profit would subsidise the quality of lunch/entertainment)

The Committee decided that exactly what we could afford would be settled at the December Meeting - 10.45 start.

In the meanwhile, sale of The School History; The Jubilee tie and Draw tickets would be the only commercial activities.

The Committee reversed its decision to offer free wine in connection with this, the sale of souvenier glasses was dropped. R.L.F.Harrold suggested a champagne/cocktail/oyster bar on the line of the Ball attraction. The Committee was against an entry fee being paid as it was thought to be devisive. It was also against any attempt to divide old boys into first class and second class citizens. Wine would be sold at lunch at cost (approx), this was proposed by the Chairman and seconded by M.M.Gilliat.

- 9. The sending out of lunch invitations accompanied by a demand for (1) money and (2) immediate decision to come was considered a mistake. The invitation should be a formal card accompanied by a printed summary of the programme and attractions. A'follow up'to the original invitation should be by groups, based on 'year of entry'. The following were agreed (a) 'Free post' envelopes would go with the invitation. (b) a caravan site was not needed (c) a photographic concession was dropped to reduce commercial activity (d) The large number of overseas residents should be remembered when planning invitations (e) car parking would probably be on the 'new field' (f) a Daily Telegraph advertisement would alert many whose addressed were now lost.
- 10. <u>Rugby shirts</u>: The vexed question decided 13 Rugby shirts would be taken home by A.Newman. He would hand them to R.M.M.Davies after the 11th December Rugby match ready for the March, 1984 Hockey game. In view of this, C.P.M.Pelloe proposed and R.M.M.Davies seconded that two more shirts should be bought to complete the set. School 2nd XV would be asked to lend a black shirt to an opposite number.

The Chairman read his letter to Paul Emerson i/c Rugby. He admitted inefficiency by O.V.S.organisers and realised the need to improve. However, the tone of generalised criticism was unacceptable.

In view of the poor response, the Committee decided not to raise a 2nd Hockey XI, FRugby was poorly supported this too would be given up after 1983. (Proposed from the Chair and seconded by M.M.Gilliat)

Dr Barron himself came to Reading in 1931, on appointment to a newly-created post of County Veterinary Advisory Officer. Working from a laboratory in Redlands Road, his "county" in fact came to cover eight counties, roughly equivalent in area to the present-day South-East Region! With a small staff, he laid the foundations of what is now the Veterinary Investigation Centre for Oxon, Berks, Bucks and Surrey.

He energetically inquired into farm problems of infection, feeding and metabolism, breeding, etc, as well as lecturing to farmers and maintaining extensive contacts with professional colleagues. During this period (which included the war years), he made the first identification in iffithis country of the organism which at that time was causing a troublesome form of abortion in cattle.

During the period from their local committee. 1927 (when he qualified as a / In his younger days Veterinary Surgeon) until 1931, Dr Barron studied scientific methods of diagnosis at the Central Veterinary

Laboratory at Weybridge; at Cambridge, where he spent 18 months; and at German Universities.

A few weeks ago only, he was busily concerning himself with the organising of the Centenary Veterinary Congress then being held at Reading University.

Dr Barron retired from the Ministry of Agriculture service in 1953 to join a commercial feeding stuffs firm as chief of its Advisory Service until the time of his second retirement some years ago. His wide experience of livestock disease and husbandry advisory work led him to write books aimed at the increasing number of highly literate farmers and farm workers - thus pioneering an activity which has proliferated since. Two of these books, on dairy cattle and pigs, continue to be sold.

As a contemporary and friend of the late Dr W R Wooldridge, Dr Barron was a great enthusiast for the Animal Health Trust, founded in 1942, and was chairman of the local county committee for a considerable period. He was also a member of the National Farmers Union and was on

In his younger days he had been a skier and a keen hockey player.

Dr Barron is survived by his wife and their son.

# Peter Caston

To older Old Vikings Peter Caston will not even be a name, but to those who have been in the school in the last five years he will be much more than a name. I can only write this short obituary personally.

Peter was in my house at Repton in 1962-5 and I had always kept closely in touch with him and with his parents, above all through his brother Derek who was in Burr House. After early academic difficulties Peter qualified as a teacher and specialised in the less gifted, but above all in those who had particular difficulties in English. It was a happy moment for Shiplake and myself when he append to join us in January, 1977.

The impact he made was considerable. He had a quiet approach but insisted on the highest standards. He was not interested in frills, wall diagrams and so on. No one with problems was ever turned away. On one occasion I remonstrated with him that not only was his timetable totally filled but a lot of his free time as well "I con't refuse. They are so well worth helping." That was his attitude always and what better epitaph could anyone have.

But he was a good pll-round athlete; he helped with the shooting because he felt shooters were not getting a fair showing. He man the 2nd XI Cricket and made the tean mediate what fun it could all be. He loved games and played them all with full enjoyment.

The big moment in his career at Shiplake was his appointment as housemaster of Burr. He felt it was a challenge really worthy of him. By all accounts his impact was considerable and in the four terms he was working he helped a number of boys by his example, his sense of understanding, his loyalty and his dedication. Perhaps more than in anything, it was his astonishing fight in his illness following a major operation. With courage he fought and for a time looked to be winning. I am told his short talk to the boys in March was something they will never forget. But it was not to be. All who saw him or spoke to him in his last weeks bear witness of his tranquillity and his cheerful optimism.

He was a great family man and to his charming wife and three children go our deepest sympathy. In their tragic loss. They will have the knowledge that Peter gave his all in the service of others. That surely can be said of very few.

- 2. Minutes of the Last Meeting:
- 3. <u>Matters arising out of the Minutes</u>: These were passed over as there was no meeting in 1981.

# Summary of Ideas Expressed to Date

- 1. To be held on the Summer term OVS Day (a Saturday in June).
- 2. Two main issues :
  - 2.1 How do we encourage OV's to come ?
  - 2.2 What format should the day take ?

## 3. Encouraging OV's to Come

- 3.1 Offering an attractive day which appeals to all ages of OV's is encouragement in itself.
- 3.2 Personal contact rather than just the standard circular invitation is essential.
- 3.3 It is preferable that this personal contact should be made by someone who knows the OV well, i.e. the same year at college.
- 3.4 The Address Book provides the key to enable us to contact the OV's.

## 4. Format of the Day

- 4.1 Normal OV's sporting activities Cricket Rowing Tennis Shooting
- 4.2 History of the School Exhibition and book.
- 4.3 The day should centre around a free buffet lunch. Wine would be sold by the usual arrangements.
- 4.4 Boat trips on the river.
- 4.5 Donkey rides for children on the far ground.

### Additional Thoughts from RJD

5. There is an additional key issue of setting up the administration to plan and run this event.

## 6. Encouraging OV's to Come

- 6.1 An invitation (with a RSVP) and full details should be sent out 7 weeks ahead of the event. The invitation should be addressed from and signed by the appropriate contemporary OV, see 8.1.
- 6.2 If there is no reply by 4 weeks ahead of the event, a phone call should be made.
- 6.3 Special terms should be negotiated with an hotel in Henley for putting up OV's on Saturday night. This deal would be detailed in the circular to attract people with long journeys to make.
- 6.4 Equal effort should be made to encourage "Old Masters" and current staff to come.

# 7. Format of the Day Suggestions

- 7.1 We have to cater for OV's who can range in age from 17 to 40. In addition, people may come on their own, or with a girlfriend/wife or with their family. We must therefore ensure that there is enough of interest to attract each of the above categories.
- 7.2 A childrens entertainment section could be held. Perhaps a childrens entertainer could be hired.
- 7.3 Gymnastics display.
- 7.4 How can we use the Sports Hall ?
- 7.5 OV's v Boys Superstar competition running throughout the day.
- 7.6 Should the buffet be held outside or inside ? What happens if it rains ?

## 8. Administration

- 8.1 Assuming there are approximately 1,000 OV's that we have addresses for, we would need 20 people to be responsible for contacting 50 OV's each. Also assuming that the 13 members of the Committee are automatic choices, then an additional 7 people need recruiting.
- 8.2 I propose that JDE should be asked to be responsible for co-ordinating the "Old Masters" ' campaign.
- 8.3 It is essential that a current member of staff (i.e. who is on the "spot") should be appointed as a central co-ordinator with responsibility for such things as catering, etc.

It is with the deepest regret and sense of loss that I have to record the deaths of two Old Vikings and the baby son of Chris and Pam Collins.

- 6. <u>Contribution to Shiplake College Appeal Fund</u>: It was agreed that the College authorities should be authorised to spend £500 on the re-stringing and general renovation of the Grand Piano as the Society's contribution to the College Appeal.
- 7. <u>Bursary</u>: The Headmaster spoke briefly about the possibility of the Society establishing a Bursary at College for the sons of Old Boys. After a short discussion, which centred around funds available and funds required, it was decided to shelve the idea indefinitely.
- 8. <u>Address Book</u>: The Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to the President and Mrs J A Leigh for all their hard work, which had resulted in a most useful publication. This was passed unanimously. The general feeling of the meeting was that the cost of printing was high and that the quality of the published book not in keeping with the cost. It was also agreed that this item should be brought up at the Annual General Meeting for discussion, with reference to the Annual General Meeting Minutes for 1973. (iii) Secretary: It has been agreed at an earlier meeting that if possible, the Secretary to the Society should be a member of staff, and the Chairman announced that H.E.Wells-Furby, Esq., had agreed to accept the post and the Chairman proposed that he should take over his duties as from 1st September, 1982. Mrs E.A.Cooke seconded and the proposal was accepted. It was also agreed that the present secretary should continue to serve on the Committee. (iv) H.E.Wells-Furby: It was confirmed that H.E.Wells-Furby, Esq., would be acting as host to Old Boys who had been in either Skipwith House or Everett House on 19th June, 1982. (v) Donation: It was announced that a cheque for £15 had been sent to the Cot Death Foundation in memory of David Ross Collins (27.11.81 - 9.2.82), son of Mr and Mrs C.J.Collins, Shiplake College. (vi) 1984: A general discussion took place concerning the Silver Jubilee celebrations. It was felt that the occasion must be celebrated during term time and that it might be better to concentrate on a buffet lunch rather than a major event in the evening. It was also agreed in principle that there would be a full sports programme and possibly other attractions such as river trips. It was also hoped that the boys would be able to contribute to make it a day to remember. The matter will come up for further discussion at the Annual General Meeting. (vii) Shiplake Lock Keeper Fund: The Headmaster announced that the College and Friends had raised over £500 towards the fund that was set up to help the widow and family of Peter Gough, who was drowned when on duty in January, 1982.

There being no other business, the Chairman closed the Meeting at 12.04.

#### OID VIKING THEFTER

Dear Old Viking,

Before I start this year's letter of past achievements and future hopes, may I draw your attention to two enclosures of importance. The first is the Society's new address book compiled by our President, Mr.J.D.Eggar, with the help of Mrs Leigh, our resident secretary, and Peter Lovegrove, who volunteered on behalf of the family printing firm to publish it. At the moment, the idea is that the book will be republished once every five years. In order that you can keep your book as up to date as possible, you will receive with the January Newsletter of the intervening years a list of latost addresses, which you can stick on to the blank pages provided at the back of the book. Inside the book you will find a message from the President.

The second enclosure is a note from Mr.H.B.Wells-Furby. As most of you will be well aware, 1984 is our Silver Jubilee year and amongst other things it was suggested that a history of College should be published. Mr.Wells-Furby was approached and gladly accepted the challenge. I think that you will find his missive self explanatory.

#### COLLEGE NEWS

In my letter of January, 1979, I wrote 'At the moment College is managing to accommodate 317 boys with no sign of the numbers falling in the immediate future.' It is pleasing to be able to report that on the first full day of the Winter term, 1981, there were more than 330 boys on the roll and the vaiting lists have been closed until September, 1983. To those of you who may be considering sending your son to College may I suggest that you put his name down as soon as possible.

On the academic front, it is now a firm policy that only those boys who are seen as bona fide '0' level candidates are entered for public examinations. As a result of this, the '0' level results of 1981 were encouraging but the 'A' level results were not up to the standard achieved in 1980. Even so, David Lethbridge with an A and two B's, deserves special mention, and the Art results at both 'A' and '0' level were particularly commendable. As far as University entries are concerned, the following members of the 1979/80 Upper Sixth are now at University: Charles de Roemer (mentioned in my January, 1981 newsletter), Jonathan Ringrose (Surrey), Nick Newington (L.S.E.), Mark Ellis (Bangor), David Maudsley (Buckingham), Louis Fizzorni (Boston), and James Bolputt (University College, Los Angeles). In addition, several members of that year are either reading for degree courses at Polytechnics or, having completed a successful foundation cours in Art, are completing their studies at Colleges of Higher Education.

#### BUILDINGS

There seems to be no end to expansion at College. This time it is the turn of Orchard House. Awaiting completion is a new single storey building in the proximity of 'old' Orchard House, which will house not only the day boys of Orchard but also the new Music Schools. The new Orchard House building will be a completely self-contained, purpose-built boys' house, where there will be ample working space, a recreation area and good changing-room facilities. The 'old' building will be retained and used as an overspill. The Governors have decided to advertise early this year for two sixth form day boy scholars, as it is generally felt that Orchard has a major part to play in Shiplake's future, especially as there is a real need for independent day schooling in the Henley area.

College has also purchased the house directly opposite the main entrance, called Meadow Keep. Like Plowden Cottage, it possesses a granny flat and so will be available to house a master and some boys.

The Tithe Barn project is also going ahead as quickly as possible. It is now equipped with a permanent stage with doors leading on to it from Classroom three; the projection box had been replaced by a new unit which will house a video recorder, lighting console and projection box. The first dramatic performance to be staged in the re-vamped barn was a musical version of Charles Dickens' 'Christmas Carol', entitled 'Scrooge'.

In the school as a whole music is flourishing. Several concerts are performed each year, sometimes with a little help from outside, and last year's musical programme included a performance of 'Carmina Burana' in which the whole school took part, either singing or playing an instrument. At the moment, no fever than fifty-seven members of College are learning to play a musical instrument.

## SPORT

#### Cricket:

The 1st XI started the season sluggishly, losing three out of their first four matches and drawing the fourth, but they showed much more drive in the second half of the season. The final analysis was Won 4, Drawn 3, Lost 5.

A report of the game against the Old Vikings follows:

The O.V.S.batted first on a perfect pitch scoring 209 runs for 5 wickets declared. Ian Munday and Simon Schwerdt batted well, putting on 75 runs for the second wicket. Then Richard Devas and Richard Woodward scored freely in a partnership of 94 runs before declaring, leaving the 1st XI plenty of time to score the necessary runs.

An attractive start was made by Chancellor and Macleod for the 1st wicket but hoth were out for 21 runs with the score on 44. Then Checketts and Gordon-Taylor settled down and took the score to 138. Unfortunately 3 wickets fell quickly with the scoreboard showing 148 for 5. However, Nice and Woodhouse batted enterprisingly and took the score to 193 with 3 overs remaining and some final flourishes and run outs the game finished in a draw with the College returning to the pavilion with the total at 208 for 8. It was credit to both sides and the pitch that over 400 runs were scored in the day. The boulers on both sides worked hard with good support from the fielders on a warm sunny day which made the eveningt feastivities all the more enjoyable.

#### Rowing

Overall it was a most successful year. The 1st VIII acquitted themselves well in the Princess Elizabeth Cup at Henley Royal Regatta when they reached the semi-finals and then lost to Holy Spirit High School, U.S.A., the eventual winners of the final.

The Junior Under 16's had a tremendous season, which culminated in gold medals for the 1st IV and also gold medals for the eight which was made up of the 1st IV and the Junior 16 IV of Kingston Grammar School, at the National Championships.

The Junior 15 IV's also had a memorable season.

All in all it has been a hard enjoyable season, and I feel a successful one.

## YEAR OF THE DISABLED

In 1979 the son of the groundsman of Bedales School in Hampshire had a motorcycle accident which paralysed him from the neck down. Because of expert medical attention, he now has some movement in his arms and thanks to the efforts of the pupils at Bedales, he also has acquired a magnificent wheelchair (built in Germany but designed in England) which makes his life more normal and acceptable. As 1981 was the Year of the Disabled, Neil Slatter docided to go on a "Wheelabout Britain", which meant that he stayed at many public schools. Shiplake was on his route, and we were privileged to accommodate this remarkable young man. To celebrate his stay, the boys decided to raise some money. Accordingly, they offered their services free to the local residents and managed to raise £600 through their efforts as babysitters, wine waiters, car washers, washers up, gardeners, window cleaners etc. Neil's declared aim was to raise £100,000. Go far the appeal stands at £40,000 with money still rolling in, and the first wheelchair has been bought and delivered.

#### STAFF NEWS

As most of you know, Reverend Basil Wilks retired at the end of the summer term, 1981, and a presentation was made to him by the Chairman of the Old Viking Society during the fork supper after the Old Boys' cricket match on June 20th.

Owing to ill-health, I resigned from College in May but am pleased to say that I was asked to continue as your correspondent and joint-secretary for the time being. I should like to take this opportunity of expressing my deep gratitude to all those Old Vikings who contributed to my farewell present, which was presented to me on September 27th, by the Chairman.

OLD VIKING LETTER

Dear Old Viking,

As I settle down to pen your New Year's letter on a gloomy and blustery evening, the Spring Term is not even forty-eight hours old, and yet during that short space of time we have experienced gales, rain, brilliant sunshine, snow, more rain and still more wind. It makes one shudder to think what is in store for us during the next few weeks. To add to the misery of some, public examinations have already begun and the trial examinations commence next week.

While on the subject of examinations, it is pleasing to record that last year's 'A' level results were our best ever, Charles de Roemer achieving an 'A' in Mathematics and a 'B' in Physics. He is going to read Mechanical Engineering at Loughborough and six other successful candidates are also going to University. It is also pleasing to record that many of those who did not 'make' University have found good jobs (many of them through the I.S.C.O.Appointments Scheme) whereas yet others have gone on to Polytechnics or some other form of Higher Education.

In sport, College had a mixed year. The Cricket XI did not do so well as they did in 1979, but the Rowing Club went from strength to strength. The 1st VIII won the Senior C Class at Wallingford and Monmouth and were entered for the Princess Elizabeth but were knocked out in the first round by the eventual winners. Four members of the 1st VIII were selected to row for England in the Home Championships in Ireland as a result of their efforts at the National Championships and duly won. The J15's and J14's also had a good year.

Shooting is also on the up-grade and there can be little doubt that postal matches help to raise the standard of the members of the VIII.

In addition to all this outdoor activity, the Junior Debating Team won the Henley Rotary trophy at the 'Youth Speaks' tournament, Mr.Welsh produced a world premiere in 'Trouble at Hive Nine', which the author had adapted from a radio play. He came to see the performance and was very complimentary. The College production for 1980 was 'Julius Caesar', which was acclaimed a great success.

At last the landing-stage has been completed, which means that two eights can be launched at the same time, and the Boat Club has also acquired another Carbocraft and a second transporter.

As far as concrete and mortar is concerned, the new Science Building is now fully operational. During the building process Science was being taught here, there and everywhere, and the Department struggled on manfully, to put it mildly, in adverse conditions.

The Tithe Barn project is now in full swing. Already, doors have been knocked through from Rooms 3 and 4, and a permanent base has been built for the organ at the North end. The whole project will take time, but at the same time take heart - it is all being financed by profits from the Summer Ball, the 1980

occasion being another sell-out and a huge success as a result.

At the end of this term Mrs.Suchet is leaving us to take up residence in Washington, where herhusband will be the resident I.T.N.reporter, and Mr.M.Lees is also leaving to take up a coaching career in rowing.

The end of the Summer Term will see the retirement of the Rev.Basil Wilks, who came to College in May, 1964. Over the years he has made a great impact on the characters and lives of many boys who have passed through our hands. Although a teacher first and foremost (he was not ordained until later on in life), he always had the pastoral life of the boys at heart. He had a shrewd insight into the problems of the young and resolved many a boy's dilemmas to good effect. He was also a familiar figure on the cricket field, where he coached the juniors, and also injected life into the College Photographic Club. He will be sadly missed but he will not be far away. He is retiring to Fawley, where he has been living for the past few years.

The Society continues to show its strength, but mainly on the sports field. Apart from the Hockey (1-1), the Old Vikings won everything there was to win, and a report of the cricket match follows:

#### 0.V.S.Cricket '80

The O.V.S.maintained their long unbeaten run against the school at cricket by achieving a 55 runs victory. The O.V's, put in to bat on a rain-affected wicket, were always struggling to make a good total. They achieved 107 all out with half the runs coming from a stand between Mark Jones and Richard Devas.

The O.V's, aware of the danger of defeat, went out to field with grim determination. The school had no answer to some fine bowling from John Wright, Nick Lyttelton and James Cozens and went in to tea with the score at 20 for 8. Never before has such a fine allround fielding display been given by the O.V's. This excellence was typified by a 15 year old boy called A.StJ.N.Gordon-Taylor on loan from the school who took three excellent catches in the gally. Although tea slowed the O.V's momentum, they finally dismissed the school for 52 giving them a comfortable victory.

Although it is most pleasing to win games, a Society should have strength elsewhere, and one such strength is the line of communication from you to us. You only have to look at the Old Viking News Columns to see the apathy that prevails. This also very much applies to new addresses not being supplied, as a result of which we receive a letter of complaint from the Old Viking concerned for not having received a newsletter.

Let us all try to put these matters right in 1981.

We hope to see many of you here for the hockey on Sunday, March 15th, and even more for the cricket and fork supper on Saturday, June 20th.

### <u>Old Viking</u>s

As this is my last Committee Meeting, I feel it right that I should put down on paper certain thoughts, some my own, some as a result of meeting and talking with Old Vikings in the last year. Above all I want them to be regarded as thought provoking and I hope constructive.

Any Old Boys' Society stands or falls by the quality of its communication backed up by good policy making by its committee. Until the Society was run from the College there were obvious difficulties about collecting of subscriptions, addresses and so on.

Since the Society was run from here the subscription side has become nearly fool proof, but the fact that Appeals brochures have been returned 'gone away' and I suspect several others consigned to the waste paper basket by the new owners of the house to which it was addressed speaks for itself. My only actual experience of address problems is the Old Reptonian Society and in the last letter the names of 67 Old Boys' Address'unknown were given. We compare very unfavourably with these figures.

How are we going to improve this and with whom does the fault lie?

It is very easy to lay blame on the Old Boy who fails to send his change of address and main blame must attach to him but I am certain I have been to blame when talking to leavers that I have not emphasised strongly enough their responsibility to notify us. Equally I feel a yearly reminder in the annual letter might help.

But I am certain that we do not do enough once we get the envelope back 'not known here'. It is at this moment that some new ideas should be introduced. Obviously the missing Old Viking must be put down in the next Old Viking letter, but I feel someone should make a few enquiries at this point. Who should this be?

Possibly the Secretary or perhaps better an exact contemporary. If the latter then as a year leaves the Secretary must try to persuade two or three boys to be correspondants for their year. For those already left, a similar scheme might be introduced with correspondants for each year or group of years or possibly for areas. I do feel this would be worth discussing in Committee.

Next I consider it vital that we produce as soon as possible an Old Boys Address Book. It should not cost a lot and should be alphabetical as follows:

B(Burr) '74 (date of arrival here) P.D.Jones, address

If the address is unknown, then the house date and name only are put down. It is possible that Mrs.Ruth Goddard, the Appeal Secretary, might be able to prepare these lists before she leaves in mid-March Equally, an address book must be available, kept in the Secretary's office normally, but out in a prominent place, properly marked, and we must try to establish that each Old Viking when he comes down automatically puts his name and present address in the book. The Secretary will obviously then check with the latest address.

The two main functions of the year are the Annual General Meeting in October, and the other function we decide on in Committee. Personally I don't think an Old Viking letter in May is much use as a spreader of dates of events happening in October. Equally the January news letter though it has given proper notice of this summer's festivities will not produce anything but a trickle of applications. For this year there will have to be a separate follow up in April/early May in which two lists are produced.

- (a) Past Staff who are coming
- (b) Old Vikings who have already said they will come

It will still not be a success even then unless representatives of each year are goaded into activity with addresses of their year.

Finally I would ask the Committee to authorise a short note in the society page of the Telegraph about May 15th to the effect that any Old Boy who has not received an invitation to the 20th Anniversary reunion on June 23rd, is asked to get in touch with the Secretary immediately.

I am afraid this is very long, so I have asked the Secretary to send it out so that it can be studied before the Committee Meeting.

## OLD VIKING LETTER

Dear Old Viking,

It is a tradition to start Old Boys' Letters with up to the minute information on the state of the school and this edition will be no exception.

#### COLLEGE NEWS:

This term there are 316 boys in the school, an increase of 31 in the course of the year, and you may well be wondering where we have found space to accommodate them. During the year Everett House underwent an expansion programme which meant that the sixty-eight boys can now be accommodated under one roof. Previous to that, eight of them had been 'exiled' to outlying areas, one of which was a house in Lower Shiplake, which is still rented by the College. The resident master is Mr. J.M.S.Woodcock, and he and his wife look after eight boys from Burr House. The College has also rented a house in Binfield Heath, where Mrs. E.Cooke looks after four boys from Welsh House. Some senior boys also occupy the caterer's flat, and the head of College is in residence in the adjacent bed-sitter.

Last term saw the final adjustments to the conversion of the old stables, opposite 'Melteni', into our new Music School with a flat on the top floor for occupation by the Director of Music. We are also in the process of installing a new fire-warning system throughout the school. So far only the Main Building has been completed and there have already been several false alarms. In order to comply with the regulations issued by the powers that be, smoke detectors have had to be installed and these were the cause of our alarms and excursions. It must be recorded that no smokers were flushed from hidden corners but it came to light that boys in Skipwith House appear to enjoy following the tradition of King Alfred and the cakes!

During the course of 1978, Welsh House will at last have its own changing-rooms, which means that the basement will have a face-lif, and new-look changing-rooms will be available for visiting teams. So, as you can see, College is certainly not standing still.

On the examination front, the results overall were average although the number of C.S.E. Grade 1's showed a considerable improvement, while on the cultural side, music has still been the predominant feature. There was a summer Concert in the Marquee, 'H.M.S.Pinafore' was the main dramatic feature, Handel's 'Messiah' (part one) was performed in Hambleden Church and the annual Carol Service was the clima<sub>X</sub> to a very busy Winter term. In the Spring term the Third and Fourth Form plays were 'On Monday Next', produced by Mr. D.F.K.Welsh, and 'Hip-Hip Horatio', which was produced by Mr. M.L.Woodcock - yes, another musical.

At the end of last term Mr. Welsh gave up his housemastership of Welsh House after twelve years. He and his family have moved to their newly purchased house in Henley, and he will continue to teach at College, where he runs the Mathematical Department. Mr. R.A.Esau has taken over Welsh House, and Mr. D.S.Partridge is now housemaster of Orchard House and resident once again in Tudor Cottage.

As far as sport has been concerned, College has had a mixed year. The Hockey XI - ably led by Andrew Horne - has a very useful sease during which they played 11 matches, won 7, drew 1, and lost 3. The Cricket XI, under the captaincy of Ian Munday, played 14 games, won 5, drew 5, and lost 4. The Rugger XV, again led by Ian Munday, had a rather disappointing season - played 16, won 6, drew 2, lost 8.

#### THE SOCIETY:

The thanks of College are due to the Society on two counts for what they have done during 1977. First, thanks to you, we now have in the chapel two Choir-cum-Communion rails, which enhance the look of the Sanctuary immensely. They were made by Mr. J.W. Whittington and eventually will bear a plaque to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee Year. You will also remember that in my last newsletter I appealed to you on behalf of the College Library. Again, thanks to you and many parents the final total reached was £630.

Unfortunately it has been a poor year for the Society and its sporting achievements. Against College they lost the hockey 1 - 5the squash matches 3 - 6 (in March) and 3 - 4 (in October), the tennis, the rugger by 7 - 38 (lst XV) and 0-29 (2nd XV) but they won the cricket by 4 wickets and the shooting by 154 to 145, whereas the rowing seemed to end in neither side winning! They also lost their rugger fixture against the Old Royals by 30 - 0. Let us all hope for better results in 1978.

## SOCIAL COMMENT

On June 26th, 1977, a gaudy was held at College for all age groups. Attendance was a little disappointing but all those who came agreed that it was all good fun. Drinks and lunch were provided on the terrace and there was plenty of sport to watch because it was also Old Boys' Day. At the moment we are looking ahead to 1979 and our twentieth anniversary. We hope to make it a really big occasion and would welcome any ideas from you as to what form it might take. What we do hope to have erected by then is an Honours' Board on which we want to record the names of all those old boys who have achieved a 1st Class Honours Degree, or Doctorate, or higher award, in the academic field and/or who have represented Great Britain in sport at an international level. I should be most grateful if all those who qualify would let me have full

details on the enclosed form, even if I already have them. The last thing we want to do is leave somebody out!

In July, 1977, we again had a terrifically successful Summer Ball. This, as you know, is an annual occasion and it looms large in many people's social diary. This year it will be held on Friday, July 7th, and Mr. Esau assures me that tickets will be held as close to £5.00 as possible. The sum raised in 1977 was over £1,200, and all proceeds go into a fund set aside for a sports hall, which we hope to have in the not too distant future. At the moment the project is at the planning stage and is the subject under negotiation with Foster Wheeler's of Reading.

On Friday, March 31st, 1978, the Biennial Dinner will be held at College. As last time, ladies and friends will be most welcome. The cost will be pegged at £3.50 and will include a glass of sherry and port. There will also be a bar and wine will be available. Please fill in the enclosed form and return to me not later than Monday, March 13th.

In conclusion, may I again trouble you for your views on the newsletter. At the Annual General Meeting in October it was mooted that we should revert to two newsletters per annum, in January and June, and it was agreed that you should be asked through this edition what you views are. Please let me know on the enclosed form as soon as possible.

I wish you all a very happy and prosperous New Year.

## OBITUARY

It is with the deepest regret that I have to record the death of 'Ronnie' Hartley on the Monday of Holy Week, 1977. He was appointed a master at College in September, 1959, and almost immediately took over the Housemastership of Burr House, which he relinquished in December, 1963. He was a gifted teacher of modern languages and on leaving College in April, 1965, he went to teach at Windsor Technical College. #### OLD VIKING LETTER

Dear Old Viking,

As you all know, last year we held the Annual General Meeting and rugger match against College on a Saturday for the first time. It was generally agreed that the number of Old Vikings who turned up either as players or as supporters was well down on previous years. As a result, it was also agreed at the Annual General Meeting that a tear-off slip should be enclosed with this letter so that you can decide whether the Annual General Meeting and rugger match should revert to a Sunday or stay as a Saturday fixture. So before I go any further, may I ask you to fill in this form and return it to me as soon as possible. Would you also please note that there is space to fill in your latest address if it has changed in recent months. It is vital that we have your current address for obvious reasons!.

#### COLLEGE NEWS:

At the beginning of the academic year our numbers stood at 274 and these will have increased by about another ten by the time you receive this letter. Owing to this upsurge in our numbers, accommodation is, to put it mildly, a headache. We have, however, been lucky in acquiring on reasonable leases two houses - one in. Lower Shiplake and one in Binfield Heath. Mr.and Mrs. Mark Woodcock will look after the boys in Lower Shiplake and Mrs. Cooke will act as foster-mother to four boys from Welsh House in Binfield Heath.

Our 'A' and 'O' results in the Summer were rather disappointing compared with the previous year, but we expect better results in January and June of 1977. It was good to see the old rowing firm back in action this summer. I refer to those members of College's original IV -Malcolm Shingler, Bill Eaton, Gus Coulton and Michael Matthews. The only pity was that Victor Durman could not be here to complete the crew but he has now emigrated to Canada. We are also grateful to these Old Vikings for presenting a tankard to be competed for annually. While on the subject of rowing, I should like on behalf of the Society to extend our sincerest congratulations to Richard Lester on his magnificent performance at the Montreal Olympics last year.

One outstanding feature of the year has been the enthusiasm that has been aroused by the new Director of Music. It has indeed been a year of sound; the inter-House Competition was revived and a very high degree of proficiency was reached. In the Summer term Mr. Woodcock organised a most ambitious Concert which took place afloat and on shore. Last term saw 'Oliver', the musical based on 'Oliver Twist', as our major production for the year. There was an evening of Elizabethan songs, music, and dancing when we were joined by girls from North Falkland Lodge School. After that we combined with girls from Queen Anne's, Caversham, to give a performance of Bach's Christmas Oratorio in Hambleden Church. Finally, there was of

- 5. Chairman's Report: Sport 1. Rugger the two games played during the afternoon had both been won by College. The 1st XV won 26 - 4 and the 2nd XV won 18 - 0. 2. Squash - one match had been organised but unfortunately it had to be cancelled. 3. Cricket - the O:V.X1 won very convincingly. 4. Rowing - the original College rowing 1V minus G.Coulton turned out and beat College. The O.V. crew very kindly presented a trophy for the event.5. Hockey - the O.V. X1 drew 1 - 1 with College. Dear Old Viking,

Those of you who attended the last Annual General Meeting in October will remember that a resolution was passed to the effect that the next newsletter should be produced at home so as to save money. In addition, it was agreed that you, the members, should be encouraged to air your views about the lay-out and production of this latest publication. Consequently, I should be pleased to receive any such comments in writing and should certainly welcome constructive ideas about how we can continue to provide a communication service as cheeply and efficiently as possible.

It was also agreed at the last A.G.M. that you will receive only one copy of the Newsletter per year, so please make a note of all dates of interest as you will receive no reminders whatsoever. While on this point, I do feel that too many of us do rely too much on being reminded about Old Viking Society functions through the post, but if you think abount it, I am sure you will agree that the Society just cannot go on spending its capital on postage when about 10% of such mail: that is sent out is returned to College because of changes of address. Again, then, please let us know if you change your address. I am sorry to bring this subject up yet again, but it is vital that we are kept informed about your movements, not least because we are interested.

#### COLLEGE NEWS

The second half of 1975 saw more progress made in various ways at College. Our 'A' and'O' level results showed some improvement on previous years, and the creation of the Upper Fourth would appear to have stimulated competition in the Lower School. As far as public examinations are concerned, we now hire the new Parish Hut next to Welsh House. It is airy and warm and a great boon.

As far as improvements are concerned, there have been many. The kitchens have been completely re-equipped, the Catering Manager's flat plus bedsitter has been completed, Welsh House has been revired the stage has had and is still in the process of having , a face-lift, and the Great Hall is now equipped with permanent speakers and a lighting system. Here let me say a sincere 'thank you' to Anthony Klinger for all his help, sweat and labour in this direction. In addition, the Library and Skipwith House Day-room have been redecorated, and new lighting has been installed in the former. There is also a new and much larger Day Boys' House in situ in the Orchard, and Mr. Esau has a study there as well. The Old Day Boys' House is now used by Burr House for prep. purposes, and Mr. Partridge, who has moved out of Tudor Cottage to make way for Mr. Esau, has a study there. At the time of writing, contractors are busy constructing an access road in the Orchard to the Day Boys' House. Finally, the old yew hedge bordering the drive by the Science Block has been uprooted, and shrubs and turf have replaced it, giving an openplanned look as one comes down the drive.

On the sports side we have had a rather mixed second half to the year. The 1st X1 were a keen side with some potential but the luck never ran their way. Even so, they were a young side and most of them will be available for 1976. On the other hand, the 1st XV enjoyed a very reasonable season, as the following report shows.

> "The lst XV, probably the youngest on record at an average age of 16 years 5 months, enjoyed an exciting and occasionally highly successful season. The majority of the 6 defeats could be ascribed to immaturity rather than poor performances, for as many as four matches were lost by a margin of five points each.

Several records were broken during the term:

The team scored a record number of points, 303; and Hassan Alireza's individual contribution of 165 points beat the record established by Carlos Caralts in 1969. Finally, the 61 - 4 victory over Ottershaw School witnessed a lst XV points record against a school side.

Undoubtedly the outstanding performance of the season was the splendid 23 points all draw achieved at Reeds School, Cobham.

Hassan Alireza, Simon Barnes and Alistair Newman gained places in the Oxon U/19 team and, all in all, a marked improvement in the fixture list should now be possible for next season."

Perhaps I could add here that the Old Viking Society have enjoyed their most successful season to date, amongst their scalps being that of College, when they beat by 15 points to 10, the try scorers for the Old Viking Society being Ian Baldry and Stephen Mitchell. Unfortunately I cannot give any further details as the Club's report has not come to hand.

The following is a report by the manager of the Old Viking Society X1 match versus College.

"The Old Viking Society got off to a good start by the fact that the X1 turned up fifteen minutes early enabling us to get off to a prompt start (unheard of before).

The school, having won the toss, batted first. The school, with Munday (36), looked as if they were set for a large score. However, David Lansdowne, with 6 - 48, limited the school to 146.

The Old Viking Society in reply got off to a solid start thanks to Andrew Gordon and Christopher Pelloe. However, we slumped to 37 for 3, but then David Lansdowne (63 not out) and Richard Devas (45 not out) saw the Old Viking Society out of danger and safely hame to a comfortable seven wicket victory.

During the afternoon a bottle of whisky had been raffled on their behalf. It was also agreed that travel expenses should be subsidised to a certain degree and that the treasurer would be in control of all such money transactions.

In the future, the Club will organize teas for home matches in order to save money and a cash payment will be made by members at away matches.

The Rugger Club Committee will consist of:

There was mention that the Club might become a member of the County Union within 2 years.

12. Any Other Business: (i) Addresses - Mr.A.B.Docker asked what had happened to the proposed new address list. The treasurer replied that the scheme proposed by Blundells School had fallen through.

(ii) Honorary members: Mr.K.R.Mitchell queried the benefit of such a list as the majority appeared to do nothing to help the Society.

There being no other business the chairman closed the meeting at 6.06 p.m.

. Apologies for .bsence: There were no apologies for absence.

. <u>Minutes of .ast .ceting</u>: The minutes of the last meeting were read, approved, and signed by the chairman.

3. <u>Matters arising out of the minutes</u>: (i) Mr.Gilliat pointed out that arrangements for OVS Rugger Club teas at College had not been honoured for the first match. It was agree! that this must not recur.

(ii) Mr.Ridell enquired about the possibility of hiring the Henley pitch. Mr.Baldry reported that they could not rely on the hiring of it. On the subject of Rugger Club expenses the treasurer recommended that such expenses be not divorced from the OVS general fund. This was accepted. Discussion then centred round the annual amount that the Club should be allocated per annum. It was agreed that it should be put to the AGM that the sum of £40 be allocated, match tea fees should be collected from players at the time, and that any other monies raised by the Rugger Club should be put into the general fund for the use of the Rugger Club.

- (iii) Mr.Pelloe reported on the success of the cocktail party held in London. Some 20 Old Vikings and their guests attended.
- (iv) Mr.Gilliat reported on the success of the dance held in July and thanked the OVS for their help and support. The sum raised should be in the region of £000. The headmaster pointed out that the final sum would be invested.
- 4. Election of Afficers for 1875/76: The chairman was persuaded to stay on for his s second year of office. - 7. Social Functions for 1975/76: Mr.Pelloe said that he had enquired in London about the possibility of a Dinner/Dance but he found the prices prohibitive. It was agreed that the biennial dinner would be held at College on Friday, 26th March, 1973, C.CO p.m. for 8.30 p.m. Dress: lounge suits. A slip would be enclosed with the January Newsletter. Mr.Ridell said he would look into the possibility of CAMRA running the bar for the next annual dance. Messrs. Hayman and Ridell both offered their services for this occasion.
- Old Boys' Fixtures for 1976: Mr.Hayman said that he hoped to raise 2 hockey teams and that the matches would be played on Sunday, 14th March, 1976. The cricket match and other summer fictures would take place on Sunday, 27th June, 1976, and the rugger match would be played on Sunday, 30th October, 1976.
- 9. <u>Honorary Member's List</u>: The chairman stated that Mr.Gilliat had produced an up to date list of honorary members, as he had been requested to do. This list was then need and approved. Mr.J.R.Scottorn was to be approached by the chairman with a view to inviting him to become an honorary member.
- D. <u>Any other Business</u>: (i) The headmaster said that bar arrangements for today were that the JCR would be closed during the AGM and that after that drinks would be available in the JCR and the Tithe Barn.
  - (ii) The chairman brought up the problems confronting the production of the Newsletter and discussion centred around the cost of production and the time of its publication. It was decided to leave the matter to the AGM.

# Old Viking Letter

Shiplake College, Henley-on-Thames.

June, 1975.

Dear Old Viking,

As I look out of my study windows with the sun pouring down out of a cloudless sky, I can but reflect on the fact that only five days ago at this time I and some 700 others were assembled in the marquee for speeches, and the rain was pouring down. For the first time in our history we had Speech Day as early as we could because of examinations and other complications, and for the first time we had solid rain for thirty-six hours. Indeed, it was typical of much of the weather we endured during the Spring Term, when the Henley all-weather pitches came to our rescue yet again.

Despite the climatic gloom, however, we managed to play most of our matches with the final tally reading as follows:—played 9, won 2, drawn 1, lost 6.

The games against the O.V.s produced some good hockey for both sets of teams, the final score being: 1st XI, 1—O.V.s 1st XI 1; and the 2nd XI, 2, O.V.s 2nd XI 1.

O.V.s 1st XI consisted of: Ian Baldrry, Mark Hayman (capt.), Martin Guillaume, Eddie Thong, Steve Mitchell, Max Patterson, Andrew Gordon, Richard Devas, Julian Mackenzie-Charrington, Julian Clayton and John Hincklieff.

The following is a report of the match as seen through the eyes of the captain:—

'Once again the O.V.s have failed in their attempt to beat the College at hockey. This year's match was a game of mixed fortunes and missed chances, both teams missing several goals. In the first half the O.V.s were under heavy pressure from the school; much of this stemmed from the fact that many old boys had not touched a hockey stick since last year's game. However, under the generalship of Steve Mitchell in defence we managed to reach half-time only one goal down. This goal resulted from a quick free hit catching many O.V.s out of position. In the second half the O.V.s began passing more effectively and, with a few tactical changes, the forwards began causing a few problems in the College defence. After a series of short corners in the College circle, a well worked move between Andrew Gordon and Richard Devas resulted in Julian Mackenzie-Charrington scoring a much deserved goal. Over all, I think the result was a fair reflection of the game.'

Unfortunately, the expected report on the 2nd XI game was never forthcoming!

This term, as you know, Old Boys' Day is on Sunday, June 29th, when we hope to have tennis, rowing, shooting, and sailing, in addition to the cricket fixture. If you are interested in taking part in any of these activities, and have done nothing about it, contact the team manager concerned as soon as possible. Their names, addresses, and telephone numbers appear at the end of this letter.

Similarly, would all those who would like to play rugger for the Society in the coming season, please contact Ian Baldry without delay. The following is a report I have just received from the secretary of the Rugger Club on last season's fixtures and plans for the future.

'The Old Vikings' R.F.C. has continued to flourish this season, having played six matches up to Christmas with two matches having to be cancelled. Although the results could have been better—won 0, lost 4, drawn 2—as a young club I feel that the prospects for the future are very promising. As with any new club we are now at our most vulnerable stage where with a lack of enthusiastic support we could so easily "fold up."

'The opposition that we have been up against to date have been by no means of a low standard, with Beaconsfield R.F.C. for example fielding no less than seven regular members of their 1st XV. Considering we are a Sunday side with only a relatively small number of players playing full time club rugby, I feel it is a great credit to the team to be able to offer such positive and spirited opposition that has been displayed throughout the season. Although we came "unstuck" in the Past and Present match against Esau's XV I feel it would only be fair to say that the experience and physical advantage of Esau's XV enabled them to put on a magnificent display of open rugby which although tiresome for the opposition most certainly gave the spectators an enjoyable afternoon's entertainment (the result, 48—4).

Until we expand our pool of available players, i.e. until present members of the College who are leaving come and play for us plus present old boys who haven't as yet made themselves available but would like to do so, I am obliged in my capacity as club secretary to select the strongest side available.

'Up to now the organising of fixtures and the contacting of Old Vikings to find out their availability for matches has rested entirely on the shoulders of the captain and Bob Esau. Although I am more than willing to take on the responsibilities required of any club secretary, due to my Senior County squad commitments which take up most Sunday mornings it will not always be possible for me to play in every match; and thus it is imperative that there is a member who is prepared to fulfil this role of captain. 'Secondly, Bob Esau's enthusiasm and constructive advice have been invaluable but taking into consideration his responsibilities to the College as senior coach I feel that he has been burdened with a number of duties such as arranging after-match teas, which is a responsibility that should be carried out by one of the Old Vikings. Thus it is my intention next season to formulate a sub-committee of six playing members who can get together and share out fairly the responsibilities of the club, with the secretary being answerable to the Old Vikings' Committee. This will not only involve the arranging of match fixtures but will also cover the organising of social events for the club which will be of interest to all Old Vikings, players and non-players alike.

'Keith Mitchell, who held the club captaincy for '72-'73, started to formulate an address index system which I am still expanding; thus if there is any Old Viking who is playing regular club rugby and left before 1971 and would like to play for the Old Vikings then please get in touch with me.

'Lastly, on behalf of the club, I would like to thank the playing members of the College staff for their active support, in particular David Partridge who played in all the matches and led the scrum on a number of occasions: and secondly Bob Esau who played in all the matches with the exception of one, which was due to injury. The encouragement and enthusiasm of both these players has been very much appreciated.—Ian R. BALDRY (Club Secretary).'

While on the subject of rugger, it is pleasing to be able to record that two current members of the College—H. Alireza and S. S. Barnes— have been selected for the England Under-19 Trials.

A most successful cocktail party took place at Charing Cross Hospital, Fulham, on Saturday, April 5th. Yet again, numbers were fairly low—some twenty O.V.s turned up with their wives or girl friends but it was a most enjoyable evening and our thanks are due to Christopher Pelloe for making it all possible.

May I take this opportunity of reminding you of the Summer Ball due to take place on Friday, July 11th. Tickets are selling well and so apply now to make sure that you are not disappointed. The price is  $\pounds 3.50$ , and the Ball Committee plans to put a room aside for all Old Vikings who attend.

#### THE NEWSLETTER

At the last committee meeting there was a discussion about the future of the newsletter. It was pointed out that with soaring printing costs and another inevitable rise in the cost of postage the Society was in danger of spending much of its income in posting a newsletter twice a year to all its members, many of whom never receive it owing to change of addresses of which we have not been informed. No definite decision was made at the meeting but it was suggested that we should go to press only once a year in the future. The matter will come up for further discussion at the A.G.M., so please come along and say what you think should happen.

Finally, a word about College. I began this letter with a reference to Speech Day, and it was on that day that a new Italian-style Four was presented to the Boat Club by a group of parents led by Dr. Gilbert Scott. It is good to read that we still have in our midst so many parents who are prepared to help us in ways such as this despite inflation and all that goes with it. At the moment the College is maintaining a high level of intake and long may it last. But just as boys must come and go, so must some of the younger members of staff move on. This term we lose from the Common-room Mr. T. H. Jones and Mr. N. A. Randall, well known to most of you, and Mr. F. Hammersley and Mr. P. J. White.

Now it is my turn to leave you but not before reminding you of Old Boys' Day on June 29th and the A.G.M. and rugger match on October 12th.



# Old Niking Letter

SHIPLAKE COLLEGE,

HENLEY-ON-THAMES.

January, 1975.

Dear Old Viking,

Two years ago I reported in my opening sentence that "our numbers . . . are the highest in the School's history." It is pleasing to report once again that we have broken all records, our numbers at the beginning of this academic year standing at 244. Inevitably this has meant a slight increase in the classroom numbers but it has also led to a more youthful intake into the Common-room! It has also meant that the boarding accommodation has reached its absolute limits as a result of which we have gained more day-boys, and the Governors, in their infinite wisdom, authorised the purchase of a prefabricated building solely for the use of this term's new day-boys and three "old hands" in charge of them. The Housemaster of this small enclave—twelve in all—is Mr. R. A. Esau. For sport, all these day-boys are allocated to one of the other four houses.

During the Summer holidays many of the school's buildings—both private and public—had a long-awaited coat of paint, and the Science Block was given a new lease of life when all the rotten panels and windowframes were replaced. In addition, the Tithe Barn has been improved beyond recognition, thanks to the untiring efforts of Mr. J. W. Whittington. The "East" end has been completely boxed in and supplied with sliding doors that open to reveal the new altar and frontals set off by a pure white background. Most impressive. The school has also purchased a full width cinemascope screen, which is now in situ.

This year our examination results showed a slight improvement at "A" Level but the "O" Level results were disappointing. Partly as a result of this, a new system is in operation in the Lower School, where the Fourth Forms are divided into the Upper Fourth—the élite—and the Lower Fourth, the idea being to stimulate a greater sense of competition. At the moment, there can be no doubt that many of those in the Lower Fourth are determined to show that they are worthy of promotion.

During the Summer months the 1st XI, under the captaincy of Simon Low, had a disappointing season, playing 10, winning 2, drawing 0, and losing 8. The game against the O.V.S. resulted in a win for the O.V.S. by the margin of seven wickets. At the end of the Summer Term, the Common-room and School said farewell to Colonel W. H. C. Travers on his retirement from his teaching career. We are happy to say that he and Mrs. Travers will continue to live in Shiplake and will no doubt put in welcome appearances on the touchline and elsewhere. We also said goodbye to Mr. K. O. Thompson, who has left us for a lectureship in an Italian University.

## SOCIAL FUNCTIONS:

During the past few months College has been the venue for three very successful but vastly different gatherings. The first was the initial Old Boys' Gaudy for those who came to College between 1959 and 1963 Although the numbers were slightly disappointing, some thirty Old Boys and members of staff, attended by their wives or fiancées, turned up on what was a most gloriously hot day. Lunch was eaten al fresco on the terraces, House cricket matches were being played, and all in all nobody seemed to want to go.

The second function took the form of a Fête on Sunday, June 23rd, in order to raise money for a guide dog for the blind, which was the Chapel Committee's selected target for the year. We now have a trophy in the Library which bears witness to this fact.

The third function was held on Friday, July 15th, and it took the form of our Fifteenth Anniversary Ball. It was very well attended and it was good to see to many Old Boys in attendance on both sides of the bar. The evening was a great success and enough money was raised for the Bursar to put down a deposit on two Squash Courts.

On Sunday, October 13th, 1974, another most successful Old Boys' Day was held. In the rugger match in the afternoon the O.V.S. led 16—0 at half-time with tries by Mark Hale (2) and Ian Baldry. In the second half College slowly got on top and the final score of 16—16 was perhaps a just one. The A.G.M. took place after tea and the Minutes are enclosed. It would be pleasing to record that the A.G.M. turn-out was better than that of last year, but in actual fact there were some half a dozen fewer members. It is a pity that so many come to the match and then just wait around for the next item on the social list without making the effort to see how their club is run. I hope we can rectify this next year.

# SHIPLAKE COLLEGE APPEAL FUND

You may remember that in 1970 we launched an appeal and in the end raised over  $\pounds30,000$ . The Appeal was run by a professional firm and was not well handled. Many Old Boys were approached and a number responded most generously.

Since then the College has increased its numbers by forty, improved the class rooms and added a new Maths. Block and Burr House extension. But with ever rising costs we have not been able to do all we wanted. Our main needs at the moment are Squash Courts, extra accommodation for both the teaching and domestic staff, study bedroom extensions for Everett and Welsh. A sports Hall would be a great asset too.

With these things in view the Governors decided to ask Mr. Frank Waldron, a personal friend of mine since Oxford days to see what he could raise. In six weeks he has collected £17,000 with promises of another £8,000 from present parents; this despite an increase in fees of £150 for the next year and so far the average is about £700 per donor. Don't worry - there is no intention of asking you to see Frank Waldron but I know you would be interested in hearing news of what is happening.

However, I do feel that there are some of you who might be prepared to help with a donation or a Deed of Covenant. A monthly sum of 25p over seven years gives us over £30 provided you pay tax. Many appeals fail because they do not worry about those who can offer only a little and I do appreciate that you may well be in this category but a small amount from a number very quickly adds up, so please help us if you can.

Nigel King, the O.V.S. Chairman, is in full support of this project. If you have already contributed please forget about it. I am enclosing a Deed of Covenant Form and a tax table. You will not be plagued again but please be as generous as possible and if not a covenant, what about a donation however small?

Those present were: nine members of the Committee plus nineteen members.

The Chairman called the meeting to order at 4.50p.m.

1. <u>Apologies for Absence</u>: Apologies for absence were received from Messrs N.A.Randall, J.B.D.Robinson, T.W.Gore, I.J.Cruickshank, M.D.Carmichael, A.Spence, A.H.Dean and A.G.Ridell.

The Chairman called the Meeting to order at 11.32a.m.

1. Apologies for absence were received from Messrs J.A.Osborne, who is in Australia, J.P.Turner, who is in Brussells and has resigned from the Lamittee, A.Spence, and R.J.Davas,

2. <u>Minutes of the Last Meeting</u>: The Minutes of the Last Meeting were read and signed by the Chairman after an adjustment to the wording of the A.G.M.Agenda had been made.

3. <u>Matters arising out of the Minutes</u>: The Chairman was asked about the defaulters on the Caledonian ovening. The third event is a Summer Ball to be held at College on Friday, July 12th, 1974, to celebrate our fifteenth birthday. On this occasion, the O.V.S. will be running the wine bar or something similar, as they did so successfully in 1967. Last time many Old Vikings left the buying of tickets until it was too late, so it has been decided that if any member thinks he would like to come, then he can send his name to the Bursar at College now, stating the number of tickets he would like to reserve, but he will not be required to send any money until a certain date nearer the time, which still has to be fixed and which will appear in the next Newsletter.

## COLLEGE

It is now time to turn our attention to College itself, from where it is good to report that for the second year running the school is as full as it can be, this despite rising fees and soaring costs. Partly as a result of this, planning permission has been applied for for the extension of Sister's quarters so that she will have, amongst other improvements, an outside stairway direct to her flat. In addition, plans for extra accommodation for Everett and Welsh are being drawn up with a view to applying for planning permission in the not too distant future. Lastly, as far as bricks and mortar are concerned, Mr. Whittington has made great strides in giving the Tithe Barn a complete internal face-lift, so that when it is finished it will be so much warmer and therefore more adaptable during the winter months.

With the school being so full, it would be pleasant to report that our results in the examination room and on the sports field have improved in proportion. In fact, the examination results were very disappointing, but we hope for much better ones in 1974. The Cricket XI had a mixed season, but there is a nucleus of good players who will be available next year. Amongst other games lost, they went down to the O.V.S. by 27 runs. In an entertaining game, College bowled out the O.V.S. for 111 (Keith Michell 26, Charles Packer 5 for 25) but were then bowled out themselves for 84 (Andrew Gordon 50, Richard Devas 6 for 40). On the iver the 1st VIII had a successful season, culminating in a 1st Round win over Hampton Grammar School in the Princess Elizabeth Cup. Their second round opponents, T. C. Williams High School, U.S.A., had the measure of them and won by just over a length in a cloudburst.

This year, as many of you will remember, Old Boys' Day was held on Speech Day, which was also the last day of term. In addition to the cricket match, the O.V.S. raised a Rowing IV, who were beaten by 1 lengths, and two Tennis VI's, with one win and one defeat to their credit.

Now we are in the rugger season and experiencing again a few ups and downs. The 1st XV is light and fast, but whatever speed one has one always wants the weight to go with it and so they start off at a grave disadvantage. Even so, they are settling down as a unit and victories are beginning to come their way. One of their narrow defeats was delivered by the O.V.S. XV, who came from behind (0—8 at half-time) to win by 15—12. It was certainly the best O.V.S. side we have seen here. We also saw an O.V.S. XV beat Bearwood College Old Boys on the preceding Sunday, October 7th, but it was a scrappy affair full of errors and missed chances.

This term there has been no dramatic production at College for reasons beyond our control. The choice of play—" Son of Man "—called for an adult, and if possible professional, actor as the leading part is a very demanding one. A member of the Royal Shakespeare Company offered his services free as he had always wanted to play the part and it so happened that he was not engaged in any theatre work at the time. As it turned out, he was offered a part in a West End production, which meant a clash with our dates, and so reluctantly we had to call it off for this term. Even so, it will go ahead in a year's time when Brother Paul will be in the leading part.

At the end of the Summer term we said goodbye to Mr. Oxlade and his wife. He will be sadly missed both in the classroom and on the river. Nevertheless, we send with them our very best wishes for a happy career at Pangbourne College.

Finally, on your behalf, I should like to say farewell to two lady members of College who have served us so well in their various ways over the past years. The first, Miss Tomalin, is still very much with us as Matron of Skipwith House, but as a result of this move she has relinquished her post as School Secretary and Honorary Secretary of the O.V.S. Our Chairman wrote her a letter of thanks for all she had done for the Society since its inception and sent her, as a token of our esteem, a gift voucher. Miss Tomalin has asked me to express to the Society her "very grateful thanks for this most generous gift."

Secondly, at the end of the Summer term we said farewell to Sister Grayson, who has done so much for College in both the Sick Bay and Pavilion. We wish her well in her new post and bid welcome to her successor, Miss Noble, as indeed we do to Miss Tomalin's successor-Mrs. Göcke.

It now just remains for me to remind you of all the dates concerned with 1974 and thank all those members who keep in touch with us about their movements, but please do not forget the "Change of Address" slip.

Dear Old Viking,

March, 1973.

CAPTANN E.F.R. BYNG CBE (Bord) I, KINGS WALK, HENLEY. ON. HAMES OXON The Minutes of the 12th Annual General Meeting, held at Shiplake College on Sunday,October 14th,1973.

Those present were: Nine members of the Committee plus twenty-five members.

The Chairman called the meeting to order at 5.05 p.m.

- 1. <u>Apologies for Absence</u>: Apologies for absence were received from D. Hawkes, and C. Wigfell and C. Fairbairn.
- 2. <u>Minutes of the Last Meeting</u>: The Minutes of the last meeting were read, approved, and signed.
- 3. <u>Matters arising out of the Minutes</u>: As there was nothing arising out of the minutes, the Chairman moved on to point four on the Agenda.
- 4. Election of Officers: At this juncture, the chair was vacated temporarily by the Chairman and the Meeting was conducted by Mr. J.A. Osborne, who explained an idea which had been formed Mr. J.A. Osborne, who explained an idea which had been formed in Committee - namely that a Chairman-elect be elected half-way through the current chairman's second year of office, a move which would provide for continuity. Mr. N. King had been approached for this post and said that he was happy to stand but, as he was not a Member of the Committee, he would prefer to observe Committee procedure for one year. This meant that as the present Chairman was due for retirement now at the end of his two years' reign of office he should be asked to remain in office for one extra year, it being made clear to the Meeting that no precedent was being set. This motion was then put to the Meeting and was proposed by Mr. J. Barham and seconded by Mr. P. Tamworth. It was passed hem. ton. Other Offices - Mr. J.A. Osborne (Secretary) and Mr. M.M. Gilliat (Assistant Secretary) were proposed for re-election by Mr. N. King and seconded by Mr. J. Falk, with the proviso that in the future they both be known as Joint Secretaries. Both wore re-elected unopposed. Mr. J.A. Corbett (Treasurer) was re-elected unopposed. He was proposed by Mr. N. King and seconded by Mr. J. Falk. Other Members of the Committee - namely Messrs. C.M. Pelloe J.P. Turner, A.G. Riddell, R. Devas, A. Dean, K.R. Mitchell, and R.C. Lester were re-elected unopposed. Proposer - Mr. P. Tamworth; Seconder Mr. Brooke Williams. <u>New Members</u> - Messrs. M. Hayman, I. Baldry, and A.D. Gordon had been approached to see if they were willing to stand and all had agreed to do so. They were proposed by Mr. N. King and seconded by Mr. R. Dand. All three were elected nem. con.
- 5. Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer pointed out that, in order to bring the Society's financial year into line with that of the school, the period covered in his report was of 15 months' duration and so the actual cash in hand was  $\pounds707.63$  minus  $\pounds250$ , which equalled  $\pounds457.63$ . The  $\pounds250$  represented the total of subscriptions of boys who left in July 1973. In addition, he pointed out that the rugger shirts for the Old Viking Society had not yet been received and therefore had not yet been payed This would be in the region of £90. It was also stated for. that as the proposed evening at 'The Caledonian' was going to cost more than the original published price the Society funds would have to subsidise each ticket sold by £1. The Chairman then spoke about the rather generous attitude of the College with regard to postage of circulars and so on to members of the society. It was suggested from the chair that a teak outdoor seat, suitably engraved, be purchased for the use of the College. This was passed nem. con., and the Headmaster expressed his appreciation at this point.

- 6. <u>New Subscription Scheme</u>: The Chairman asked the Headmaster to explain this scheme to the Meeting. It had been suggested that in future every boy would pay £1 per term for a maximum of nine terms, thus raising the Life Subscription of the Society from £5 to £9. If, at the end of his career at College, he did not wish to join or if there was any other valid reason as to why he should not become a member, then his monies would be refunded. This motion was put to the meeting, proposed by Mr. J. Barham, seconded by Mr. E. Bell, and passed by 24 votes for and 1 against.
- 7. <u>The Caledonian</u>: The Secretary read out the publicity pamphlet, which stated amongst other things that drinks before dinner would be unlimited, the menu would be Scots, and there would be a floorshow and dancing. The cost would be £4.95 + V.A.T., making a total of £5.50. As stated earlier in these Minutes, the Old Viking Society would subsidise each ticket to the amount of £1. The date finally decided upon, owing to various circumstances, was Friday, Dec. 7th, 1973.

<u>Gaudies</u>: The Chairman asked the Headmaster to explain this scheme to the meeting. Mr. J.D. Eggar said that these would take the form of reunions of old boys, not necessarily Old Vikings, who had left College during a given number of years, and it was intended to hold the first one in June 1974. Those invited would probably be those who had attended College between 1959-1964. The Gaudy would take the form of a lunch, a tour and talk, and above all a reunion. A small charge might have to be made. It was pointed out finally that this scheme was a Governors' decision and that it was felt to be fair that the Old Viking Society should be informed of their intention.

- 9. <u>Report on 0.V.S. activities 1973</u>: The Hockey matches in 1973 produced a fair turn out of spectators, even though the Society could not raise two fall teams. The 1st XI and the 2nd XI of the Old Viking Society lost in closely fought contests. The Cricket match was won by the Society, as was the Rugger match. These were both very good games, the latter producing some very good 2nd half rugger. The final score was 15 12 pts. to the Society. During the Summer term, the Old Vikings! Tennis captain raised two teams against College, of which one won and the other drew. In the rowing match on Old Boys Day the College won narrowly. It was good to hear that now there is a regular Old Viking Rugger XV, which is hoping to play upwards of five matches during the current season. So far, they have won their first two matches.
- 10. <u>Presentation to Miss Tomalin</u>: As Miss Tomalin has left her position as School Secretary, and has therefore relinquished her post as the Society's Secretary, the committee decided that the Chairman should thank her personally for all her work during her years of office and on the behalf of the Society he will send her a letter and a £10 gift voucher as a token of the Society's thanks.
- 11. Any Other Business:

1.) Squash Fixtures - It was suggested in Committee that fixtures against College be extended to Squash. Mr. C.M. Pelloe has agreed to undertake the initial spade work in London and members of the meeting expressed a desire to take part.

2.) <u>Ski-ing Trip</u>: The Chairman said that he was planning to organize a ski-ing trip for two weeks during January-February 1975, probably in the Spanish Alps. If anyone was interested they should contact him.

3.) <u>New Addresses</u>: It was again stressed that all members should keep the Society fully informed as far as new addresses were concerned.

4.) Biennial Dinner: The Biennial Dinner would be held

April 5th at College on Friday, March 29th, 1974.

5.) Summer Ball: This Ball, to mark the fifteenth year of College's foundation, would be held on Friday, July 12th. It was suggested that the Society should run the Wine Bar. Those members who want tickets should apply early and have their names put on a list.

There being no further business, the Chairman closed the Meeting at 5.56 p.m.

## SHIPLAKE COLLEGE - OLD VIKING SOCIETY

The Minutes of the 21st Committee Meeting held at Shiplake College An Sunday, October 14th 1973.

Those present were: The Chairman - P.M. Devas The Secretary - J.A. Osborne The Assistant Sec. - M.M. Gilliat The Treasurer - J.A. Corbett The Headmaster - J.D. Eggar J.P. Turner C.M. Pelloe K.R. Mitchell A. <sup>H</sup>.Dean R. J. Devas

The Chairman called the Meeting to order at 11.33 a.m.

- 1. There were no apologies for absence.
- Minutes of the Last Meeting: The Minutes of the last meeting 2. were read, approved, and signed.

Matters arising out of the Minutes: 1.) Rugger Shirts - The order for these was scheduled to be completed within the next few weeks.

2.) O.V.S. Rugger Matches - It was reported by the O.V.S. Manager that the first match of the season - against Bearwood Old Boys - had been played at Shiplake on Sunday, October 7th, and won by the O.V.S. The Manager hoped to arrange another seven matches and form a full Rugger Committee.

#### 4. Communications:

1.) The Newsletter (a) It was decided to enclose a slip with the next Newsletter asking members to help the Society with regard to missing addresses of current members and appealing to all Members to keep the Residential Secretary (M.M. Gilliat, Esq.) up to date as far as changes of addresses were concerned.

(b) It was also decided to include an insertion asking Members in which sports they would like to participate so that the relevant information could be passed on to the appropriate Team Manager. In addition, all leavers will fill in a form concerned with which sports they played while at college.

(c) There will also be a reprint of 'Sports' Postcards' for the benefit of Team Managers.

(d) In the future there will be two Newsletters per year (December and April) and one Date Sheet(June).

(e) Finally, it was agreed that Miss Tomalin, the Society's outgoing Honorary Secretary, be presented with a £10 voucher and a letter of thanks by the Chairman. This was proposed by C.M. Pelloe and seconded by A. Dean.

- <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: The Treasurer reported that the Finances for 1972/3 were in a fairly healthy state, although it was brought to the Committee's attention that the financial year of the Society had now been brought into line with that of the College and so the 5. Society funds were, in reality, £250 better off than they would normally be, this figure being the total of subscriptions from leavers at the end of the Summer Term, 1973. There was then a discussion as to what the College would appreciate in the way of a gift. It was suggested that two outdoor seats be purchased, but this was later reduced to one, as a token of gratitude to the College, who subsidised postage of the Old Viking Society's mail to a large extent.

Chairman's second year of office. Mr. J.P. Turner pointed out that the Chairman's term of office was strictly one year only even though it has always been extended to two years. It was proposed by Mr. J.P. Turner and seconded by Mr. J.A. Osborne that Mr. N. King be approached for this post and that Mr. P.M. Devas be asked to continue in office for one more year.

2.) As the Assistant Secretary is now in charge of the Minutes, it was agreed that in future there should be two Secretaries to be known as Joint Secretaries. The one would be a Residential Secretary at College (at present Mr. M.M. Gilliat) and the other would be a Social Secretary. Mr. J.A. Osborne offered his services and was accepted. It was suggested that the last mentioned be approached to resign if he failed to turn up at the next meeting. It was also suggested that Messrs. I. Baldry, M. Hayman and A.D. Gordon, head of College during 1972/3, be approached to join the Committee.

- 7. <u>Caledonian</u>: It was reported that at the moment sixteen tickets were required, but the price had already gone up and so it was agreed that the tickets must be subsidised by £1.00 per head. The date had already had to be changed from the original - Friday, November 23rd - to either Friday, November 16th or Friday, December 7th. The Treasurer had taken it upon himself to book the Dinner/ Dance on November 16th. The subsidy of £1 per head was proposed by Mr. C.M. Pelloe and seconded by Mr. A. Dean.

The Minutes of the Committee Meeting held at Shiplake College on Sunday, June 10th, 1973, at 11.30 a.m.

Those present were: The Chairman - P.M. Devas. The Headmaster - J.D. Eggar The Treasurer - J.A. Corbett The Assistant Secretary - M.M. Gilliat K.R. Mitchell C.M. Pelloe

The Chairman called the Meeting to order at 11.32 a.m.

- 1. There were no apologies for absence, but there was a verbal one from Mr. Mitchell for being late.
- 2. In the absence of the Secretary, the Meeting was conducted without a Minutes Book, so there was no reading of the report of the last Meeting and consequently no matters arising out of it. The Assistant Secretary was empowered to write the Minutes of this Meeting.
- 3. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Two new mombers joined at the end of last term, and the current balance of the Society now stood at £484. The two new Library tables had been paid for and it was decided to transfer £100 from the Current to the Deposit Account. On the question of finance and subscriptions, the Headmaster proposed that instead of a £5 Life Subscription put on the bill at the end of a boy's time at College, all parents should pay an extra £1 per term for nine terms to the Consolidated Fund, and if a boy did not wish to join when he left he would have a refund. The Life Subscription would remain at £5 for those boys who were just about to enter their last or last two years at College. This was accepted in principle.
- 4. <u>Rugger Shirts</u>: The go-ahead was given for the purchase of one set of shirts for use by the Old Viking XV.
- 5. ## Old Uiking Letter

SHIPLAKE COLLEGE, HENLEY-ON-THAMES. October, 1972.

Dear Old Viking,

It is good to report at the start of a new academic year that our numbers for 1972/3 will be the highest in the School's history. As a result of this, as I gaze out of my study window in Burr House I can witness the slow—albeit too slow for us—emergence of a new single-storey olock consisting of changing-room and ten single bed-sitters. Likewise, if I care to stand at the side gate of the garden at Meltemi and stare across the orchard, I can observe the gradual shaping of the new classroom block. In addition to all this, four more classrooms in the Stable Block are having a face-lift, thus completing phase 1 of the Appeal, and the Tithe Barn is being given proper flooring throughout. Byng, both of whom retired at the end of last term after years of keen and enthusiastic service. Inexplicably, one very familar face was missing, namely that of John Osborne. What could have happened? Had he had an accident? Was he on emergency duty? Or had he just forgotten? We were all kept in suspense until a telephone call relieved our worst fears. John had been, of all things, trapped in a lift and was not released until 10.30 p.m.! Before I close, I should like to remind you all that the A.G.M. will be held in the Library at 5.00 p.m. after the rugger match on Old Vikings' Day, October 15th. Please make every effort to attend and also do not hesitate to contact Keith Mitchell if you wish to be considered for the Old Vikings XV.

## Old Niking Letter

SHIPLAKE COLLEGE, HENLEY-ON-THAMES,

October, 1971.

Dear Old Viking,

Since our last newsletter many of you have been approached directly or indirectly in connection with the College Appeal. Certain details of this appeal are set out in the enclosed leaflet and so I shall not say anything more in that direction but I would like to take this opportunity of thanking all those of you who have contributed in any way. What made the start of the campaign so encouraging was the approach of the boys in the school, who said that they would like to help in some way. As a result, a sponsored walk of thirty miles along the river was organised. Accordingly, on the last day of the Summer Term the majority of the school set out from Aston in their attempt to reach Whitchurch and then about turn to Shiplake. It was a blistering hot day, a fact which reflects great credit on the many who completed the course, including the Headmaster, one of the Governors and several other members of the Common Room. The net total should be in the region of £1,500, the biggest individual amount of £60 being raised by a pint-sized Third Former! Before this venture, the boys stipulated that the money raised should be spent on one item and their first choice was a Squash Court but the final decision has not yet been made as one or two other suggestions have since been put forward.

While on the subject of boys, it would seem appropriate at this juncture to comment on the various sporting actitivities of the last two terms. The Hockey XI had a successful season overall. They played 11 matches, won 8, lost 1, and drew 2, one of the last mentioned being a 1—1 draw against a strong O.V. XI. The Cricket XI did not fare so well, though. They played 13, won 1, lost 6, and drew 6, The best and most interesting game of the season was the one against the Old Vikings, who again turned out a strong side. Batting first, they made 169 (Richard Devas 105 n.o.) and then College hung on at 163 for 9 (J. Hincklieff 70) for an exciting draw. The Rowing Club, like the Hockey XI, had a very fair season. They won the novices VIII's at Wallingford, the Schools' VIII's at Reading and were defeated in the semi-final of the Beale Cup at Pangbourne. They also rowed for the first time at Henley Royal but were knocked out by St. Paul's, Concorde.

So much for the past; now for the present. During the summer holidays Phase One of the appeal was put into operation, so that now those who attend class in the Stable Block do so in more pleasant surroundings. In short, the classrooms have been refurbished and refurnished for the benefit of all. In addition, the outside walls have had a face-lift so that the overall effect is one of light and colour.

Another improvement, as I think we can rightly call it, is that the School Play this term is a combined effort with girls from Queen Anne's School, Caversham. The play is "Antigone," which will be presented on the nights of October 26th and 27th at 8.15 p.m. I hope some of you will be able to attend.

Now for some Old Viking news. Last March the Society departed from its usual Annual Dinner routine by holding a get-together at the Whisky-a-Go-Go in London. It was fun to meet all of you who attended and gave me, at any rate, a chance to enter the discotheque side of life for the first time. Even so, we cannot call it an unqualified success as the numbers were not as great as we had hoped they might have been. On the other hand, I gather that financially it was a success as the Manager never submitted a bill to us.

Over the past few years it has been noticeable that fewer Old Boys attend the Annual General Meetings, where certain matters of importance to the Society are sometimes resolved. As a result of this, it has been decided to hold a referendum as to when it should be held in the future. The suggested times—1, as it stands; 2, after the rugger match; 3, after the hockey match—are enclosed on a loose-leaf slip. We should be grateful if you would tick the time at which you would like it to be held, sign it and return to the Bursar at Shiplake College. The advantage, perhaps, of holding it after one of the two matches is that it would help to plug the gap between tea and the legitimate opening of the Junior Common Room! As it is, it has already been decided that the A.G.M. for 1972 will take place before the Dinner to be held at College. The time will be 7.30 p.m. and the place will be the Library. The date will be announced later.

It will be noted that under "Dates to Remember" you now have a new Rugger Manager in Keith Mitchell. I should like to take this opportunity of welcoming him to the post and also thank, on your behalf, Anthony Slatter, who has given several years of good service in this capacity.

# Old Niking Letter

Shiplake College Henley-on-Thames

March, 1970

Dear Old Viking,

"Mutatis mutandis" is equally applicable to College now as it was no doubt to the original situation. No school can afford to stand still and relax; every year new avenues have to be explored to find, for example, ways of saving yet more money which can be spent on improving the bricks and mortar. So it is with this in mind that I am starting this letter. Up to now, both Everett and Welsh Houses have been heated by electricity, and the cost of this system has become prohibitive. As a result, both Houses are being converted to oil-fired central heating, the cost of which, it has been worked out, will be recouped in four years. In addition, a long-term economic policy has been the purchasing of the Red House, which means that we shall be able to offer married accommodation to more members of staff rather than have to rent accommodation at today's high prices.

Two other projects have also been taken in hand, which are no less economical in so far as they will cost the College nothing! Welsh House launched an appeal last year, as a result of which they have converted their dormitories into a series of bed-sitter studies. Secondly, thanks to the magnanimity of Mr. and Mrs. Dickson and Andrew (s. 1964-9) plus a generous grant from the Ministry of Defence, work has just started on what should be a luxury firing point when it is completed.

There is, though, as so often happens, a fly in the ointment, and again, as so often happens, the Government are to blame. As a result of an Act of Parliament, which came into force last November, we have been compelled to spend a great deal of money on extra fire precautions, mainly in the nature of fire doors. When it is all finished, I feel convinced that the main building will be a very close runner-up to Hampton Court Maze!

Last term also saw plenty of activity amongst the boys. Just before half-term Mr. Welsh departed from the dramatic routine of the past few years and presented "The Kitchen" by Arnold Wesker. It was also an unusual production in so far as the stage was not used at all; instead, the backcloth was the fire-side wall of the Hall, with the audience stretching the length of the Hall only inches away from the actors. It produced a great feeling of intimate theatre and was pronounced a great success.

Success was also enjoyed on the Rugger field by the 1st XV. They were basically a lightweight side and so the emphasis was on fitness and mobility. The prosaic fact that they scored 214 points against their opponents 71 points speaks for itself, and of their total tally, Carlos Caralps scored no fewer than 109 in tries, conversions and penalties. R. D. Newton proved a fine leader and pulled the team together at a time when they needed it most.

In the Common Room there has also been a certain amount of activity. Mr. D. S. Partridge, who joined us last term, was well and truly married just after Christmas, and Mrs. Welsh has presented her husband with a baby boy.

Now to matters that concern you more closely, perhaps. The time is not far off when we shall again be getting together at our Annual Dinner at the College. Your Committee would like to feel that this event ranks high in your social diary, and it is to be hoped that in this first year of our second decade we shall have a record attendance. Please make every effort to come on March 20th.

SHIPLAKE COLLEGE, HENLEY-ON-THAMES.

October, 1969.

Dear Old Viking,

Since our last letter, much of interest and import has taken place both in the College and amongst the Old Boys, whose activities I should like to enlarge on first.

The Annual Dinner was held at the College on March 28th, when the turnout was something of a disappointment. If such functions are to be the success they deserve to be, then we must all do our best to support them. Even so, it was a very pleasant evening, and the Treasurer was able to announce that a small profit had been made, which in itself was a comfort. The question of the future of the Annual Dinner was brought up at the A.G.M. in July, and it was decided to continue to celebrate the occasion at College. The date for the 1970 Dinner has yet to be decided.

At the A.G.M. it was proposed, and passed, that, in future, no more magazines or calendars would be sent out unless they were specifically asked for, in which case a charge would be made. # Old Viking Letter

Shiplake College, Henley-on-Thames.

March, 1969

Dear Old Viking,

The Winter Term of 1968 was long, crammed with activities and a uccessful one on the Rugger field. After a very convincing early win over Henley Grammar School (35—0) the team very rarely looked back, although they had their moments of complacency. Even so, as the score-board shows, they were a force to be reckoned with, and even in defeat they were always ready to throw the ball about and run hard. The regular members of the team were: N. J. C. Godwin, H. Wyndham-Smith, N. P. F. Turley, I. D. H. Towle, C. J. Caralps, J. A. F. Ashburnham, J. W. W. A. Helps, D. M. Geerke, J. J. Baverstock, M. H. R. Tomlinson, J. A. Yates, A. B. Docker, G. St.C. Pringle, R. D. Newton, C. P. Newton, L. R. J. Buchanan, K. R. Mitchell, J. W. Turner-Lashmar. The Colts XV had a slightly less successful season but played attractively as a team. Of the eight games played, they won four, drew one, and lost three.

Last term also saw much activity on the stage. It has been decided that, in future, the School Play will be performed during this term, as the pressure on "O" and "A" level candidates is that little bit less and so more senior boys are available for the producer. The choice last term was "Edward II," an Elizabethan historical play which demanded a large cast and good acting. Some forty boys took part on the stage, not counting the many who helped behind the scenes, so that in the end about one third of the school was involved in one capacity or another. It was a good corporate effort, and in the event proved a very bold but successful venture.

It was the beginning of last term that also heralded a new era in our history. With the advent of our new Bursar, it was decided to introduce a change in our catering system and employ a firm to organise the kitchen side of affairs. As a result, both breakfast and supper are now run on cafeteria lines, as is lunch on Saturdays and Sundays, the great benefit of this system being that there is much less congestion in the Hall at any one time and no House is banished to the Gallery for more than five meals in any one week. The sad aspect was that we said goodbye to Mr. Dean, the chef, before the start of the term, although he is not too far away as he is now working in a school for Partially Sighted Children at Ascot.

As far as the bricks and mortar are concerned, in the near future we shall have two extra hard tennis courts running parallel to the existing one, which will also have a "face lift," the funds for this project coming from the profit of the school shop. In addition, the stone work in the Hall has been cleaned, owning mainly to an act of God, when the firm who were re-roofing that area inadvertently left the tarpaulin off one weekend and we experienced a violent thunderstorm. The firm concerned admitted negligence and undertook the whole operation at their own expense. Much of the roof still remains to be re-tiled, and it is hoped that this will be completed during 1969.

Finally, a word about the boys themselves. N. J. C. Godwin is Head of the School and Captain of Welsh House, J. J. Baverstock is Captain of Burr, H. Wyndham-Smith is Captain of Everett, and C. P. Newton is Captain of Skipwith. At the moment there are 203 boys in the school, with 14 day boys; there are over twenty boys writing "A" level next term, while the Sixth Form is just on the forty mark.

We look forward to seeing you at the Dinner on March 28th.

## AN O.V.S. IN DENTAL SCHOOL

With the Headmaster's talk to the leavers still echoing loudly in my head I found myself sitting in my first lecture at Guy's Hospital in 1964, wondering if all the girls sitting round me could possibly be as he promised they might be and how long it would be before they were! Studies, however, proved far too intense for any research into that aspect of worldliness and anyway this article has to be edited.

The dental course lasts for five and three-quarter years, the same time in fact as a doctor's, although with us a House Officer's appointment is not compulsory. The first two years are pre-clinical; that is we are occupied with pure studying and we are not allowed near a patient!

During this time we study the pure sciences, biology, physics and chemistry and the applied ones—anatomy, physiology and special dental anatomy (I can, for instance, tell you the dentition of the Australian honey mouse!).

Anatomy is rather exciting for it contains a dissecting course. We are all supplied with a cadavar (corpse, to you) and spend two terms with scalpel in one hand and handkerchief soaked in 1711 in the other. During the third year we make dentures for old ladies, as this is considered a suitable introduction to patients—I suppose that means that it doesn't matter too much if anything goes wrong!

In the fourth, fifth and sixth years we have dentistry proper—drilling, filling, extracting and surgery (yes, even dentists use a scalpel). We also study to a fairly high standard pathology, bacteriology, medicine, surgery and pharmacology. This involves endless ward rounds and post mortem examinations (more 1711).

Guy's is a very reputable hospital and I have had the privilege of watching such great men as Donald Ross (the heart transplant surgeon) and Lord Brock operate.

The most frequented place at Guy's, however, is the saloon bar of the King's Head adjacent to the hospital, where you may find us at unchtime discussing Mrs. Jones's liver over a pint and Cornish pastie.

The main sport is the eight hundred nurses resident there, after which comes rugby, rowing, hockey, soccer and many other clubs and societies.

I would be more than happy to show anyone around the hospital and even some operations, if they dare. And finally, for the incredibly brave, I can now offer treatment to anyone in need.

# HEADVASTER'S REPORT

I feel my main function here is to try to cover, in as small a space as possible, as many details of the School which will interest Old Boys. But Mr. M.M. Gilliat is the School Correspondent, so please let him have any ideas.

Staff In July we said goodbye to three members of the Staff:

Commander R.F. Jenks, who had been Bursar since September 1964. Amongst many other activities, he has been Treasurer of the C.V.S. and he founded the Naval Section of the C.C.F.

Fr. M.D. Duncan (1962-63), who is now teaching at Tonbridge. He has been House Tutor of Velsh House, and Master i/c Rowing for the last two years. He also started the Loan Book Scheme, and was the main spring of the Choir for all his time here.

Mr. B. Humphries (1965-68), who is now teaching in Nova Scotia. He ran the Biology Department, and was Master in charge of Rugby during 1966.

In their places are:

Mr. R.A. Alexander, as Bursar, who has already taken over as Treasurer of the O.V.S. and now runs the Maval Pection of the C.C.F.

Mr. S.C. Oxlade, B.A., who is teaching Science and History.

Mr. S.J. Coldlow, who is teaching Maths.

Numbers This term, the School has a record number of boys - 206, of whom 189 are Doarders and 17 are Day Boys. The number of Day Boys may go up, but it is impossible to increase the boarding accommodation at the moment.

Fork The Middle Sixth has now reached 23 boys, all of whom are doing one or more 'A' Levels. This in particular means that the average age of the School is much higher than it has ever been before. We have started a Junior Common Room Club, where at week-ends its Members may drink and smoke within certain limits.

Games Spring Term 1968. There is now a choice of Hockey, Rowing or Cross Country Running in the Easter Term. In Hockey, the 1st XI was not up to the standard of the 1967 side, but they defeated the Staff at long last.

The Junior Cross Country team won all its nine events, and had an outstanding runner in J.N. M.A. Helps.

We rowed in both the Reading and Putney Head of the River races, but with no great success.

In the Country Life Shooting Competition, we came 82nd out of 144.

In Squash, our Junior Team was undefeated.

Surmer Term 1968. The Cricket Season was sadly interfered with by main and three of the games were ruined by it. The lst XI were an extremely promising side, being very well led by R.J. Devas. Rain ruined the Old Viking Match at an interesting stage.

Rowing Our 2nd IV won the Novices at Reading Regatta, but apart from that, although we won a number of races, we had no major successes. Mr. Drury is now in charge of Rowing, and our floet of boats has been considerably increased.

Tennis This is now a Major Sport, and we now have two grass courts alongside the hard court. Again, we had two useful teams and we were tremendously helped by our new coach, Mrs. Hilary Melhuish.

Other Activities (a) The Duke of Edinburgh's Award group still continues to flourish and there were three new Gold Award winners in J.Pyper, H.Wyndham-Smith and C.Newton. Then is now an Annual Camp late in March, and I know Mr. Mash is always wanting extra assistance from previous Gold Award winners. (b) <u>Founders' Day 1968</u> Once again, we had a fine day and a sugnificent speech from Viscount Cobham, K.G., G.C.M.G. It took place on a Baturday early in July and the Old <sup>B</sup>oys' Day was the next day, which meant that all the exhibitions remained up until the Monday.

<u>Buildings</u> In the last year we have built a further extension to the Science Block, enabling us to have all the Science subjects taught under one roof, and there are now proper store rooms, a small Sinth Form Lab. and a hot house. The Art Department has taken over the old Physics Room.

There is a most useful extension to Everett House of three extra studies and one recreation room. This has been built through the generosity of parents, Old Boys and others. Considerable work was done by Mr. Mash and many of the present boys themselves.

All Houses now have extra work cubicles in the  $r \infty f$  areas of the Houses, and although these are not ideal, there are sufficient to enable all '0' Level candidates to be able to study quietly on their own.

Chef I am very sorry indeed to report that, after nine years' service to the School, Chef left in August. He did a tremendous lot here, and was a most loyal member of the staff through all the early days of the School. The catering is now in the hands of a Catering Firm - County Caterers Limited.

## RULES

NAME - The Society shall be called 'The Old Vikings Society' (O.V.S) 1.

- OFFICERS The officers of the Society shall consist of a Chairman 2. and an Honorary Secretary and Treasurer and Committee members. The Chairman, the Honorary Secretary and Treasurer and the Committee shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, which shall also decide upon the number of Committee Members for the ensuing year and upon the number of those members needed to form a guorum. The Committee shall have the right to co-opt any members they think fit for any Committee Neeting and to invite to such meeting any nonmembers they wish.
- OBJECTS The objects of the Society are: 3.
  - (a)To maintain social contact between Old Boys of the School.
  - (b) To arrange for Old Boys' reunions and sports fixtures against the School, and other teams and clubs as agreed by the Committee.
- MEMBERSHIP All Old Boys and past Masters shall be eligible for membership, subject to the following conditions:
  - The Committee shall have the right to withhold or withdraw the privileges (a) of membership from any member provided that two thirds of the members of the Society present at a meeting approve such action.
  - (b) The Headmaster and Chairman jointly shall have the right to veto the extension of membership either for a specific period or sine die to any boy leaving the School.

The Committee shall have power to elect a person to Honorary Membership of the Society provided that two thirds of the full Society are present at the meeting, and the vote is unanimous.

SUBSCRIPTION - The Subscription shall be 10 shillings per year. 5.

The financial year shall commence on January 1st, and terminate on December Subscriptions shall be payable on January 1st for the year commencing 31st. on that date. No person shall be entitled to the privileges of membership until his subscription is paid, but in the case of persons joining the Society between October 1st and December 31st in any year, the subscription paid on joining shall be taken as having been paid on the next January 1st. NOTE: The subscription is intended to cover:

- A copy of the Rules, to be sent to each member on joining. (1)
- (2) The issue of 'The Court' which shall be the ordinary means of communication with members.
- The printing and postage of notices and other secretarial expenses.
- (3) (4) iny other expenses incurred on behalf of the Society, subject to the agreement of 75% of the memoers at a Committee Meeting.
- (5) The proportion of the cost of publication of 'The Court' to be borne by the Society or the sum the Society shall contribute towards the cost of such publication shall be a matter for negotiation between the Committee and the School authorities.
- MANAGEMENT The general management of the Society shall be entrusted to 6. the Chairman, the Secretary and Treasurer, and the Committee.
- MEETINGS The Secretary shall call a Committee Meeting annually and at other times if necessary.

A General Meeting of the Society shall be held annually. The Committee shall draw up and present to the Annual General Meeting a report of the transactions and general concerns of the Society, with an audited statement of the accounts for the past year.

FINANCE - All money belonging to the Society shall be in the hands of the Treasurer who shall keep an account in the name of the Society, and submit the accounts to the School Bursar for audit annually.

9. DINNER OR LUNCHEON - in annual Dinner and or Luncheon shall be held at a place and time arranged by the Committee and notified to members.

No alteration shall be made to the Rules, unless approved at an Annual 10. General Meeting.
